SENSE OF PLACE Foster Cultural Activity that promotes the heritage, stories and unique features that are the Ballina Shire	Encourage community based activities and events that engage with our history and collections/museums, as well as artists and performers to tell these stories. Strategically plan for new interpretation of the Shire's natural and cultural heritage values, which complies with best practice interpretation guidelines, complements existing interpretation and is innovative or creative. Continue to foster the retention of our historic built environment, through conservation or adaptive reuse. Continue to promote and support the Shire's historical societies, museums and natural environment organisations to conserve our local stories and heritage. Seek funding to contribute to place making projects. Support community groups to co-ordinate local or Shire-based cultural activity. Foster or strengthen community or regional partnerships to hold cultural activity reinforcing our sense of place.	 Establish character statements for our Shire settlements. Interpret our places through public art and within public spaces to enhance their aesthetic, use and vibrancy. Establish an ongoing oral history recording program for our Shire area. Work with Arts Northern Rivers to develop and 	Character statements has been developed, in collaboration with rural communities, for Newryba Tintenbar, Fernleigh, Empire Vale, Keith Hall, South Ballina, Patchs Beach, Meerschaum Vale, Rous and Rous Mill. The Wardell Strategic Plan has been completed. The plan aims to guide Council's strategic planning and decision making for Wardell and its surrounds. The strategic plan is supported by the Wardell Planning and Environmental Study that provides the key attributes and characteristics of Wardell. Council continues to support local festivals and events which include the Country Music Festival, the Ballina Prawn Festival, Skull Candy surf contest and the Ballina Fine Wine and Food festival. Council has prepared an artist's brief and undertaken an expression of interest process to commission public art works for two new roundabout sites in the Ballina CBD. It is envisaged that the documents prepared for this project will form templates and guidelines for the commissioning of public art more widely across the shire as opportunities arise. Council has embarked on documenting the Shire's public art through a public art register that will provide information on the artwork, the artist and the artist statement. This information will provide information for the promotion of a public art trail for the Shire.

The strategy articulates the community's vision and aspiration for Ballina to ensure its character and sense of place is retained and enhanced when planning for the future. In conjunction with the Ballina Naval and Maritime Museum, a Conservation Management Plan has been prepared for the historic timber vessel the MV Florrie. In conjunction with the Ballina Naval and Maritime Museum, the historic timber vessels the PV Richmond and the MV Florrie have been digitised through 2D and 3D scans. These scans are to be used in the development of future interpretive materials on the vessels. Two new interpretive signage panels have been installed based on two important historic stories relevant to the township of Lennox Head.

Interpretive material for Stage 1 of this project in the East Ballina Aboriginal Place has been completed with installation expected in August 2016. Object of the Story – Reflections on place project promoted the shire's Aboriginal culture and connection to the shire though an exhibition at the Northern Rivers Community Gallery and the publication of a booklet. Council continues to promote the shire's Aboriginal Cultural heritage through the Annual NAIDOC exhibition at the Northern Rivers Community Gallery (2009-2015). Council received funding for improving water quality and drainage at the Northlakes residential subdivision and the Chickiba wetland. Both projects and involve enhancement to onsite environmental values as well as contributing to improved water quality in the Richmond River catchment. Council has also received a number of site specific grants for works in revegetation, weeding and enhancement of natural areas in Ballina shire. Council continues to work with non-government organisations, agencies and community to collective improve our natural environment. The first EcoHealth report card for the Richmond River (2015) based on extensive water quality monitoring throughout the catchment has been produced. Koala Habitat Mapping has been completed for Ballina Shire recognising a key aspect of the shire's natural heritage. Council has adopted a Koala Management Strategy to provide a framework for koala management in

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	public art and family based events.		the Shire. Council received funding to plant 8000 trees for koala habitat restoration at Bagotville. The Historic Ballina Waterfront trail launched in 2014 highlights the historic significance of the river to the shire's European settlers. Council has constructed a viewing platform and walking tracks at Killen Falls to increase the amenity of this increasingly popular spot for locals and visitors. Council has an ongoing street tree planting program.

Support community groups and business to promote creative activity. Enhance promotion of the Shire's creative industries to interstate and other visitors. Continue to activate the Northern Rivers Community Gallery as a central hub for creative activity in the Shire and region. Utilise grant funds to complement regional-based programming at the Northern Rivers Community Gallery. Community at War, a war-time heritage project, involved a month long exhibition at the Northern Rivers Community Gallery to coincide with ANZAC Day 2014 and a publication of oral histories based on local WW1 and WW2 experiences. Council collaborated with WetlandCare Australia to celebrate World Wetlands Day 2015 with a month of art exhibitions, creative workshops, guided walks and fishing workshops to discover the creative and ecological beauty of our local wetlands. The Transform Community Art Project has continued with the painting of an Essential Energy pad mount transformer box outside the Lennox Head Community Centre by young artists under the guidance of a local artist. Make Your Mark creative workshops were held to bring generations together to share experiences of their community and what participants valued about place. The ideas were used to decorate clay pavers that have been laid as part of the Wigmore Arcade development in Ballina.

Foster the use of our community facilities and historic halls to enhance or re-invigorate cultural activity at a local community level across all ages and cultures. Develop our parks and foreshore areas to be family friendly and flexible spaces for varied cultural activity and events. Support outdoor community events that are family friendly. Develop the Northern Rivers Community Gallery as a hub for diverse cultural activity that complements exhibitions – including live music and other performance, education and professional development programs and family based cultural activity. Enable creative community partnerships to diversify existing cultural spaces. Support the use of vacant shops in central localities for pop-up galleries. Art at the Airport is continuing as a rotating program of artwork by leading professional artists from across the Northern Rivers region and is part of by the Northern Rivers Community Gallery program. Council has recently undertaken a review of open spaces as part of the Section 94 review, to determine what the priorities are in relation to sports fields and open space to guide future open space planning. Council has prepared a procedure to guide the installation of public art on Council owned assets. Twelve community halls have been included in the promotion of community spaces available for hire on Council's website to promote these halls as spaces for cultural activities. In March 2016 the Park Lane Theatre opened at the Lennox Head Cultural and Community Centre providing tiered seating for up to 450 people, additional staging, audio visual equipment, event lighting and carpet to provide a premiere venue for more cultural events. Council has supported the 'If these Halls Could Talk' creative arts project facilitated by Arts Northern Rivers celebrating our halls and the role they play in our communities. One of the oldest community halls in the Ballina Shire, the Meerschaum Vale Hall hosted an event as part of this project in April 2016. A master planning process is underway for the Mertin Street Boat Harbour and Ballina Trawler

6. Family Fun Shape our cultural image and infrastructure to reflect a family friendly place for all of us to live and others to visit	Work with children, young people, parents and grandparents to plan for cultural activity and infrastructure that is inclusive of all families and family members – including age, gender, disability and cultural groupings. Encourage community events that are family friendly and integrate creative family activities into existing community events. Promote our environment and cultural activity to residents and visitors in age and culturally appropriate ways and to reflect the whole Shire community. Support a signature festival in the Shire centring on families.	Support young people to develop and hold cultural and creative activity. Review and implement Council's adopted Playground Equipment Program. Integrate public art that is child focused and interactive into parks and public spaces used by families. Make available online the facilities available at the Shire's parks and open spaces that cater to families. Work with relevant stakeholders to establish a bird hide that is child friendly to promote our bird species and their conservation. Support community groups to hold cultural activity that is inclusive of families. Explore the benefits of initiating a dedicated Children's Festival that integrates creative activity with the Shire's sense of place values. Provide for large scale children's play space.	A mural for the Chickiba Lake Pump Station has been designed and installed by the students of Southern Cross K-12 School under the mentorship of local indigenous artist Digby Moran. Council (as Trust Manager) adopted the Pop Denison Master Plan to provide a framework for the establishment and promotion of Pop Denison Park as a regional park facility focused on children's play. Council continues to support Youth Week activities through the Loud in the Gallery exhibition, and the Youth Week Skate competition. Council has an ongoing playground renewal and implementation program. Council (as Trust Manager) has adopted the captain Cook master Plan to provide a framework for the redevelopment of this foreshore parkland.

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
