# Lennox Head Landcare - Malcolm Milner

#### Ballina Environment Society - Lyn Walker

# Report for Lennox Head Residents Assn Inc. Re Stabilising the Upper Level of Lake Ainsworth, Lennox Head.

Problems Caused by High Water Levels in the Lake.

- (A) Eastern Road to the Fitness Camp and Dog Off-leash Track becomes inundated causing:-
  - [1] If high enough causes diversion of traffic.
  - [2] Damage to the road surface.
  - [3] Erosion of the lake edge by killing grass which causes sandy soil to wash into the deeper areas of the Lake.
  - [4] Causes part or complete re-location of the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday Markets.
  - [5] Unwanted chemicals leach from the road surface and exposed road base into the Lake waters.
  - [6] Services to the Fitness Camp Water, Sewer and Telephone are located under the road if damage occurs underwater rectifying it could be a very difficult and costly affair and could cause further pollution of the Lake waters.
- (B) Elsewhere:-
  - [1] Killing grass cover on inundated areas around the Lake.
  - [2] Eroding the edges and washing the sand and soil into deeper areas of the Lake.
  - [3] Swamping park and picnic areas including picnic tables, fences etc.
  - [4] Damaging work that have been put in place to rectify previous depredations caused by high water levels i.e. retaining walls, walkways and steps.
  - [5] Eroding soil and sand from around the roots of established trees which causes growth problems and instability.
  - [6] The erosion that is caused moves sediments into the bed of the Lake and causes unwanted changes in the biological and chemical make up of the Lake's water.
  - [7] Compromises future planning for facilities around the Lake.

### Investigation of Possible Solutions for Stabilising the Upper Level of the Lake, (See Map)

(1) North western corner of the Lake where aerial surveying indicates and overflow waterway existed in the distant past and ran towards Camp Drewe.

On ground investigation found that the present extent of the Lake is only about 40 metres from where this old waterway is now covered by the Camp Drewe Road. The old waterway continues on the other side of the road to the fire trail beside Camp Drewe. However to pipe overflow water from the Lake to this point and then down the fire trail to Birong Creek would need deep excavation on the trail and in the NW section of the Lake and considerable destruction of vegetation here and across Camp Drewe road to the fire trail. This possibility was then ruled out.

(2) Pumping from the western side of the Lake to a header tank then under Camp Drewe Road then by gravity via pipes down the fire trail north of the Caravan Park to Birong Creek.


This would require the establishment of and intake basin in the Lake, pipes and pump to a header tank on the lake side of the Camp Drew Road. The water, by gravity feed, would be piped under the road, along the road verge to the fire trail, down the fire trail to an outlet basin on Birong Creek. This would not be very costly and would cause very little damage to the Lakeside or healthland vegetation.

The cost to the community and the Lake environment caused by high water is quite high. The nuisance caused is very frustrating to the community. From memory we recall at least four partial or complete inundations of the eastern road during the last twelve years. One of these caused the road to be closed for about three months. With changing weather patterns these occurrences seem to be escalating. We recommend that the above suggestion be further investigated by Council. Our Committee is willing to provide more information and assist in any way with an investigation.

#### Shaws Bay Escarpment - Erosion

The Shaws Bay escarpment area was inspected and informal access tracks were found to generate from the top of the escarpment at Richmond Park (Council Community Land) Lot 1 DP 1152892 extending down the steep sand escarpment to the grassed area at the bottom of the escarpment on the Ballina Coastal Reserve Lot 529 DP729629.

There were a number of tracks found, however two tracks were found to be the primary tracks used. Judging from the tracks found on the paths the users include pedestrians, pushbikes and motorbikes.

The tracks contained some very steep sections with some very significant erosion cuts formed by the use at several locations causing much sand to be shifted down the escarpment. Many tree roots were exposed and rubbish that included wooden pallets, carpet and logs had been placed in locations to slow erosion.

Information from the public has identified that a commercial Boot Camp operator has been using the tracks.

Signage is in place at the top of the escarpment in Richmond Park and the bottom of the escarpment prohibiting motorbike usage.

Motorbikes using the Shaws Bay escarpment have been and continue to be targeted with assistance from Council's Rangers, Police and residents tipping off the Rangers and police when the motorbikes are onsite.

The area is also being used as a play area for kids and bikes for downhill runs.

One of the tracks is well used by pedestrians and possibly residents from the top of the escarpment area accessing Shaws Bay indicating a possible need for a formal walking track/stairs in that area.

## **Management Options**

#### Closure of track

Closing the track will be possible but hard to maintain as the users of the existing tracks may move their usage to adjacent steep areas and remove vegetation causing further erosion.

Signage restricting access should also be used along with information to educate the public on the damage being done and encourage them to use a suitable formalised access and to not use this eroding informal track.

Boot camps will be advised to stop operating at this location as they should not be operating on any sand dune areas as per their commercial activity license conditions.

#### Formalisating a Path

Due to the steepness the construction of a track would require mostly steps with handrails. The existing winding track down the hill is approximately 120m long and is very steep passing under the canopy of littoral rainforest trees. To construct a path that meets the required construction and design standards the path may be longer and may require further vegetation clearing of littoral rainforest species to fit the track onsite.

A Review of Environmental Factors with complete flora, fauna and geotechnical assessment would be required for consent purposes prior to works beginning. Significant erosion control and

pier options would be required and to be structurally certified to meet the required Australian Standards.

Should a composite fibre and recycled plastic track be considered it could be raised off the ground with handrails and would minimise disturbance to the steep slope and vegetation. It is anticipated that a composite fibre and recycled plastic track would be costed at approximately \$300,000 including all assessments and engineering specifications, materials and installation. Composite fibre and recycled plastic steps would have low maintenance costs and have a lifespan well exceeding 50 years.

Should raised <u>timber stairs</u> with handrails be considered, it too could be constructed above ground minimising disturbance to the steep slope and vegetation. A timber track/stairs would be costed at approximately \$240,000 including design, materials and labour. Timber steps would have medium to high maintenance costs and have a lifespan of 15 - 30years. They would also be at risk from fire vandalism.

Should <u>concrete stairs</u> with handrails be considered, it would be anticipated that the track costs including labour would be approximately \$80,000 including approvals, materials and labour. The disturbance to the site and vegetation would be significant with the construction of a concrete stairs. Concrete construction would provide low maintenance and have a lifespan exceeding 50 years.

#### **Alternative Paths**

There are presently two other formalised and semi-constructed tracks leading up and down the Shaws Bay escarpment. One is to the west of the Lighthouse Beach SLSC site and the other opposite Shaws Bay adjacent to the Sandbar Café. Several other informal, less eroding, tracks exist at other locations along the escarpment that are infrequently used by residents.

#### Recommendations

Given the expense of all of the options to formalise a new path, the environmental impact of construction work, the level of usage of an additional path and along with the presence of existing tracks it is considered that the option of formalising a new path is unrealistic.

#### Immediate Actions:

- Close and rehabilitate the track accesses with fencing and signage.
- Advice boot camp operators they cannot use this site and must only use formalised accesses.
- Promote to the public the other formalised accesses on the escarpment via signage and education.
- Target motorbikes using the area with the assistance of residents, Council Rangers and the Police.
