8. Business Arising from Minutes – 9 May 2019

(a) Elizabeth Ann Brown Memorial Park – Public Art and Disabled Parking Space

The information provided at the last meeting for this item read "...there are no plans for Daley Street roadwork renewal within the draft Delivery Program and Operational Plan currently on exhibition."

Following completion of the public exhibition and adoption of the Delivery Program and Operational Plan this position remains unchanged.

In considering other options for a disabled car parking space near Elizabeth Ann Brown Memorial Park the recently adopted Memorial Upgrading Works Plan only shows footpath access along the eastern boundary and at the north east corner of the park.

The north east corner of the park would therefore appear a suitable location for a future disabled car parking space (subject to detail design) as other locations around Elizabeth Ann Brown Memorial Park do not have path access.

At the time of undertaking the Alstonville Main Street upgrade an assessment of disabled parking spaces confirmed that the total disabled parking spaces provided by public and private parking areas satisfied the applicable standards for the Main Street precinct. Given the adopted Delivery Program and funding noted above it will remain for future projects like the park upgrade or the roads program to consider the inclusion of the additional disabled car parking space should budgets allow.

(b) Footpath/Pathway Connections on the Plateau

The reporting presented at the last meeting dealing with the inquiry about special path projects (being paths to Summerland House, Dirty Wheels Mountain Bike Facility, Wollongbar Sports Fields and Tosha Falls) has not changed.

The projects do not form part of the PAMP due to not meeting the primary objective of the PAMP, and the significant financial investment required. The primary objective of the PAMP is to facilitate improvements in the level of pedestrian access and priority, particularly in areas of pedestrian concentration. These projects are therefore low priority in recognition of the PAMP criteria, and not included in the ten year program.

It is again pointed out that these projects may be worthy of external funding should opportunities arise for this special purpose.

(c) Bulwinkel Park Shelter


There are currently no immediate safety issues associated with the integrity of the existing shade structure. Open Spaces staff are aware of requests, including financial support towards the procurement of a potential replacement shade option. Staff to work with groups to prepare a costed replacement option for community consultation.

(d) Roundabout Vegetation - Teven Road

The Teven Road roundabout was a requirement of the development application associated with the adjacent Kawana Street subdivision. The roundabout design operates correctly by purposefully slowing any approaching vehicles, and providing the necessary sight distance for negotiating the intersection.

The sight distance at the roundabout is assessed by view lines directed towards vehicles on the right hand approach, and not by view lines of vehicles which may be on the opposite side of the roundabout.

The image below shows the roundabout design, and the view lines which demonstrate the raised landscaping element of the roundabout does not impact on the correct operation of the roundabout. Maintenance of the vegetation within the landscaping element will continue to ensure sight lines, however there are no plans to remove landscaping elements.





(e) Condition of Youngmans Creek

A Council officer met onsite with Steve Miller to discuss his observations with regard to flow within the creek. The issues identified by Mr Miller have the potential to seriously impact the creek during low to median flows, particularly during low rainfall periods. After some initial investigation, Council has identified a number of possible issues:-

- An extra 100ML of water from surface water flows was allocated after the creek was nominated as highly stressed hydrologically in the late 1990's/early 2000's, to a total of 400ML of surface water legally being allowed to be pumped from the creek annually.
- 2. Previously dormant licences have recently been activated and surface water is now being utilised where previously it wasn't.
- 3. Based on the observations of local residents, it is possible that watering of crops is not being undertaken in line with best practice and as a result there may be water wastage.
- 4. The Cease To Pump point is a visual marker that, whilst easy to observe, requires some effort on the part of water users to drive or walk down to the causeway and make their own assessment of whether they can pump (usually the CTP is a 'no visible flow' requirement). Often this would occur in the morning when groundwater has had a chance to recharge the creek to a certain degree, so a water user may consider that the creek is flowing sufficiently that they can pump. However, throughout the day water levels rapidly reduce during low flow times so that there is no visible flow by midmorning or lunchtime but water users are continuing to pump thinking that there is still flow.

200ML in groundwater use licences have also been issued, potentially meaning that groundwater recharge is slower and less reliable.

These amounts are additional to the stock and domestic use rights that all landholders can access where they live adjacent to a creek.

Whilst these issues are serious, they are not able to be investigated to any conclusion by Council as the legislation is managed by the NSW Office of Water and compliance is managed by the Natural Resources Access Regulator.

(f) Recognition – Finn Ball

Finn Ball was awarded Young Citizen of the Year 2019 at the Ballina Shire Australia Day Awards ceremony in January this year.

Council staff can forward Finn's details to the Seven NSW Young Achiever of the Year awards program. Nominations open in August 2019.

(g) Community Grants - Crawford House

Council staff contacted Jane Gardiner in relation to this matter. The Alstonville Plateau Historical Society has made an application for funding under the "My Community Projects" program which involves a public voting process. No action is proposed at this time until public voting opens for the program.

9. Council Documents on Exhibition

The following is a list of recent documents that have been placed on exhibition in the period since the last meeting.

Draft Policies as per below

• Backyard Burning Policy (Review) - closing date 3 July 2019

Council first adopted this policy on 22 June 2006. The objective of this policy is to prevent air pollution from air borne particulates and chemicals, and eliminate localised nuisance caused by smoke and odour generated by backyard burning.

The review of this policy has identified only minor changes. The key changes are outlined as follows:

- The deletion of some words to improve readability
- Deleting references to the repealed Stock Diseases Act 1923 and Animal Diseases and Animal Pests (Emergency Outbreaks) Act 1991 and recognising the appropriate legislation being the Biosecurity Act 2015
- Correcting the name of Council's Planning and Environmental Health Division.
- Amending the Backyard Burning Restricted Area maps so they contain relevant and up to date mapping information. Changes include:
 - addition of Banyan Hill residential estate and surrounding land zoned R3 Medium Density Residential at Cumbalum.
 - addition of the recently approved Aureus residential development located at Skennars Head; and

 addition of the remaining portion of Lot 282 DP 1141745, 19 Scotia Avenue, being part of the Ballina Heights subdivision at Cumbalum.

These areas are considered to be closely settled with backyard burning having the potential to have an adverse impact on neighbouring residents should it be carried out in an unsatisfactory manner.

 Mobile Vending on Public Land Policy (Amended) (inclusive of Sharpes Beach Vending Sites –closing date 10 July 2019

Notification of New Fee – Mobile Vending on Public Land In accordance with Section 610F of the Local Government Act 1993, public notice is given of the following fee to be applied in the 2019/20 Fees and Charges as follows:

 Proposed Resolution to Classify Operational Land - Lot 1 DP 1252778 Cnr Stoneyhurst Drive and Sunray Crescent Lennox Head closing date 24 June 2019

Council is in the process of acquiring Lot 1 DP 1252778. Lot 1 is located on the north-eastern corner of Stoneyhurst Drive and Sunray Crescent at Lennox Head as indicated by red outline in the location diagram.

Council proposes to resolve to classify the land as operational land in accordance with the provisions of section 31(2) of the Local Government Act 1993. The land will be used for water supply purposes.



Ballina Shire Development Control Plan 2012 - Draft Amendment No.
 12 - General Amendments, closing date 21 June 2019

Draft Amendment No.12 proposes changes to various controls including those relating to the car parking contributions plan for Lennox Head Village Centre; minimum buffer distances for hotmix asphalt / bitumen batch plants; new provisions for boat ramps, pontoons and jetties; removal of the requirement for screening of stacked parking permitted forward of the building line; amendments to landscaping and private open space requirements; and adjustments to reference new biodiversity legislation.

 Ballina Local Environmental Plan 2012 - Planning Proposal BSCPP 18/002 - Attached Dual Occupancy Development within the R2 Low Density Residential Zone at Alstonville and draft DCP Amendments for Attached Dual Occupancy Alstonville and Wardell - closing date 21 June 2019

Council adopted the Alstonville Strategic Plan 2017-2037 at its Ordinary Meeting held in December 2017 [Minute No. 141217/3]. This strategic plan is informed by the outcomes of the Alstonville Planning and Environmental Study. The Alstonville Strategic Plan is used to guide Council's strategic planning and decision making relating to Alstonville Village for the period 2017 to 2037. The recommendations and strategic actions identified in the plan reflect the community's vision for the future development of Alstonville to 2037.

The provision of new housing opportunities that are affordable and provide choice for people to meet changing life needs is one of five locality objectives contained within the Alstonville Strategic Plan. Strategic Action No. 8 within the plan provides as follows:

Initiate a planning proposal to permit dual occupancy development within the R2 Low Density Residential zone upon lots having an area of 900m² or more.

Land to Which the Planning Proposal Applies - This planning proposal relates to all land within Alstonville Village zoned R2 Low Density Residential under the provisions of Ballina LEP 2012 with a minimum lot area of 900m².

 Part V 22.2019.4 - Stormwater drainage upgrade works in and adjacent to Lions Park Reserve, Lennox Head - closing date 20 June 2019

This is to seek planning consent for stormwater drainage upgrade works in and adjacent to Lions Park Reserve, Lennox Head, involving installation of a stormwater pipe commencing from an existing drainage easement on 5-7 Tresise Place and 11 Rutherford Street extending for approximately 50 metres in an easterly direction, passing through the Lions Park Public Reserve with the outlet situated on Seven Mile Beach

4. Confirmation of Minutes 14 March 2019

The minutes of the previous meeting held on 14 March 2019 were confirmed as a true and correct record.

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5. Presentation by Council Staff

Kerri Watts, Manager Public and Environmental Health, made a presentation to the Committee on the role of Council's Public and Environmental Health Section. Aspects of the portfolio outlined included Ranger responsibilities (animals, camping, parking), food surveillance program, skin penetration premises inspections, drinking water monitoring, beachwatch, mosquito monitoring program, on site sewage management, environmental compliance, healthy waterways program, Lake Ainsworth coastal management program, Shaws Bay upgrade program.

Pat Carney asked how often premises might be visited in relation to food inspections. Kerri Watts advised that poor performers might be visited up to four times per annum and that staff follow up where rectification action is required. All premises are inspected at least once per year. Mr Carney also enquired about whether Council identifies that premises have been inspected through a notice at the premises. Kerri advised this is not the case but business owners are encouraged to participate in scores on doors.

Pat Carney and Councillor Johnston enquired about how external site issues might be addressed (such as building condition). Kerri advised that various parts of Council engage with the issues depending on the issues arising.
