Executive summary



A vision for a community open space that has something for everyone.

The master plan sets out a long-term vision for revitalisation of Kingsford Smith Reserve including, Kingsford Smith, Missingham and Commemoration parks. The plan offers a strategic tool for future investment and implementation that will deliver unprecedented community benefit with new facilities, amenity and activities connected by a new network recreation loops.

Kingsford Smith Reserve will bring the community together in an integrated sports and recreation parkland that celebrates our natural waterfront setting.



Why Master Plan Kingsford Smith Reserve?

Kingsford Smith Reserve provides a unique waterfront recreation and sporting precinct for the community of Ballina to enjoy. Made up of Commemoration Park, Missingham Park and Kingsford Smith Park, the precinct offers regional significance as the home of a number of community sporting teams. With some NSW Government funding currently available, the purpose of this master plan is to outline a vision for the future and ensure that any short-term investment is in line with the intent and long-term aspirations for the parkland.

As part of the master planning process we engaged with the key users and general community and the following issues and opportunities have been identified;

- Club house improvements and new facilities
- Sports field and surrounds upgrades, including lighting, amenity, shade and carparking
- Greater connectivity around the parks with new recreation loops
- Additional playgrounds and opportunities for social gathering by the waterfront
- Retention and enhancement of natural landscape
- Skate park expansion
- Space and infrastructure for community events
- Improved safety throughout the parkland

Kingsford Smith Reserve Master Plan

The master plan will look at ways to outline potential revitalisation measures and create a precinct that is not only loved by the local community, and supports significant high profile sporting events and regional visitation.

It is not expected that the master plan will be implemented in one go, but will provide an overarching vision and intent, along with an implementation strategy for new and improved recreational activities that can be implemented over time. The master plan will identify areas of potential expansion and focus on providing new facilities and infrastructure that align with the broader recreational needs of Ballina and its community.



Strategic context

BALLINA FAIR SHOPPING CENTRE

An enviable waterfront setting that bookends the island of Ballina with a green peninsula


Ballina is a regionally significant growth area and 'Strategic Centre' under the North Coast 2036 Regional Plan. Its continued strategic growth as the social and commercial hub of the Northern Rivers region is defined by its people and strong community ties. Its community is warm and welcoming and the lifestyle is laid-back, active and family orientated.

Kingsford Smith Reserve is strategically positioned on the waterfront peninsula, forming a gateway for those traveling through East Ballina. Providing 20Ha of open space, the reserve is a important community asset and with revitalisation, has the ability to transform into a regionally significant parkland that supports the needs and desires of the community. Its revitalisation will support the continued implementation of our Local Strategic Plannning vision (2020-2040) to deliver public spaces and built environments that celebrate local character, and provide ample opportunity for connection to culture, people, place and country.

As part of broader network of parks and sporting facilities, Kingsford Smith Reserve provides the community with access to open space and diverse recreational opportunities. Within this network, Kingsford Smith Reserve will have a specific role in the town's suite of open spaces that specifically respond to sports, recreation and leisure opportunities. In addition to the strategic location of Kingsford Smith Reserve, it is also identified within Ballina Shire Sports and Recreation Facility Plan with series of key recommendations that align to broader open space considerations within Ballina.

Our site

In order to best understand how we can improve and enhance the function and environment of Kingsford Smith Reserve, we must first understand its key characteristics. The following pages summarise key features of the three separate parks and the potential opportunities for revitalisation in parallel with community engagement outcomes.

Master Plan Area

There are three areas of focus of the Master Plan of Kingsford Smith Reserve - Kingsford Smith Park, Missingham Park and Commemoration Park. Together the three parks form the master plan area that currently provides the community with much loved open space.

Each park provides complimentary uses that support the creation of a 'park of parks' that supports the whole community. The site also has a strong connection to water with access to North Creek, Richmond River and Kingsford Smith Lake which is a defining feature of all parks.



Sub-Area Role and Function

Each of the parks have a specific primary focus and function that is to be enhanced through the master planning process. In addition to this parks primary role and function, the parks also provide secondary uses that support park activation and utilisation.

The table opposite provides an overview of current park functions and the ancillary uses that occur.

What we see at Kingsford Smith Reserve?

The following images represent the unique character of Kingsford Smith Reserve - picturesque views, amazing native vegetation and rolling lawns and a number of opportunities for revitalisation to provide even better facilities and amenity for everyone.



Site Characteristics and Opportunities

Views

Kingsford Smith Reserve presents long views across the Sports Fields from most aspects of the park. There is an opportunity to frame the sporting field views with vegetation and enhance the sporting viewing experience through land form and shade. The lake is currently shielded by vegetation including long grasses that if opened will provide views and casual surveillance from the surrounding areas to the waterbody.

Access and parking

Vehicle access for parking is currently limited to Bentinck Street. This internal parking area serves the whole precinct and presents a number of safety issues with pedestrian crossings between the fields and the sports amenity building. Street parking is available along all surrounding streets on the verge but could be formalised to support access. Additional parking areas and re-configuration will provide a safer environment and will provide more direct access for the different sporting precincts.

Kingsford Smith Park

Pedestrian connectivity

Pedestrian connectivity is restricted by the fenced areas of the hockey field and senior rugby league oval. There is an opportunity to re align the fence line of the rugby league field to open up a connection through the centre of the park to the lake and through to Kingsford Smith Drive. The formalisation of pedestrian paths will also support desired movement and provide internal and external connections for recreation and access to the network of activity nodes.

Recreation and Amenity Network

Kingsford Smith Park primary role as a sporting facility is well arranged and provides the community with open space to general recreation. There is an opportunity to provide an additional level of utilisation through ancillary uses such a playground and gathering spaces to activate the lake and support the sporting function.

Landscape Vegetation

The park has limited canopy tree vegetation with should be provided for shade and comfort around the parkland. Around the lake the existing trees should be retained, and new understorey planting will provide greater views through to the lake and assist with CPTED issues.

Views

Both Missingham and Commemoration parks provide amazing views across Richmond River and North Creek. These views are open to the waterfront promenade but provide opportunity for more spaces to inhabit the waters edge and appreciate the site's aspect

Access and parking

Parking is limited to Missingham Park and street parking. There is opportunity to reconfigure the parking within Missingham park to create landscape space along the waterfront and provide better visibility of parking from Kingsford Smith Drive.

Pedestrian connectivity

Formalised pedestrian connectivity is limited to the waterfront and to access Missingham Bridge. By providing a secondary network of lower order paths, it will provide more accessibility to future spaces.

Recreation and Amenity Network

Both Missingham and Commemoration parks provide opportunities for passive and active recreation and spaces for social gathering. The parks infrastructure including pavilions, amenities and general opportunities for utilisation can be enhanced through new inclusions that support the desires of the community.

Landscape Vegetation

The natural vegetation along the waterfront provide significant environmental and ecological value that is to be retained and enhanced. The retention of trees and habitat creation is high priority in order to maintain natural processes and provide shade and comfort for users.



The above plan and table opposite provides a high level assessment and outline of areas of revitalisation to be considered in parallel with the community consultation process.



As a destination that brings the community together in an integrated sports and recreation parkland, Kingsford Smith Reserve will offer opportunities for play, leisure and social gatherings in a natural coastal environment that celebrates our enviable waterfront setting. It will be responsive to the natural environment and existing and future activity and will reflect our aspirations as a coastal community. It will acknowledge and celebrate the community's connection to the park and provide an environment that everyone can enjoy.

Kingsford Smith Reserve will provide unprecedented sports, recreation and leisure opportunities within one destination. Defined by an active landscape that embodies both natural ecosystems and a community parkland, Kingsford Smith Reserve will be a place where everyone comes together.

Kingsford Smith Reserve will also be a place of discovery and play - a place surrounded by fauna and flora that connects a true natural setting to a sports and leisure destination. New or renovated sports amenity building, new facilities and amenities, new playgrounds, new gathering spaces and family zones will be connected by a network of new active recreation paths.

Place Themes

SPORTS

Enhance the ongoing role of Kingsford Smith Park as a sporting hub



Rationale

Community sports will remain the key focus of Kingsford Smith Reserve. As a park that houses Rugby League, Cricket, Hockey and Netball, it will provide new and improved facilities that supports the growth of each sporting group and the playing, training and spectator experience within the parkland.

Master Plan Actions

A.1	Improve sporting facilities to create a greater playing and spectator experience
A.2	Co-locate facilities to maximise utilisation and activation
A.3	Transform sports fields surrounds into parkland to provide shade and shelter
A.4	Re-organise parking across the parkland to improve accessibility and safety
A.5	Provide new and enhanced facilities to peak sporting association standards for the growth of community sport and active lifestyles.



LEISURE

Breathe new life into the parkland with new social spaces that support our coastal lifestyle



Rationale

Across all the three individual parklands a multitude of new social spaces will be inserted into the landscape to provide opportunities to come together or to find a space for respite. The insertion of pavilions, seating and breakout lawns will add a new layer of vibrancy and activation to the parkland that works within the existing natural landscape.

Master Plan Actions

B.1	Provide opportunities for social gathering
B.2	Create flexible spaces that embrace the waterfront setting
B.3	Provide sheltered seating and passive leisure spaces
B.4	Create new pockets of landscape that allow for exploration and discovery

RECREATION

Facilitate variety of active recreation opportunities and improve opportunities for recreation across the parkland



Rationale

Both individually and as a whole, Kingsford Smith Reserve will provide a series of renovated and new recreation opportunities that are connected by a safe network of paths that provide connectivity across the three parks.






Landscape Character



Materiality

The hardscape of Kingsford Smith Reserve will create a truly coastal setting that is defined by sandy tones and coastal textures. The application of the material palette will be create a consistent character across the reserve.



Play

Across the parkland, a combination of formalised play products, nature play and sports and exercise equipment will be used to create a variety of play experiences. All play will cater for children of all ages and ability and provide seating adjacent to playgrounds for surveillance by parents.



Landscape Elements

The urban elements and furniture will bring a uniqueness and quality into the public realm that celebrates Kingsford Smith Reserve as unique precinct. The overarching strategy for the urban elements and furniture is to add visual delight to the environment that ties into the character of the surrounding context.

Lighting will be utilised to maximise a dramatic effect by strongly illuminating key landscape elements such as sports amenity facilities, pavilions and playgrounds but will ensure it does not have a detrimental affect to night time fauna activity.

Commemoration park

Commemoration Park will celebrate the coastal setting through a sculptural landscape of meandering planting and unstructured paths, mounded lawns and a central open space. Set on the banks of North Creek, it will provide a natural picturesque landscape for social gatherings and small local events to unfold.

Commemoration Park builds on its current qualities to create a sculptural landscape that performs in a number of ways. It builds on the established landscape and to create a meandering body of vegetation that creates pockets of mounding lawn. These lawns provided passive breakout spaces for social gatherings in shaded areas with views over North Creek. With a central "market lawn" as the centre of the parkland, unstructured paths define the space and provide connections through to the waterfront from Bentinck Street. The waterfront is activated through seating and shelters and a widened promenade that cuts into the parkland to create pockets of lawn on the waters edge.

As a sculptural landscape that speaks to a coastal setting,
Commemoration Park showcases native vegetation for the community to engage with and learn about.

Social gathering are supported by shade structures with seating, BBQs, shaded lawns and sculptural play pieces, which also provide additional amenity for the expansion of the Markets across the Parkland.

Missingham Park will be a place thriving with fun-filled activity, by both day and night. From an urban skate park to a series of playscapes set within the trees, it will provide a network of connected social gathering spaces and experiences that encapsulate the communities desire for a family orientated parkland.

Missingham Park forms the centrepiece of the waterfront parkland. The variety of experiences provided within the parkland compliment the waterfront setting and natural landscape. Its enviable natural setting will be enhanced through an interlaced web of functional open spaces, outdoor rooms and playgrounds that create and encourage interaction within the community

Together, the spaces and variety of offering will provide multiple opportunities for cultural and community engagement and fun. Through its revitalisation it will deliver a destination parkland where you can enjoy comfort and shade of the natural landscape in a family friendly setting.

Key Elements

- Waterfront lawn for community events with new stage and amenities
- A series of play spaces, including the feature adventure playground themed around a 'casuarina forest'
- Social gathering pavilions adjacent to breakout lawns and play spaces
- Expanded skate park with street skate plaza and scooter track
- Half court Basketball court and space for community exercise
- Waterfront promenade with seating
- Improved pathway network and access throughout the park
- Retain significant trees and habitat areas





Kingsford Smith Park

Kingsford Smith Park will be a regional sporting hub and Ballina's heart of community sport and leisure. With new sporting facilities set within landscaped spaces and an activated lake, a full spectrum of uses will be integrated into the parkland to unlock its potential as multifunctional open space.

Kingsford Smith Park will be reinvigorated with new sporting amenity buildings, infrastructure and surrounds to position it as the regions premier sporting parkland. Its sporting offer will be complimented with the insertion of recreation loops that connect in and around the lake to activate its edges and surrounds. Nature play, landscape pavilions and breakout lawns will create a destination in itself and position Kingsford Smith Park as a multifunction sports and recreation parkland.

Key Elements

- New shared sporting amenities and change rooms.
- Reconfigured parking to provide better access to sporting destinations and provide a safer environment
- Additional landscape to provide shade and comfort for spectators
- Shelters for all season viewing
- Nature play set within the trees
- Infrastructure to activate the space; the pump track image shown is indicative and there are many other options that could be considered here, such as reinvigorating the memorial walk
- Recreation paths including a 1500m loop
- Landscape pavilions and breakout lawns
- Improved access to the lake for existing leisure activities

Part E

Costs and Priorities

The Master plan provides a framework for future planning and investment at Kingsford Smith Reserve that over time will become the regions most significant community parkland.

The previous sections of the document set out the long-term vision for Kingsford Smith Reserve. The plans and images within it effectively convey the overall intent, without being so prescriptive as to prejudice design changes over time. It is the intent of the master plan to set out the overall vision and key actions to be delivered as funding become available. The master plan will be used to guide future planning, detailed design and provide a framework for staged delivery.

Based on the master plan drawings, funding of the long-term master plan would be approximately \$25M*. This includes higher order costs as below;

- 1. Kingsford Smith Park \$15M*
- 2. Missingham Park \$7M*
- 3. Commemoration Park \$3M*

The first stage of delivery is based on \$3,600,000 of available funding. This investment into Kingsford Smith Park is specifically for improvement and upgrades to sporting facilities. Based on community consultation and key action of the master plan the priority projects include;

- 1. Lighting improvements
- 2. Change room / amenity improvements to bring in line with current sporting access, equity and inclusivity guidelines;
- 3. Grandstand improvements

- 4. Netball facility upgrades
- 5. Surface improvements
- 6. Carparking upgrades

While these projects are the priority, detailed design and cost planning is required to better define the detailed scope of Stage 1. Council will continue to work with community groups and government to attract additional funding to support the delivery of more priority projects identified in this master plan. All future stages of work are currently unfunded.
