



Rex Kemp - a man for all seasons.


On 4th May, Group Captain Rex Kemp of the Rural Fire Service was invited to the RFS Headquarters at Homebush to meet Commissioner Shane Fitzsimmons. Rex and his wife Marlene flew to Sydney and joined a small select group of firefighters chosen for exemplary conduct. They were welcomed by a pipe band and the Minister for Emergency Services the Hon. Steve Whan, MP.

Rex joined the Wardell Brigade in 1990. He became Deputy Captain in 1992 and Senior Deputy Captain the following year. Because of his demonstrated instructional ability, he was elected a Group Captain in 1997. He has led numerous strike teams in "out of area" deployments, including the Sydney and Northern Tableland Fire Storms and the Canberra Bush Fires. One of his greatest interests is in training. He trains the district Basic Fire-fighters, Advanced Fire-fighters, and Crew Leaders. He is a specialist instructor in chainsaw operations and safety, and is an advanced driving instructor for heavy vehicles.

Commissioner Fitzsimmons presented Rex with the Commissioner's Commendation saying that Rex was a most worthy candidate for the award. Rex says that his prime concern is to see that volunteer firefighters get a fair go!



Late Albert Hersche

Mr Albert Hersche was a native of Switzerland and a very old resident of Bagotville, having selected a small area there about 1884. He was a well-educated man who left his country after a disagreement he had with his father about cutting down some trees. He planted a small vineyard for the late CT Bagot but he was a recluse who lived alone all those years, establishing a large bee farm.

Albert built a large telescope, purchasing the lens and completing the rest of the work himself. He took a great delight in studying the stars. He would converse with anyone who took an interest in astronomy and seemed very pleased to meet them.

He started to grow sweet potatoes on his farm at one time. When he was asked why he gave up cultivation, he replied in broken English: "During the night there comes there up the paddy melon and the bandicoot and eats there up the sweet potatoes. I will cultivate no more." After that he concentrated on bee keeping.

Albert was attacked one day by a mad bull. The writer of this article went to see him and noticed the ground torn up around the house. He asked him in a humorous manner if he had started to farm again. "Oh no," he said. "That vas te bull. If I could only have got my axe, I vood have lopped him." The house Mr Hersche lived in had galvanised iron sides and roof, so that in case of a bush fire, he would not be burnt.

The bull had come pawing up the dirt in front of his place in a very pugnacious manner. Hersche shouted out to him in Swiss. He wanted to get out to work among the bees. To use his own words: "Ven I go to ze front door, there vas ze bull, and when I go to ze back door, there vas ze bull, and there vas I in ze hut and ze bees a-svarming. Then thinks I to myself, I will boil up ze kerosene tins of water. When it vas on ze boil, I takes ze tin of water and goes to ze front door. Up comes ze bull and I shucks it all in his face and shuts ze door quickly. Tonder und blitzen. I thought ze Russians had come."



"See those holes in ze wall? That vos his horns. If I could only have got my axe, I vood have lopped him. And der vas I in my tin hut vile he tore up the ground all around, and I dare not open ze door and ze thermometer went to 100 degrees, 110 degrees, 120 degrees, 130 degrees; and not a drop of water to drink. I had shucked it all at ze bull. My tongue began to swell in my mouth. I thought I vas going to die of thirst. I vas so varm, so varm. But towards sun down ze bull leaves, and I runs down to my vell and drinks nearly von bucket of water. But ze bull goes down to McMahon and horned his boy through the lung. Mr George Law gets his gun and shoots ze bull. Ze boy has gone to Ballina hospital."

Hersche was a kindly unassuming man and, it is said, never did a bad turn to anybody, quietly keeping to himself and following up his hobbies.

Albert Hersche died 20.5.1935 aged 85 years and is buried in an unmarked grave in East Ballina Cemetery
