Council has previously resolved to submit a response and a key part of that response will be the royalty to be paid to the NSW State Government for any material removed from North Creek.

d) Dredging – Ballina Boat Harbour

f) North Wall Breakwater - Raising the Crest

Council's engineering staff have expressed concerns with respect to the type of works being proposed by the State Government. Correspondence between Council and the local member, Mr Don Page, is attached for information.

Even with the latest response from Mr Page there still remain concerns and the Council staff are continuing to investigate this to ensure that the works provide the optimum outcome for the community.

g) Better Boating Program (BBP) Grants

As previously advised Council has received funding under the BBP to construct a new boat ramp at Keith Hall Lane, a new car park at the Fishery Creek boat ramp and to complete a master plan for the Regatta Avenue precinct.

Dear Sir / Madam,

In a recent information evening involving this club and other Angling groups within the shire, we were told of Ballina Shire Council intention to dredge North Creek in the not too distant future. This information came as a complete surprise to everyone attending the meeting and immediately raised serious concerns for the future of fish and fishing on the Richmond

Briefly, some background on why we are concerned

The evening was about the decline in fish stocks within the Richmond (both commercial take and recreational take) and possible reasons for this decline. Our guest speaker for the evening was Craig Copeland of the NSW Fisheries Conservation Action Unit. Although we all knew the importance of habitat for survival of juvenile fish and a continued healthy fishery, we were astonished to learn that two thirds of the Richmond's habitat has vanished over the past four decades due to various reasons he outlined on the evening.

North Creek is one of the few remaining key sensitive habitat areas to provide refuge and growth for multiple marine species, benthic organisms and of course juvenile finned fish.

To this end could you please respond to the following concerns raised on behalf of the Richmond Valley Anglers Action Group (RVAAG) and the Ballina Fishing Club.

1. For what purpose does the dredging need to occur and what was the consultative process that led to this decision (we presume there was one)

- 2. We believe 'boating movements' in North Creek was one possible reason. Which boating group or organization approached council re dredging? Our records show that James Foster, consultant with GHD (engaged by council in 2005) recommended in his report regarding North Creek that this area be a 'retreat boating' type area for small tinnies, canoes etc given it's environmental sensitivity. Can you please confirm
- 3. What is the sediment type being targeted for dredging in the Creek and where is it located
- Can you provide details to the writer of this submission exactly where you intend to carry out these dredging operations in North Creek and proximity to existing sea grass beds
- Referencing your consultative process prior to making your decision to dredge, what will be the impact on benthic organisms, water quality and sea grass beds, all essential to supporting remaining fish life in the Richmond
- 6. Again, referencing your consultative planning process, how long do the engineers predict the post dredging profile to remain before the Creek reverts to its original profile?

In summary, we are sure that all councillors are aware of the fact that the Ballina business community will become increasingly dependent on the tourist trade and resultant income given that the town is now bypassed. A significant drawcard for many a visiting family (holiday or otherwise) has always been their ability to fish while staying here. As earlier stated, the Richmond fishery has been in decline and may soon start to impact on those folk who choose Ballina as their fishing/holiday destination.

Dependent on the extent and location of this proposed dredging, we have major concerns as to the sustainability and preservation of this remaining important habitat area given the already fragile state of the Richmond in general. We (RVAAG) would be happy to meet with council representatives to discuss

Re: Dredging - North Creek

In response to your letter dated 31 March 2014 I wish to advise as follows.

Council has expressed an interest with NSW Trade and Investment (Crown Lands) in respect to dredging North Creek, primarily in the area from Missingham Bridge to just north (or north west) of Prospect Bridge.

The reasons for Council's interest are three fold.

- Firstly to address the current silting of this area. Council is of the opinion that this is resulting in reduced or limited access for recreational boats.
- · Secondly to reuse any sand removed as fill for Council works or for possible for on-sale.
- Thirdly to address any environmental issues that may be occurring due to the on-going narrowing of this waterway.

In respect to the process to dredge North Creek, Crown Lands has advised that prior to any dredging, they are required to call expressions of interest (EOI) for the licence.

Any interested party will be able to respond to that EOI process and Crown Lands will then assess all responses to determine whether they will provide a licence. The initial licence is a licence to investigate.

The investigation licence then allows the successful party to pursue all the necessary environmental and planning approvals that are required before any dredging can take place. The estimated expenditure to try and obtain these approvals can vary from \$50,000 to \$300,000, dependent on the level of analysis, research and modelling needed. If planning approval to dredge is then obtained, and there is no guarantee that an approval will be forthcoming, Crown Lands can then issue a licence to that party to operate the dredge.

The above process is extensive and could take many months, if not years. Therefore your comment that Council will be dredging in the "not too distant future" is incorrect and it may well not be Council at all who eventually dredges this location, assuming any dredging occurs.

The following information now addresses the six points in your letter.

- 1. The purposes are outlined earlier. In respect to the consultative process, from my observation Councillors have had a number of people personally raise their concerns in respect to North Creek. The Council's Port Ballina Taskforce, which consists of Councillors and representatives from the Ballina Chamber of Commerce, the Ballina Fishermen's Co-op, Ballina Professional Fishermen, NSW Premier and Cabinet and private individuals have all supported this proposal.
- There is no record of any "boating group or organisation" approaching Council. Rather there appears to have been private citizens communicating their concerns and the Councillors themselves, from their own experiences and observations, supporting this proposal.
- 3. Council has undertaken no research into this matter.
- Only a broad area has been identified, as per the introduction to this letter, and the exact location will only be confirmed if planning approvals are obtained.
- This issue will be considered as part of any planning approval process.
- Council has undertaken no research into this matter.

It appears that your questions have been based on the assumption that Council will be shortly dredging this location. As per this correspondence there is an extensive process to be followed and all the various environmental, social and economic considerations will need to be assessed before any approval to operate is issued.

As it is still only very early in this process, rather than meeting with Councillors, I would encourage a member of your group to meet with representatives from the Port Ballina Taskforce, as this group is playing a lead role in helping Council seek improved marine outcomes for Ballina, both from an environmental and social perspective. When the Ballina Cruising Yacht Club was discussing problems with the entrance to the Richmond River a member mentioned a solution suggested by Evans Head professional fisherman (the late) Evans Paddon. In his younger days Paddon was a Single Sculls World Champion rower.

I was asked (as secretary) to contact Mr Paddon, seek his views, and report back to the next monthly meeting of the club. My recall of the substance of our conversation was as follows ...

- 1. Ballina has an excellent port.
- 2. Usage of the port is restricted by problems at the entrance to the river. Ideally mariners wishing to visit Ballina need to be able to enter the port at whatever time and under whatever sea conditions they arrive. Similarly they need to be able to leave port at the desired time. Neither condition can be guaranteed because of the vagarities at the entrance. (A flat bottomed naval vessel was detained in port for three days due to conditions at the bar).
- 3. Under adverse conditions entering the river with a following sea can be a hazardous exercise especially for sailing craft. With the majority of winds blowing from the south in bad weather use of the port is sensibly restricted. This is especially true for vessels wishing to seek shelter in bad weather.
- 4. There is a large fleet of recreational vessels on the Gold Coast whose owners could make the day trip to Ballina and stop over for a long weekend or so but are deterred for the above reasons.
- 5. Paddon believed that the entrance could be made permanently safe by extending the south wall easterly in a gentle curve to the north until opposite a line extended eastward from the north wall. He maintained that the inshore counter current which flows south to north combined with the outgoing river current during the ebb tide would keep the entrance permanently free from build up of sand.
- 6. He gave the geography of the entrance to the Hunter River at Newcastle as an example ... Nobby's Head serves the function of an extended south wall and creates an all weather port.
- 7. Vessels would then enter the river travelling south, parallel to the shore and head to wind ... a much safer manoeuvre especially for sailing craft.
- 8. In answer to the suggestion that a bar would form in a northerly direction from the end of the extended south wall Paddon maintained that the end of the extended wall would be in much deeper water than at present and the resulting turbulence would carry sand further north.

Paddon favoured testing his theory by an hydraulic model. When contacted the Southern Cross University lacked the necessary capability.

Re: Raising the Crest of Ballina North Breakwater

Council has recently received a copy of the plans prepared to facilitate the project to raise the crest of the Ballina North Breakwater. I am writing to seek your review of these plans as we hold concerns that the outcomes proposed are not consistent with our understanding of the community expectations which were expressed so strongly following the recent upgrade works at this site.


The plans show, copy attached, a narrow raised path surrounded by large rocks at the head of the breakwater. The main concerns are that the 3m wide path provides a small location for the public to access the space and view and the end of the wall. The existing situation provides a relatively flat area at the head of the breakwater that is about 9m wide and provides a place where the public can stop, chat, and park their bike or scooter. The proposal for a narrow path only will make the end of the raised path a very congested area and not meet the primary objective of the project to restore the lost amenity of this area.


As you are aware, the community use of the breakwater is popular and considered important. Having worked with you to secure the funds to address the concerns about the original project, we submit that it is necessary for the Government to review the proposed design to ensure that the project will meet community expectations.



I wish to acknowledge receipt of correspondence from Group Manager, Civil Services, Ballina Shire Council regarding the recent announcement to raise the crest of the Ballina North Breakwater.

I have noted Council's comments in relation to this project and appreciate these being brought to my attention.

I am advised the proposed works include a provision of 2m bitumen pathway and 1.5m of quarry run material either side of the pathway, i.e. 5m width plus placement of containment rock 2m wide either side between the edge of the quarry run material and concrete Hanbars i.e. 9m in total. The containment rock will 'sit' approximately 0.5 m above the level of the quarry run material to protect against wash out of material in a major storm event and wave overtopping.

This compares to the current 2m wide bitumen pathway and 3.5m of quarry run material either side of the bitumen pathway up to the edge of the concrete Hanbars i.e. 9m in total.

I am further advised that whilst the distance between the containment rock is 5m, the full 9m will be available for people to use if necessary.
