



Notification of Alcohol Free Zones – Lennox Head and Alstonville

Ballina Shire Council resolved on 24 March 2016 to undertake consultation to re-establish the Alcohol Free Zones (AFZ) in Lennox Head and Alstonville.

Under sections 644 and 646 of the Local Government Act 1993 and in accordance with the Ministerial Guidelines on Alcohol Free Zones, Ballina Council proposes to establish Alcohol Free Zones (AFZ) in Lennox Head and Alstonville.

AFZs have been in place in Lennox Head and Alstonville for the past four years and have assisted the police in managing antisocial behaviour relating to alcohol consumption in public areas.

When an AFZ has been established, the drinking of alcohol on public roads, footpaths and public car parks in the designated areas in Lennox Head and Alstonville is prohibited.

AFZs are enforced by the police. Any person observed drinking in an AFZ will be advised that it is prohibited and may be given the opportunity to stop drinking. It also provides the NSW Police with powers to seize and dispose of alcohol without the need to issue a warning.

The declaration period for the AFZs is from 27 May 2016 to 31 January 2018. At the end of this period the AFZs may be re-established if required.

Re: Proposal to Establish Alcohol Free Zones in Lennox Head and Alstonville

Supporting improved public health and safety is an important strategic objective for Council. In this regard, the implementation of Alcohol Free Zones (AFZs) in appropriate locations has been an essential part of our program. The current AFZs in Lennox Head and Alstonville have recently expired and we are writing to invite you to contribute to the process to review a proposal to re-establish these zones.

It is our experience that the current zones have been effective by assisting Police to reduce the amount of alcohol related crime and anti-social behaviour. Therefore we propose for the existing AFZs to operate for a further 1.5 years, commencing 27 May 2016 to 31 January 2016. This will align with the Ballina and Wardell AFZ's. We also propose that the footprint for the zones remain as per the current arrangements. The location details for the proposed AFZs are shown on the attached maps.

The operation of an AFZ means the consumption of alcohol on public roads, footpaths and carparks within the zone is prohibited. Police are able to confiscate alcohol from persons consuming alcohol within the zone. 

Information from the New South Wales Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research stated that the rate of alcohol related assaults in the Ballina LGA over the past 6 years has been consistently higher than that for the rate of New South Wales.



In the 12 month period between October 2014 and September 2015 that 29.9% of all alcohol related assaults occurred on Road/Street/Footpath, Carpark or Park/Bushland/Garden.

CRIME PREVENTION

Alcohol Free Zones have a significant influence on the ability of police in being able to reduce alcohol related crime and anti-social behaviour in the Ballina Shire.

An example in the Ballina Shire Council where Alcohol Free Zones has had a dramatic decrease in antisocial behaviour and crime can be shown in Lennox Head.

This can be shown with the following table comparing the summer period prior to the Alcohol Free Zones for Lennox Head, with the same period of 2011/2012. The statistics show that there has been a decrease of incidents between 67% to 79% in the major incident categories.

Proposed Alcohol Free Zone - Lennox Head and Alstonville

I refer to your letter to the Anti-Discrimination Board of NSW dated 6 April 2016.

You have indicated that Ballina Shire Council (the Council) is proposing to establish an alcohol free zones in the Ballina Shire Council local government area and you have invited the Board to comment on the proposal.

As you are probably aware, the Council is not one of the councils listed in Appendix 2 of the *Ministerial Guidelines* on *Alcohol-Free Zones* (the **Guidelines**) and is therefore not required to invite representations or objections from the Anti-Discrimination Board. Section 646(4) of the *Local Government Act* 1993 (NSW) (the **Act**) provides that councils not listed may advise the Board of any proposal as part of its consultation obligations under section 644A of the Act.

Providing the Council has followed the requirements of the Act and the Guidelines (where applicable) in all respects the Board has no objection to the establishment of the alcohol free zones within Ballina Shire Council local government area.
