We are writing this letter to you, strongly objecting to any other name for Kiosk Beach. We realise it has to be registered and then gazetted by the Government for the name to be official.

I, Colleen, was born in Ballina and grew up knowing it as Kiosk Beach, our children and grandchildren know it as Kiosk Beach. Most of them live away from Ballina, coming here for holidays two or three times a year, they all know the names of our local beach's, Lighthouse, Shelley, Sharps, Flat Rock, Black Head, Boulders, North Creek and Kiosk, because here is where they learnt to swim and or surf.

My (Colleen) sister Maureen, is 90 and Kiosk Beach is the only name she has known it as, she has resided in Ballina all her life. Maureen also opposes any change. She currently resides at 7 Jamie Place. Ballina (02) 6686 4215.

The history of the beach should be retained with the name, not be lost with another new name, just because Council Officials in years past failed to have it registered.

OR persons moving here to live (We don't blame them, here is Paradise) would prefer another name.

Just because the Kiosk is no longer there, this should make not give reason to change the name or the beaches history. I grew up with Shelley Beach absolutely covered in shell grit. We used to collect a small buckets of it for our chook pen. No one swam there, it was a walking beach or people collected from the the massive about of shells (grit) moving with the tides.

Shelley Beach is no longer covered in shell grit, but the name Shelley Beach remains. Is it gazetted? or subject to follow Kiosk Beach into oblivion? We choose to use this example to demonstrate the rationale being used for a name change is not consistent with other established place names.

We could offer other examples of shire history being no longer evident but the history by name is retained.

Hoping common sense prevails and Ballina Shire Council registers Kiosk Beach.

Shaws Bay Beach - That could confuse people and take away form the wonderful work that is going o to make Shaws Bay are beautiful place to enjoy.

Missingham Beach - Makes sense because it is near the Bridge, but doesn't really add anything about the history of the place by reusing a name.

Greasy's - Eww. Doubt we want a beach named after the

Compton Cove - Really? It's not even on Compton.

Raz's Beach - He was a great guy, but it doesn't seem like that was a place that was connected to him.

Perhaps a more permeant memorial near the location of the one that currently exist would be better?

Oyster Pad - It doesn't really give the family friendly vibe that I think is needed.

Brighton Beach - Seems to be a name designed to support one local business?

Rooting Point Beach - uh?

Beach McBeachface - You would get international press if you went with this one!

The only other suggestion I have seen would be related to the traditional owners of the land. Being someone who is not connected to the local Aboriginal community, I do have trouble suggesting a name in this realm. I don't feel it is our place to decide on a Bundjalung word to describe that man made location. If the council agrees that is the direction it should go in picking a name, I do ask that they remove themselves from the process and turn it over entirely to the local elders. In my opinion, they should be given the right of first refusal in terms of naming anything in the area.

Further to the recent articles in the newspaper, I would like to make the following comments in relation to the beach near Missingham Bridge:

- In the 60 years that I can remember using Ballina as our beach, we have never known anyone to refer to it as Kiosk Beach.
- This area has been known as Shaws Bay Beach (or Shaws Bay near the old Kiosk steps for locals) as opposed to the Shaws Bay lagoon.
- After consultation with the people who were contracted to Council to run the Shaws Bay Caravan Park from 1988 to 2003 and had just moved out of the Kiosk at the time the storm demolished the premises in 2001, they also have never heard it referred to as Kiosk Beach.
- These people have a close association with the Shaws Bay or Shaws Bay beach and were responsible for planting the large pine tree next to the weather shed at Shaws Bay beach in 1989.
- We think that the historical naming should be preserved so that it is officially known as Shaws Bay beach.

I look forward to Council's deliberations as a result of community submissions.





THE LABUAN MEMORIAL

Index No. MR. 27

ORNEO is a large island in the Eastern Archipelago, immensely rich in oil and rubber. The northern part, comprising North Borneo (which includes the island of Labuan) Brunei and Sarawak is British, while the southern and larger part was Dutch, but now forms part of Indonesia. Strategically important after Singapore as the key to the area between Malaya and Java, North Borneo came within the Malaya Command and was the first of the British possessions in the Pacific to fall to the Japanese.

The first enemy troops landed on December 16th, 1941, at Seria in the east, followed on December 23rd by landings at Kuching, on the coast of Sarawak, which fell on December 24th. Sanggau, the principal Anglo-Dutch base in West Borneo, and its airfield fell; the important oil centres of Tarakan and Balikpapan, previously demolished by the garrison, were lost in January 1942. Finally, through February and March 1942, after fighting a rearguard action, the garrison (the 2/15th Punjab Regiment) made their way through 800 miles of wild and difficult country to the south coast of Borneo. This they reached, exhausted, towards the end of March only to find that in the meantime the Dutch had been forced to surrender. On April 3rd the 2/15 Punjab Regiment became prisoners of war.

In 1945 Borneo was taken from the Japanese by Australian forces as described in the account of the operations in Borneo at the beginning of this register. The commander of the 9th Division, Australian Imperial Force received the unconditional surrender of the 32nd Japanese Southern Army in North Borneo and Sarawak on a spot in Labuan which is now within the Labuan War Cemetery, and is marked by a plaque recording the fact.

After the fall of Singapore several thousand British and Australian prisoners of war were sent to camps in Borneo, mainly in the Sandakan area where they were employed on aerodrome construction. The Australians belonged to the 8th Australian Division ("B" Force numbering 1,494 and "E" Force 500). In October 1943 most of the officers were separated from their men and sent to Kuching. Thereafter conditions at Sandakan greatly worsened: the men were starved, beaten and overworked by their captors. In May 1945 the Japanese, fearing an Allied landing in the Sandakan area, marched all who could stand in two parties to Ranau, over 160 miles away in the wild and mountainous hinterland. Those who fell, sick or exhausted, on the journey were killed; the survivors who reached Ranau were made to perform superhuman work on starvation rations. Only

six of 2,400 who had been at Sandakan before the death marches began survived the end of the war. These six had escaped and were living with the natives when rescued. Fortunately the swift progress of events following the Labuan and Brunei Bay landings saved other groups from a similar fate.

The Labuan Memorial is in Labuan War Cemetery, which is on high ground overlooking Victoria Harbour about two miles from Victoria, the port and only town on the island. It was primarily intended to commemorate the officers and men of the Australian Army and Air Force who died while prisoners of war in Borneo and the Philippines from 1942 to 1945 and during the 1945 operations for the recovery of Borneo, and have no known grave. Subsequently it was found that a number of men belonging to the local forces of North Borneo, Şarawak and Brunei who were killed on war service also have no known grave, and they too are honoured here. Men of the Royal Australian Navy who lost their lives in the south-western Pacific region, and have no grave but the sea, are commemorated on Plymouth Naval Memorial in England, along with many of their comrades of the Royal Navy and of other Commonwealth Naval Forces.

This memorial consists of a colonnade forming a forecourt immediately inside the wrought iron gates of the main entrance to the cemetery. On the inner faces of the pillars are bronze panels on which are engraved the names of those whom it honours and the dedicatory inscription is on the frieze facing the entrance. The total number of names is 2,327, comprising 2,207 soldiers of the Australian Army; 1 soldier from the United Kingdom and 3 from New Zealand who were attached to the Australian Army; 51 Australian airmen and 65 members of the local forces of North Borneo, Brunei and Sarawak. Some of those whose names appear on the memorial are undoubtedly buried in unidentified graves in this cemetery.

Key to Roll

Abbreviations used in several columns:

1M: first march

2M: second march

K: known to have been killed

DR: death roll. Only known record is death roll, which may be true, or a complete fabrication in one or more elements.

Abbreviations & place names, under heading 'Died': (refer to map and Burial Table for further details) NB: names are phonetic and may vary from current-day spelling. Alternate spellings appearing on documents are in brackets.

Boto: (Borto), 103 miles from Sandakan B'uran; Beluran (Turn off at 42mile)

Celo: (Celio, Sesilo, Shiro Shiro), a tributary of Sapi River, about 85 miles from Sandakan

Dusan: (Duson), tributary of Labuk, 33 miles from Sandakan

ECR: East Coast Residency. This refers only to POWs who died on the second march. The place of death is somewhere on track between Sandakan and Ranau. To calculate approximate location, refer to the section dealing with the second march in the text, which gives a general idea of the progress of POWs along the route. However, as some POWs were made to labour along sections of the track, not all will have progressed with the main body.

K: known to have been killed

Kemansi: a village near Telupid (not to be confused with Kemansi Estate, on the lower reaches of the Labuk)

Kolapis: a tributary of the Labuk which crosses the track about 45 miles from Sandakan

m: miles (fi=from, e=case, w=wese)

M'adai/M'ai: Mankadai, west of Milulu

M'atto: Murawatto, in vicinity of 42 mile peg, near the track to Beluran

Melio: (Malio, Mairu), a rest house on Melio River, west of Gumbaron and east of Telupid

M'kau: Murakau, about 2 miles east of Ranau M'ngan: Maringan (Murikan), east of Tampias M'rin: Mandorin (Mandoring, Mandrin, Mandarin), a tributary of the Labuk, about 60 miles from Sandakan

Muanad: (Moynard, Murnard, Munyed), a triburary of the Labuk, 49.5 miles from Sandakan. The place where track crosses river was known as Tangkul Crossing

M'ulu: Milulu, a high mountain range between Melio staging post and Tampias

Muruk: (Muraked, Muroko), 8 miles east of Ranau

N'pak: Nelapak (Nelapad, Narapa, Naraba, Neraba), 12 miles east of Ranau

nr: near

N'tan: Nebutan (Nopitan) approx 15 miles east of Ranau

Pag: Paginatan, 26 miles east of Ranau

Pag-Ran: died between Paginatan and Ranau while moving to Ranau 1 Camp with groups 6-9, first march

Papan: see Tapang

Pint'an: Pinintalangan (Pintadakan), about 80 miles west of Sandakan, to west of Tuanintin River

Ran: Ranau. 164 miles from Sandakan township, 156 miles from the Sandakan POW camps

Ran 1: Ranau 1 Camp (near the airstrip)

Ran I J: Ranau Number 1 Jungle Camp (near Sinarus)

Ran 2J: Ranau Number 2 Jungle Camp (near 110 mile peg, Tambunan track, about 5 miles south of Ranau)

RC: may have died during rice carrying from Ranau-Paginatan, as date of death coincides with one of the trips.

San 1: Sandakan Number ! Camp

San 2: Sandakan Number 2 Camp (Note: The British moved from this camp to the Number 1 Camp on about 15 April 1945. All survivors left behind after the second march then moved back again, to a wired section of the Number 2 on 29 May)

San 2A: original Number 2 British Camp, at air-

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Appendix 1: Nominal Rolls

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Sandakan, Ranau and Track Deaths

The Nominal Rolls of the 1787 Australians and 641 British known (or believed) to have died in Sandakan, Ranau or on the track, have been compiled from many primary sources, including translations of Japanese records. The records for the Australian POWs are quite extensive and consist of information collated from record cards held at Kuching, records found at various camps, death certificates, running sheets, and a death roll. Unfortunately, records relating to British POWs are not nearly as comprehensive.

Evidence from survivors and the identification of various remains show that the Australian records are generally reliable. However, some entries on the death roll (a document hastily compiled on the orders of 9th Division shortly after the Australians gained control of the west coast), are a complete fabrication. Translations show that, while death roll entries compiled from records held at POW headquarters or from informarion relayed directly from a POW camp, are accurate, all death roll dates relating to deaths at the Number 2 Compound for June and July, when communication to HQ was restricted, or for those who escaped or 'disappeared', are not. On the other hand, death roll dates (the only record available) for Ranau after Dr Jeffrey became ill, and before the arrival of the second march, appear to be accurate and agree with information provided by survivors. All Ranau death roll dates between 26 June and 29 July are accurate and agree with all other records. Those for August are false.

Records often include date of birth, as well as full name, rank, nationality, POW number, date of onset of illness, place and date of death. The format differs slightly, depending on whether the record is classified as a 'Diagnosis Sheet of Dead Person' or a 'Certificate of Identity'. An analysis of surviving paperwork shows that those signed by Captain Takakuwa relate to POWs on the second march despite the fact that, for many of them, the place of death is given as East Coast Residency and/or Sandakan.

Owing to the fragmented nature of British records some information is conflicting or uncorroborated. In these cases the data deemed to be the most accurate has been selected. Note: The British were moved from the airstrip on 18 August 1943, and to the Number 1 Camp in April 1945, about six weeks before the second march left. The date selected for this latter move for the purposes of this roll is 15 April. Note also that for a large number of British POWs there is no information other than the death roll.

An analysis of corroborated information (that is, any information not marked as being Death

Roll only) shows that place of death and date fall into line with expected numbers. For example, it is known that there were 2428 who died at Sandakan, on the track or at Ranau. The number who left on the two marches was 455 (first) and 536 (second). As eight returned (three from first and five from second), another 75 left on a third march, at least ten died outside the camp (escaped or at the hands of the Kempei-tai) and one was cremated by the guards, the number of POWs who die at Sandakan should be in the vicinity of 1359 (NB: remains of 1358 have been recovered). If the questionable numbers are added to the firm Track/Ranau deaths, these totals also fall into line. Nevertheless, it is not possible to establish where these occurred nor determine how many of the dates are false. However, from the information available on the Australians, it appears that the majority of those who went on the third march were British.

As much of the information used to compile these rolls was not available in 1946, details may be different from the officially accepted records. Where additional details, provided by survivors or gathered from investigation documents, dovetail with other records, they have been included.

The Nominal Rolls for Sandakan, Ranau and the track have been compiled under the headings which follow.

Name: name of POW.

Force (Australian Roll): the force to which the POW was attached -B or E, from Singapore; J/ E for those captured in Java and then sent to Kuching, where they joined E Force. 'Br' has been added to the two Australians who remained in the British camp. (The third was transferred to Labuan.)

- (British Roll): An 'A' or 'R' indicates whether the POW was British Army or RAF.

State (Australian Roll only): the state in which the POW enlisted (including one from New Guinea-NG), or, in the case of the sailors, RAN (Royal Australian Navy); and the lone airman, RAAF (Royal Australian Air Force).

Number: the POW number allotted to each prisoner by the Japanese. Some postcards sent by POWs bear this number on the top right hand corner.

Age: age at death.

Date: date of death, taken either from death certificates, POW record cards or, in a few cases, the death roll. The death roll alone is not reliable. Where no further corroborative evidence is available, all entries marked with 'DE' should be treated with caution.

Place: place of death. (See Key to Roll).

Buried: place where body would have been buried or recovered. (See key below to identify where WORK PLT

We are submitting this proposal for your consideration when you meet to decide what the beach at East Ballina should be called Our family were among the first settlers in Ballina as it is commonly known today or should I say and pronounced "BUL-LOONah" because that what its name was, an old aborginal name meaning, "mouth of the River" and that beach at East Ballina would have been there. my Great uncle Charles garrett known as the Cedar King and also was the second Mayor of Ballina We would like to think of our local soldiers that died on the Sandakan death marches along with over 2,500 who died on them yes like my brother William Charles Smith and not forgetting all the others especially all the ones from areas around Balling quite a few, a list of some of them are in one of the photos sive put in who gave their lives fighting for us to be free. as boys I know my brother and I including some of the others in the shoto swam, fished and helped out fathers pull in the fishing nets full of sea mullet that coved that beach great memories. I'm now 86 and have two sisters still alive Matie now go andmy sister Norma gi and we have never heard that beach called the Kiosh Beach The Krosk was a meeting place where we would meet up with our mates to change into our swimmers at a cost of one henry But we would often change in the toilet Block if the Council ranger wasn't around to chatch is (Sorry) No we nevernever got caught

. The sandakan memorial Beach 25, 8 2019 then we would go over to the main beach crossing shows bay shallow end with our clothes held over our heads. I would like to point out to you that our soldiers from Ballina are on an Honour list in another Country The Labuar memorial cemetery. The location of the noll of Honout is there my brother is located at panel 44 died on the 7th June 1945 (NO KNOWN GRAVE) Their names are on plagues in other N.S. W towns. In Tamworth in a beautiful park called ANZAC PARK there is a min-- vature mountain range coving the track though the jungle where our soldiers lost their lives. Tenterfield Moutland and in Lismore there is a beautiful Stained window in the Church of England put in there a few years ago Plus the Monument near the Lismore Baths dedicated to the Sandakan Soldiers by the then Governor General Quentin Bryce to which I was unvited to represent our family along with Robert Smith, including all the families who lost their loved ones Husbands Sons Brothers and sweethearts they were all present for the Governor general to dedicate the Monument to the Soldiers of Sandahan our soldiers from Ballina So why not in their own town of Ballina where they were born There is nothing so please don't miss this great oppunity to show our appreciation and do this for them and I'm sure that the new -governot-general would be very happy to bethe offical government representative to dedicate our weach to-honour our soldiers in this way We owe our freedom and Safety to them Honout them Robert C. Further to the recent articles in the newspaper, I would like to make the following comments in relation to the beach near Missingham Bridge:

- In the 60 years that I can remember using Ballina as our beach, we have never known anyone to refer to it as Kiosk Beach.
- This area has been known as Shaws Bay Beach (or Shaws Bay near the old Kiosk steps for locals) as opposed to the Shaws Bay lagoon.
- After consultation with the people who were contracted to Council to run
 the Shaws Bay Caravan Park from 1988 to 2003 and had just moved out of
 the Kiosk at the time the storm demolished the premises in 2001, they also
 have never heard it referred to as Kiosk Beach.
- These people have a close association with the Shaws Bay or Shaws Bay beach and were responsible for planting the large pine tree next to the weather shed at Shaws Bay beach in 1989.
- We think that the historical naming should be preserved so that it is officially known as Shaws Bay beach.

I look forward to Council's deliberations as a result of community submissions.
