




Proposed Approval Mitigation Measures

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

General

- Works being carried out generally in accordance with the plans and associated documentation lodged by, or on behalf of, the applicant, including:
 - (a) Coastal Recreational Path Review of Environmental Factors Report No. DC13033
 Dated 16 May 2013 (Prepared by NSW Public Works) incorporating various consultant reports;
 - (b) Updated Blackwood Ecological Services Report Project No. Final Version 3 Dated 18 December 2013 and addendum File No. 1131/Let3 Dated 15 May 2014;
 - (c) Updated Geolink Detailed Design Drawing No's. 2165/101 to 2165/133 (inclusive) Dated 1 May 2014;
 - (d) Wagners Composite Fibre Technologies Lennox to Ballina Coastal Walk Project No. BW703 Dated 2 December 2013;
 - (e) Redbelly Landscape/Viewing Platform Plans Project Ref 13009, Issue C Drawing No's 1,2,3,4,7 and 8;
 - (f) Blackwood Ecological Services Compensatory Restoration Work Area, File No. 1031 Dated 14 April 2014,

except as modified by any ameliorative measures required to be implemented by this approval. Where there is any inconsistency with the REF and the specific requirements listed within this approval, the specific requirements listed within this approval shall prevail.

- A schedule of works including details on timing of all works and who is responsible for implementation of each phase of the works is to be provided to the Development and Environmental Health Group prior to construction commencing on any section or stage of the work.
- 3. Water flow regimes are to be maintained through the construction of the raised boardwalk sections of the path. This should include ensuring that potential barriers do not impede water flows through the Freshwater Wetlands on the Coastal Floodplain and the boardwalk is at a sufficient height to limit the accumulation of vegetation and debris under the structure.

PRIOR TO CONSTRUCTION WORK COMMENCING

The following requirements in this section of the approval must be complied with or addressed prior to commencement of construction works relating to the approved activity.

General

4. Prior to the commencement of work, a Project Manager is to be appointed, whose name and contact details are to be provided to the Development and Environmental Health Group. The Project Manager is to be responsible for ensuring the development is carried out in accordance with the required Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP) and all requirements of approval outlined

- within this notice. Prior to the work commencing the Project Manager is to inform the Development and Environmental Health Group in writing of the date of commencement of works on site.
- 5. A detailed Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP) prepared by or on behalf of the Project Manager is to be submitted to and approved by the Development and Environmental Health Group prior to commencement of works. The CEMP is to include (as a minimum) the measures identified within the REF, particularly the ecological amelioration and compensation measures outlined by Blackwood Ecological Services reports (Sections 5.3.1 to 5.3.6 inclusive) and the eight recommendations contained within the Converge Cultural Heritage Assessment, and the additional matters outlined within this approval.
- A conditional permit under Section 200 of the Fisheries Management Act 1994 for reclamation works within the Freshwater Wetlands on Coastal Floodplain is to be obtained prior to commencement of works on the elevated boardwalk section of the path.
- 7. If Crown consent as landowner is not provided prior to commencement of construction, the Crown Road components on the path are to be either:
 - (a) transferred to Council's control; or
 - (b) formally closed and consolidated into the surrounding Coastal Reserve No. 1010068 prior to any works within the Crown Road Reserves.

NSW Office of Environment & Heritage Aboriginal Cultural Heritage

- The applicant must comply with Part 6 of the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NPW Act), prior to commencing any ground disturbance or development works and during development works.
- 9. A Cultural Heritage Induction Program must be developed for the induction of all personnel and contractors involved in the construction activities on site. Records are to be kept of which staff/contractors were inducted and when for the duration of the project. The program should be developed and implemented in collaboration with the representatives of the local Aboriginal community.

Flora and Fauna

- 10. No clearing of vegetation is to be undertaken on either side of the existing track between Chainages 4185.000 and 4405.000 (i.e. Boulder Beach) other than for minimal trimming and lopping as required for suitable height clearances. Detailed plans of path widths in relation to existing vegetation are to be provided between these Chainages prior to commencement of construction.
- 11. Species selection for landscaping components of the proposal should be based on local native species appropriate to the planting situation, planting stock of local provenance and should not include horticultural selections. Final landscaping specifications are to be provided and approved by Council's Environmental Scientist.
- 12. A Vegetation Management Plan (VMP) is to be prepared and implemented, addressing protection and management of native vegetation during and post construction. Noxious weeds are to be managed as specified for their weed classes. (initial)

In areas of high conservation value vegetation and threatened species habitat, the VMP should address management of environmental weeds, enhancement of natural regeneration and plantings.

As part of the VMP, a compensation package is to be developed and implemented, accompanied by a management plan, aiming to replace native vegetation removed or modified in a ratio 10:1 for EEC or threatened species habitat and 3:1 for other native vegetation. The ratio should be applied on an area basis for wetland vegetation. Where compensatory actions other than planting are proposed, an appropriate relationship between the compensation to impact ratio should be demonstrated quantitatively. Alternatively, the use of offsetting principles developed by OEH, possibly to include application of the BioBanking calculator that underpins the NSW Government Biodiversity Banking and Offsets Scheme is recommended. Compensatory works are to take place at locations as specified in Blackwood Ecological Services Compensatory Restoration Work Area, File No. 1031 Dated 14 April 2014.

The VMP should be submitted to the Development and Environmental Health Group for approval prior to the commencement of construction.

Services

13. All services must be located prior to the commencement of construction.

Civil Works

- 14. Prior to the commencement of construction, engineering design drawings, for the proposed coastal recreational path, shall be submitted to and approved under Section 138 of the Roads Act 1993 and Section 68 of the Local Government Act 1993 for civil works. Details are to be in accordance with the current Northern Rivers Local Government Development Design and Construction Manuals and/or in accordance with other design requirements from Austroads and/or Roads & Maritime Services where specified.
- 15. A design audit of the proposed coastal recreational path alignment against relevant standards is to be submitted and approved by Council's Infrastructure Planning Manager prior to the issue of the Section 138 Certificate. The audit is to include a risk rating for any non conformance discovered during the audit process.
- 16. The design of all carparking and vehicular accesses are to be in accordance with the Australian Standard AS/NZS 2890.1:2004. Design plans are to be approved by Council's Infrastructure Manager prior to the issue of the Section 138 Certificate.
- 17. Where raised boardwalks are proposed within the road reserve, engineering design drawings and structural certification must be submitted to and approved prior to issue of the Section 138 Certificate.
- 18. Prior to the commencement of construction, the contractor must submit a completed copy of the "Notice of Commencement of Civil Development Work" form and a copy of their \$10M Public Liability Insurance Policy. Copies of the form are available from Council's website.
- 19. All traffic control shall be in accordance with the NSW Roads and Traffic Authority "Traffic Control at Works Sites Manual". A Traffic Control Plan must be prepared and

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- submitted by a person holding a current "Design & inspect Traffic Control Plan" qualification. The traffic control plan must be certified and include the designers Name & Certificate Number. Details are to be submitted prior to the commencement of construction.
- 20. All viewing platforms readily capable of being accessed by wheelchairs are to be provided with ramps compliant with Australian Standard 1428 and not stairs. Details are to be submitted prior to the commencement of construction.
- 21. Roofing design details are to be provided for the following viewing platforms:
 - (a) one of the two viewing platforms at the southern end of Sharpes Beach (Chainage 2000.000); and
 - (b) the viewing platform contained within the wetland area behind Boulder Beach (Chainage 4750.000).

Acid Sulfate Soils

22. Testing of the construction area suspected of being affected by acid sulfate soils (Acid Sulfate Soil Planning Maps – Class 5) must be carried out prior to the commencement of construction. If detected an Acid Sulfate Soil Management Plan shall be prepared by a suitably qualified person in accordance with the Acid Sulfate Soil Assessment Guidelines (Acid Sulfate Soil Management Advisory Committee, 1998). The Management Plan shall be submitted and is to be approved prior to the commencement of works.

<u>Signage</u>

23. Details of all proposed signage along the Coastal Recreational Path and/or carparks (other than those required under relevant Australian Standards and Austroads) are to be provided to Council's Development and Environmental Health Group prior to the commencement of construction. Particular regard is to be given to aboriginal cultural heritage interpretive signage in consultation with Registered Stakeholders.

DURING CONSTRUCTION

The following requirements in this section of the approval must be complied with or addressed during the course of carrying out the construction works relating to the approved activity.

General

24. The Project Manager is to submit to the Development and Environmental Health Group a progress report on the works' compliance with the CEMP within one month from the commencement of the works detailing the progress of the construction work and compliance with the CEMP and all requirements of approval. These reports are required to be submitted for the construction life of the project (and any civil or compensatory/offset vegetation work maintenance period) and at each nominated phase of the project (refer to Mitigation Measure No. 2 of this approval).

Amenity

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The hours of operation for any noise generating construction activity (including the delivery of materials to and from the site) on the proposed works are to be limited to within the following times:

Monday to Friday

7.00am to 6.00pm

Saturday

8.00am to 1.00pm

No noise generating construction activities are to take place on Sundays or public holidays

26. All work, including demolition, excavation and building work must comply with Australian Standard AS 2436:1981 Guide to Noise Control on Construction, Maintenance and Demolition Sites.

Civil Works

27. All civil construction works shall be completed in accordance with the minimum requirements of the Northern Rivers Local Government Development Construction

Traffic Control during Construction

28. All traffic control during construction shall be in accordance with the Roads and Traffic Authority - Traffic Control at Work Sites Manual and the certified traffic control plan. At least one person at the site must be qualified to "Apply Traffic Control Plans" (Yellow Card).

Air Quality

- 29. Dust shall be managed by water suppression, re-establishment of vegetation cover, stockpile management and halting works on site in extreme wind events. Further guidance can be sourced from 'No Dust No Fuss: Guidelines for controlling dust from construction sites' NSW EPA.
- 30. Suitable covering and protection is to be provided to all stockpiles to ensure that no material is removed from the site by wind, causing a nuisance to neighbouring properties.

Reinstatement of road verge

31. Any grass verge or footpath within the road reserve that is damaged as a result of development works on the site shall be immediately reinstated to a satisfactory and safe condition. This will involve the regrading of the disturbed area, turfing and topdressing.

NSW Office of Environment & Heritage Aboriginal Cultural Heritage

32. In the event that surface disturbance identifies a new Aboriginal object, all works must halt in the immediate area to prevent any further impacts on the object(s). A suitably qualified archaeological specialist and the representatives of the local Aboriginal community must be contacted to determine the significance of the object(s) and to develop an appropriate management strategy. The management

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strategy must comply with the provisions of the National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974. This may include avoiding impact, additional investigations and/or the submission of an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit application. The site is to be registered in the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) managed by OEH and the management outcome for the site included in the information provided to the AHIMS.

33. If human remains are located following surface disturbance, all works must halt in the immediate area to prevent any further impacts to the remains. The NSW Police are to be contacted immediately. No action is to be undertaken until the NSW Police provide written notification to the proponent. If the skeletal remains are identified as Aboriginal, the proponent must contact OEH's Environmental Line on 131 555 and representatives of the local Aboriginal community. No works are to continue until OEH provides written notification to the proponent.

Soils and Water

- 34. The applicant shall ensure that any fill material imported to the site for the proposed development shall only be obtained from other fill sources with approved testing. The supplier of the fill material must certify at the completion of the construction of the development that the material was free of contaminants, being natural or otherwise.
- 35. Soil erosion and sediment control measures shall be designed, installed and maintained in accordance with Managing Urban Stormwater – Soils and Construction, LANDCOM, March 2004. All disturbed areas shall be immediately stabilised and revegetated on completion of earthworks.

Dewatering

36. If dewatering is required a management plan for all dewatering activities on site shall be submitted to and be approved prior to the release of extracted water. The plan is to give consideration to the acid sulfate soils issues on site and the impact this may have on groundwater and dewatering activities proposed. Prior to the release of any water extracted during dewatering operations the test results and interpretation of results are to be submitted to and approved.

Dewatering activities may also require a license issued by the NSW Office of Water. If required a copy of the license is to be provided prior to extraction taking place.

Waste

37. All demolition, construction or the like waste is to be transported and disposed of to an approved waste facility. If alternative disposal methods are sought, the prior written approval of the Development and Environmental Health Group must be obtained.

Lighting

38. All external lighting to be installed and operated on site shall comply with the AS 4282:1997 "Control of the obtrusive effects of outdoor lighting".

Flora and Fauna

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- 39. Environmental safeguards outlined within the Blackwood Ecological Services report are to be implemented during and post construction to protect the adjacent environs from adverse environmental impact.
- 40. Measures are to be implemented to protect all native vegetation which is to be retained during the construction and operational (maintenance) phases of the project.
- 41. Where the coastal recreational path is proposed adjacent to high conservation value vegetation, particularly EEC Littoral Rainforest and Coast Cypress EEC, vegetation removal and trimming should be strictly limited to the extent documented by Blackwood Ecological Services reports.
- 42. Viewing platforms at Sharpes Beach north (Chainage 2940) and Boulder Beach wetland (Chainage 4750) are to be located to avoid any impact on Pandanus and Coastal Banksias respectively.

PRIOR TO OCCUPATION OR USE

Unless otherwise stated all development and works referred to in other sections of this approval are to be completed together with the following prior to occupation or use of the approved activity.

- 43. All civil works approved under Section 138 of the Roads Act 1993 and Section 68 of the Local Government Act 1993, are to be completed to the satisfaction of Council's Infrastructure Planning Manager prior to use. All works are to be completed in accordance with the Northern Rivers Local Government Development Design and Construction Manuals (as current at the time of construction works commencing).
- 44. Prior to use, the applicant shall submit a hard copy of a "Works-as-Executed" (WAE) drawing at scale of 1:500 in addition to a computer disk copy of the WAE information in AutoCAD and PDF format. The applicant shall be deemed to have indemnified all persons using such drawings against any claim or action in respect of breach of copyright.
- 45. Prior to the commencement of use, certification must be provided that all raised boardwalk structures have been provided in accordance with the approved Construction Plan lodged with the Section 138 application. This certification is to be provided by a suitably qualified Engineer familiar with all aspects of the project.
- 46. Additional signage is to be erected immediately prior to steep gradients of the pathway to provide suitable warning and alternative routes (where possible) for people with mobility issues and/or physical conditions.
- 47. Additional signage is to be erected along the pathway demonstrating that dogs must be leashed at all times and highlighting the presence of nesting or roosting shorebirds at certain locations.

Assessment of Development Application Using Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) Principals. Section 79C Planning and Assessment Act.

Recommendations;

Angels Beach Car Park needs to be designed like the Shelly Beach Car Park; a row of two parking bays that is open to The Coast Road. There needs to be a clear unobstructed view of the entire car park from The Coast Road. The current Angels Beach Car Park is a repeat location for steal from motor vehicles due to its isolation and lack of casual surveillance. The landscape between the car park and road needs to be cleared and flattened in order to achieve this. If people are going to park and leave their vehicles for an extended period it needs to be in an area that is safe and secure to do so.

- At the northern end of the Angels Beach car park, the access for emergency vehicles and fishermen (dusk till dawn) needs to be blocked to illegitimate users. This can be achieved with a folding bollard that can be unlocked with a key that is issued by council. These bollards are already in place further north along the track.
- Location markers to be placed along the shared footpath between the beach access points.
- Maintain the width of the path along the bends of the track to eliminate blind corners. This will reduce concealment spots and improve the visibility for bike riders and pedestrians.
- The shared footpath to go around the Flat Rock Tent Park and not through it. This will aid access control and reduce excuse making opportunities for thieves or trespassers.
- Police recommend the path continue north from the Tent Park, past the public toilets and along the existing path.
- Police strongly oppose the shared path travel along the Coast Road, Headlands Drive, Skennards Head Road or North Creek Road at any point;
 - o The shared path should be kept away from housing estates at all costs. A shared path through a residential area provides offenders with excuse making opportunities and also provides them with numerous escape routes. This has proved a problem in a nearby town where a bush walking track was built behind an existing housing estate. Since this track was built, the location has been used by offenders to break into houses, motor vehicles and dump stolen cars in the surrounding streets. They use the walking track to escape from police and evade detection. It also provides them with excuse making opportunities for being in the area in the first place.
- From Boulders Beach to Pat Morton Lookout the walkway should continue along the already existing mowed path rather than along The Coast Road to ensure the safety of the users of the path.

Re: Part V Application No. PF 2013/0009 coastal recreation path within Ballina LGA

Thank you for your letter of 26 June 2013 requesting that Fisheries NSW, a division within the Department of Primary Industries provide comment on the above mentioned Part V application.

Fisheries NSW acknowledges and supports the overarching proposal to construct a coastal recreation path in Ballina Shire Council and notes that the works triggers several different approvals within the EP&A Act 1979. This letter responds to those aspects relating to the Part V assessment. I have attached the letter from Fisheries NSW to Ballina Shire Council regarding the designated referral DA2013/195.

Fisheries NSW is responsible for ensuring that fish stocks are conserved and that there is "no net loss" of key fish habitats upon which they depend. To achieve this, the Aquatic Habitat Protection Unit assesses activities under Part 5 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 in accordance with the objectives of the Fisheries Management Act 1994, the aquatic habitat protection and threatened species conservation provisions in Parts 7 and 7A of the Act, and the Policy and Guidelines for Fish Habitat Conservation and Management (2013 Update). In addition Fisheries NSW is responsible for ensuring the sustainable management of commercial, quality recreational fishing and viable aquaculture within NSW.

Fisheries NSW considers that the proposed mitigation measures discussed within Report DC13033 (p66) and the Blackwood Ecological Services Review of Environmental Factors (p203) for the management of soils and disturbed areas in the Freshwater Wetland at chainage 4660 - 4870 should in order to best protect the wetland habitat values, involve work methods that minimise the footprint of the works and where disturbance is unavoidable employ active regeneration of appropriate native endemic wetland plant species.



It is also proposed that the current boardwalk design suggested within the application for the areas behind Flat Rock and Boulders be reviewed and modified so as to minimise the impact on waterflow. Fisheries NSW suggest a raise boardwalk design so as to decrease the impact on hydrology and fish habitat within the wetland. The elevated boardwalk structure should be designed at a height above natural water level that limits accumulation of vegetation and debris under the structure.

The works within the Boulders Wetland trigger section 200 of the *Fisheries Management Act* 1994 and necessitate that Ballina Shire Council obtain a conditional permit under that section before commencing the works. Another part of the coastal pathway (Shared Path – Skennars Head Road) will also trigger the need to obtain a section 200 permit. If the timing of these works are generally concurrent, ie within 12 – 24 months of each other Fisheries NSW recommends Council apply for a single permit that covers both sections.

RE: Ballina to Lennox Head Shared Path and Ballina to Lennox Head Coastal Recreational Path, Ballina LGA

I refer to your letters dated 25 and 26 June 2013 and an updated letter of 18 July 2013, relating to the above proposals and providing the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH) with an opportunity to make a submission in writing. The proposals were referred to OEH on the basis that the land affected is in part mapped as State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP) No. 14 Coastal Wetland and SEPP No. 26 Littoral Rainforest in accordance with the provisions of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 (EP&A Act).

OEH understands that these projects propose a new series of recreation paths to be constructed between Ballina and Lennox Head. The projects have been refined into two separate routes being (1) a Coastal Walk (known as the Coastal Recreational Path) and (2) a Shared Path closely aligning to The Coast Road.

OEH has reviewed the documentation and provides the following comments in relation to Council's environmental assessment of the proposal. These comments relate to SEPP 14 and SEPP 26 and broader biodiversity matters.

Biodiversity Offsets

OEH notes that vegetation removal will occur within the SEPP 14 area and the SEPP26 100m buffer area. The Environmental Impact Assessment (July 2013) for the Coast Walk and the Environmental Impact Statement (May 2013) for the shared pathway detail the direct and indirect impacts of the proposal on the SEPP 14 area, SEPP 26 area, Endangered Ecological Communities (EEC's), threatened species and their habitats. OEH acknowledges that the project has considered avoiding and mitigating impacts, however the proposal should also detail a comprehensive offset strategy to address all of the impacts. Although the direct impacts of the proposal are easily quantified for the 2-2.5 metre wide path, Ballina Shire Council has indicated that the project would require a six metre wide area of disturbance. All indirect impacts in relation to this area should also be incorporated into an appropriate offset.

OEH recommends that Council considers the offsetting principles developed by OEH in formulating an appropriate offset strategy. These principles provide a useful framework when considering biodiversity impacts and appropriate offset requirements. In order to determine an appropriate offset type and quantum for the proposal, Council may consider using the BioBanking Credit Calculator that underpins the NSW Government Biodiversity Banking and Offsets Scheme (or 'BioBanking'). This scheme helps address the

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loss of biodiversity values, including threatened species. BioBanking is a market-based scheme that provides a streamlined biodiversity assessment process for development, a rigorous and credible offsetting scheme as well as an opportunity for rural landowners to generate income by managing land for conservation. General Comments

OEH recommends that prior to determining the application Council is satisfied that:

- The proposal is consistent with the provisions of the Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997
- The proposal is not likely to cause impacts on areas of native vegetation, with special reference to threatened or regionally significant flora and fauna species, populations and ecological communities.
- The proposed development is consistent with the threatened species provisions of the Environment Planning and Assessment Act 1979, State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP) 44 - Koala Habitat Protection, SEPP 71 - Coastal Protection and the Native Vegetation Act 2003.

Thank you for your letter of 25 June 2013 requesting comments from the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH) on the Review of Environmental Factors for the above proposal. I apologise for the delay in responding

OEH understands that this project proposes a new series of recreation paths to be constructed between Ballina and Lennox Head. The project has been refined into two separate routes being (1) a Coastal Walk (known as the Coastal Recreational Path) and (2) a Shared Path closely aligning to The Coast Road. Furthermore, the project is being assessed under both Parts 4 and 5 of the Environment Planning and Assessment Act 1979 (EP&A Act).

The documentation has been reviewed and OEH provides the following comments in relation to Council's environmental assessment of the proposal. It is recommended prior to determining the application that Council is satisfied that:

- The proposal is consistent with the provisions of the Protection of the Environment Operations Act
- The proposal is not likely to cause impacts on areas of native vegetation, with special reference to threatened or regionally significant flora and fauna species, populations and ecological communities.
- The proposed development is consistent with the threatened species provisions of the EP&A Act, State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP) 44 - Koala Habitat Protection, SEPP 71 - Coastal Protection and the Native Vegetation Act 2003.
- Potential direct and indirect impacts on OEH/National Parks and Wildlife Service estate, wilderness areas, wild rivers and recognised areas of high conservation value have been adequately considered.

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- Any rezoning or development is in accordance with the NSW Government Flood Prone Land Policy
 which aims to reduce the impact of flooding and flood liability on individual owners and occupiers,
 and reduce private and public losses resulting from flooding. These objectives are set out in the
 NSW Government Floodplain Development Manual.
- The proposal is consistent with:
 - The NSW Coastal Policy 1987, which has as its central focus the ecologically sustainable development of the NSW coast;
 - ii) The Estuary Management Policy, with the general goal to achieve an integrated, balanced, responsible and ecologically sustainable use of the State's estuaries, which form a key component of coastal catchments;
 - iii) The Coastline Hazard Policy 1988, with the primary objective to reduce the impact of coastal hazards on individual owners and occupiers, and to reduce private and public losses resulting from natural coastal forces, and
 - iv) Relevant Coastal Zone and /or Estuary Management Plans.

(Note: Where no plans are in place setback from coastal erosion escarpments should be established in consultation with the Environment Protection Authority).

Council's attention is also drawn to the Australian Government's legislation, the *Environment Protection* and *Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999*. If the proposal affects any species requiring consideration under this legislation then approval may be required from the Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities.

With respect to Aboriginal cultural heritage, OEH has reviewed the Cultural Heritage Assessment report and detailed OEH comments are provided in Attachment 1. On the basis of this review, OEH recommends that the conditions provided in Attachment 2 be included in any consent under Part 4 of the EP&A Act or determination under Part 5 of the EP&A Act for the proposal.

Attachment 1: OEH Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Comments Proposed Ballina to Lennox Head Shared Path and Coastal Recreational Path, Ballina LGA

OEH notes that the proposals were lodged with Council under the provisions of both Part 4 and Part 5 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* (EP&A Act). Importantly, proposals being assessed in accordance with Part 4 and Part 5 of the EP&A Act do not absolve the applicant of their obligations to manage Aboriginal cultural heritage under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* (NPW Act).

OEH has accordingly reviewed the documentation provided in support of the proposals, including the 'Ballina to Lennox Head Pathways – Cultural Heritage Assessment' (dated 18 March 2013) ('the CHA') to assess the potential impacts of the proposed development on Aboriginal cultural heritage. The following advice is provided to Council following this review:

Aboriginal cultural heritage values

OEH acknowledges the significance of the local environment to the local Aboriginal community and the existence of a multitude of registered Aboriginal sites in the immediate locality and within the project area. These include artefact scatters, camp sites, isolated finds, stone quarries, middens, ceremonial, dreaming and mythological sites, resource and gathering areas, burial sites and potential artefact deposits (PADs). It is also noted that a component of the development proposal is also planned to align within and immediately adjacent to the East Ballina Aboriginal Place. The project area also contains landforms which have yielded a significant volume of evidence of Aboriginal occupation including ridges, water courses, sand dunes, knolls and slopes.

OEH also acknowledges that previous assessments of the project area have identified four (4) Aboriginal sites in the vicinity of the project. These sites include a camp site, a stone quarry and two middens. The results of an archaeological survey of the project area undertaken on 2 and 3 October 2012 are also noted and the identification of ten (10) Aboriginal sites in the immediate vicinity of the project area. These sites are identified as artefact scatters, middens, a camp site and mythological sites.

A search of OEH's Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) revealed that each of the identified ten (10) new Aboriginal sites have not been registered in AHIMS. Accordingly, the applicant is advised to promptly complete Aboriginal Site Recording Forms for these sites and submit these records to the AHIMS Registrar, as per the requirements of Section 89A of the NPW Act. Any management outcomes for these sites must be included in the information provided to AHIMS. The applicant is also advised that penalties now apply to corporations for failing to fulfil these requirements. AHIMS contact details: Phone: (02) 9585 6470, address: Lvl 6, 43 Bridge Street, Hurstville, NSW, 2220, e-mail: ahims@environment.nsw.gov.au.

OEH notes that there is also a strong possibility that currently undetected cultural material may be present within the project area in those areas where Aboriginal objects have not been previously identified. It is therefore expected that the applicant would undertake appropriate assessment and management strategies to address this possibility in compliance with the requirements of the NPW Act.

Impact on Aboriginal cultural heritage

OEH acknowledges that further Aboriginal cultural heritage assessment is to occur during the detailed design phase of the project to determine whether the identified Aboriginal sites are likely to be protected, impacted or harmed by the development proposal. It is recommended that this assessment is undertaken in , consultation with a cultural specialist and the local Aboriginal community. It is also recommended that this work is concluded promptly in order to inform the assessment process.

In the event that additional archaeological investigations are required, it is recommended that these investigations are undertaken in compliance with OEH's 'Code of Practice for the Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales' (OEH, 2010) -

It is also acknowledged that a component of the proposal is likely to impact on the East Ballina Aboriginal Place.

Management of Aboriginal cultural heritage

OEH's preference is to avoid impacting any Aboriginal sites or Places associated with the project. In the unlikely event that avoidance is impossible or impracticable; the applicant will be required to justify any likely impact and design an applicable management strategy in consultation with the local Aboriginal community and in compliance with the NPW Act. In these circumstances, this will involve the submission of an application to OEH for an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) following the determination of the development application. The application should address all likely and possible impacts from all aspects of the proposed development on all likely and potential Aboriginal cultural heritage values of the project area.

The applicant should familiarise themselves with OEH's AHIP requirements, provided in: 'Applying for an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit: Guide for Applicants' (dated May 2011) (refer to: www.environment.nsw.gov.au/resources/cultureheritage/20110280AHIPguideforapplicants.pdf for further information). The guide should be read in conjunction with the NPW Act and the National Parks and Wildlife Regulation 2009.

In order to obtain an AHIP the applicant will also be required to demonstrate consultation with the local Aboriginal community complies with OEH's 'Aboriginal cultural heritage consultation requirements for proponents 2010'. Support for the proposal from the local Aboriginal stakeholders is an essential part of this process. Refer to:

OEH also recommends that the following matters form a component of the proposed Construction Environmental Management Plan process:

- In the event that surface disturbance associated with the project identifies a new Aboriginal object, all works must halt in the in the immediate area to prevent any further impacts to the object(s). A suitably qualified archaeological specialist and the representatives of the Aboriginal community must be contacted to determine the nature, extent and significance of the object(s), and to develop a appropriate management strategy which complies with the NPW Act. The site is also to be registered in the AHIMS and the management outcome for the site included in the information provided to AHIMS.
- If human remains are located following surface disturbance, all works must halt in the immediate
 area to prevent any further impacts to the remains. The NSW Police are to be contacted
 immediately. No action is to be undertaken until the NSW Police provide written notification to the
 proponent. If the skeletal remains are identified as Aboriginal, the proponent must contact OEH's
 Environment Line, on ph: 131 555, and representatives of the local Aboriginal community. No
 works are to continue until OEH provides written notification to the applicant.

Consultation

Support for the current DA proposal from the local Aboriginal community is an essential part of the Aboriginal cultural heritage assessment process. Effective heritage management requires knowledge of values or cultural significance. An understanding of what makes a place culturally significant and why, enables appropriate decisions to be made about the management of that place. OEH recognises and acknowledges that Aboriginal people are the primary source of information about the value of their heritage

and how this is best protected and conserved and must have an active role in any Aboriginal cultural heritage assessment process.

OEH acknowledges that consultation has been undertaken with the local Aboriginal community regarding the proposed development and associated management strategies. OEH also understands that the three (3) registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) have been provided with an opportunity to review the content of the CHA and the applicant proposes to develop and implement a Communication Plan for the project. These processes are supported by OEH.

OEH encourages the applicant to maintain continuous consultation processes with the Aboriginal community for the entire life of the project. As a general rule, gaps in the consultation process of 6 months or more will not constitute a continuous consultation process. Where an applicant or developer envisages a gap of more than 6 months it is recommended that RAPs are regularly informed of any progress.

Conclusion

OEH has no additional concerns with the Aboriginal cultural heritage assessment undertaken for the proposal. The Conditions of Approval for Aboriginal cultural heritage values recommended by OEH (Attachment 2) must be incorporated into any approval conditions for the proposal under Part 4 and/or Part 5 of the EP&A Act. Attachment 2: OEH Recommended Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Conditions of Approval Proposed Ballina to Lennox Head Shared Path and Coastal Recreational Path, Ballina LGA

- The applicant must comply with Part 6 of the National Parks & Wildlife Act 1974 (NPW Act), prior to commencing any ground disturbance or development works and during development works which is the subject of the development.
- 2. In the event that surface disturbance identifies a new Aboriginal object, all works must halt in the in the immediate area to prevent any further impacts to the object(s). A suitably qualified archaeological specialist and the representatives of the local Aboriginal community must be contacted to determine the significance of the object(s) and to develop an appropriate management strategy. The management strategy must comply with the provisions of the NPW Act. This may include avoiding impact, additional investigations and/or the submission of an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit application. The site is to be registered in the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) (managed by OEH) and the management outcome for the site included in the information provided to the AHIMS.
- 3. If human remains are located following surface disturbance, all works must halt in the immediate area to prevent any further impacts to the remains. The NSW Police are to be contacted immediately. No action is to be undertaken until the NSW Police provide written notification to the proponent. If the skeletal remains are identified as Aboriginal, the proponent must contact OEH's Environment Line on 131 555 and representatives of the local Aboriginal community. No works are to continue until OEH provides written notification to the applicant.
- 4. A Cultural Heritage Induction Program must be developed for the induction of all personnel and contractors involved in the construction activities on site. Records are to be kept of which staff/contractors were inducted and when for the duration of the project. The program should be developed and implemented in collaboration with the representatives of the local Aboriginal community.

Thank you for your letters of 25th June 2013, seeking comment on the proposed pathway development. The following comments are provided for your consideration.

- Any stormwater infrastructure associated with the works must be completed such that the stormwater is retained and treated prior to discharge into Cape Byron Marine Park. It would be preferred if mechanisms exist to exclude litter, particularly plastic, from entering the marine environment. This advice is consistent with section 16 of the State Environmental Planning Policy 71 (Coastal Protection).
- Works involving an increase in non-porous surfaces adjacent to the marine park
 result in an increase in surface run-off which can have a negative impact on
 marine biota. Wherever possible permeable materials should be used in the
 construction of the path and appropriate native vegetation plantings should be
 made between the path and the rocky shore.
- Due consideration should be given to the aesthetics of the path and associated infrastructure such that the scenic quality of the foreshore is maintained. This advice is consistent with section 16 of the State Environmental Planning Policy 71 (Coastal Protection).
- In the interests of providing appropriate levels of service to both residents and visitors it may be desirable to install marine park signage at selected locations on the completed path in the vicinity of Lennox Head.

3. Cycling along these paths we see so many courteous and considerate users of every kind sharing the way. Older folk being pushed in wheelchairs, ladies walking their dogs, children 'getting their cycling legs', and serious pedal pushers going for a spin.

4. Extending the range of these experiences can only be good for the community and for everyone's well-being.

5. Even though some parts of the existing paths are only 1.8 Mtr wide, we have never seen any difficult issues. Everyone makes great use of them.

So we would wish to congratulate you on your forethought, and encourage you to designate all of the coastal track to the Pat Morton Lookout as Shared Pathway. Doing this will maximize the health and recreational benefits to all.

We look forward to trying the track out on our next visit in 2014.

I write in support of the proposed route of the coastal shared path between Pat Morton lookout and Headlands drive , predominantly along the eastern side of Coast Rd(DA 2013/194), as well as the pathway along Skennars Head Rd(DA 2013/195). The improved access as well as enormous benefits to community health and wellbeing on all levels will make these a wonderful asset.

I would also like to submit a very strong preference to have the cycleways, the finger access paths to the viewing areas, as well as the boardwalk behind boulder beach, built as a high priority. Together these will dramatically improve access to some wonderful areas of our coastline.

Once these are all built, I think it is then time to look at any further work to the coastal recreation path.I feel once people have readier access to the site,it will become apparent that the gradients are such that a shared pathway with cyclists (likely travelling at high speeds when coming down these slopes) would be dangerous. Use of wheelchairs on this sort of gradient would be next to impossible and extremely hazardous. I also believe once more people have seen this beautiful area,it is likely that there will be a strong desire for a minimum impact solution.I would support a return to the original planned walking track built to national park standards or simply leave it in its current form (having built the boardwalk behind Boulders Beach a major issue of the path being cut in two in the wet and high tides has been resolved).

In terms of the material finishes of the cycleway and finger paths/viewing platform,

- 1) I would like to see asphalt or significantly grey tinted concrete where hard surfaces are planned(as opposed to lighter concrete). These blend in much better than glary light coloured concrete.
- 2) I would be very anxious to avoid any further use of unsympathetic/unaesthetic materials such as the recycled plastic and metal used on the stairs from Pat Morton up to the top of the headland.
- 3) Use of timber and natural materials and plantings to make the path as aesthetically pleasing and natural as possible would be highly desirable and much appreciated.



Please find my comments on the above.

The Coastal Recreational Path already exists now as people often walk/ride the proposed route everyday. Sure it may need a bit of tweaking with regards to some areas due to erosion from water run-off. However, the vast majority of the route is very natural and only requires some fortifying of the surface in appropriate places.

To build an all purpose extra wide path over Skennars Headland and Lennox Headland will prove very costly and unwarranted due to the steep gradients of both headlands. People in motorised scooters or wheelchairs might be able to negotiate the steepness, but, people pushing prams or people in manual wheelchairs will find it very difficult.

Likewise, the path along Boulders Beach will prove very costly to construct.

I applaud the proposed Shared Path from Pat Morton Lookout to Rocky Point Road. A corridor running east alongside the Coast Road, similar to that along Angels Beach Drive and Kingsford Smith Drive is commendable. With the speed limit along the Coast Road now at 80km, it will be very similar to that of Angels Beach Drive.

In fact, the whole Shared Path should run along the eastern side of the Coast Road to the underpass on the Coast Road at East Ballina. The existing path along Angels Beach Drive can connect to this at the intersection of Angels Beach Drive and the Coast Road. With this as the main artery, smaller paths can be constructed to Flat Rock and the Iron Peg and along the tops of Skennars Head and Lennox Head. These paths along the top of the two headlands will accommodate people wanting to experience a headland view, whale watching and picnics (with appropriate infrastructure).

With the Shared Path along the east side of the Coast Road, it can easily link with the residential development at Skennars Head and when funds become available, continue a secondary Shared Path along Skennars Head Road and North Creek Road to Lennox Head village.

With more funds available in the future, a Shared Path from Lennox Head north to Ross Lane, along Ross Lane and then follow the old Pacific Highway back to Ballina. Now, wouldn't that be a terrific eco-tourism facility - a safe, circuit connecting Ballina with Lennox Head.

Please take the above comments into consideration when making your final decision.

Lennox Head Landcare is in general agreement with the route chosen for the above pathway. However, we note that there will be many significant decisions that will need to be made during the construction phase and we would like to be involved in some way with these when within the areas we operate. For example, the route across the Boulder Beach lagoon, the section along the front of the dune at the southern end of Boulder Beach and also down the north side of Skennars Head.

We have noted one item that is of concern. The section along the edge of the littoral rainforest at the southern end of Boulder Beach is described in the Review of Environmental Factors as being consolidated gravel path. In the sheet showing longitudinal sections it is marked as asphalt surface. We would hope that this very sensitive area has a gravel surface.

With the improvement to the pathway there will be increased usage by people walking dogs. It is unusual to see dogs on leads at Boulder Beach and an increase in this practise is not acceptable. We would like to see dogs prohibited from all areas near fauna habitat. We note that concern is expressed in the environmental assessment regarding this issue.

The proposal seems to be silent on the impact of bicycles using the pathway. Are they to be prohibited? Has the risk on the narrow sections of Skennars Head been evaluated for example? Many riders use the area at present and numbers are likely to increase significantly.

SHARED PATHWAY AND COASTAL RECREATIONAL PATHWAY (CRP)

I refer to Council's current proposal titled "Shared Path and Coastal Recreational Pathway".

Shared Path

For environmental and safety reasons I suggest retaining the Shared Path as close to the road (assuming a safe distance) as possible and within the existing road reserve.

I would like to add:

- 1. It would be preferable to construct the Shared Path in a manner which avoids any use of handrails like those used on the section from Skennars Head to Pat Moreton Lookout as they narrow the path and make it dangerous.
- 2. I believe that Council should adopt a landscape plan prepared by an expert which takes account of the entire Headland area. It is critical to "develop" this area with sympathetic materials that it deserves.

In my view the Shared Path should be constructed as soon as possible and well before it becomes necessary to construct a "Coastal Recreation Pathway (CRP)".

Coastal Recreation Pathway 'CRP'

In my opinion, it will not be necessary to build a CRP for some time once the Shared Pathway is complete. The current track has been used for many years and is totally adequate and safely for walkers. I walking the current 'track' regularly and it is perfectly adequate.

I cannot determine the material as proposed for the CRP but suggest the following if it is to be built.

- 1. The only appropriate surface would be a narrow gravel or paved path (only) which is suitable for walkers. The track around Cape Byron is an example of a path which provides for good access but is in keeping with the sensitive environment of the area.
- 2. It is likely that a few stairs would be necessary but stairways should be kept to a minimum.
- 3. If any boardwalks are to be constructed they should be kept well back from the Boulder Beach area and constructed from environmentally sensitive material such as timber (as happens in other Shires).

In summary, given the delays over many years the Council should build the cycleway ("Shared Path") as a matter of urgency and leave the track (CRP) until the usage and impact of the Shared Path can be measured.

I write in response to the advertised Consent Use proposal for the Coastal Recreational Path which we fully support, but with some essential improvements.

We are local residents and daily user of the existing pathways for both walking and cycling and as such, want to represent the TARGET MARKET you should be aiming for with this project as well as the public in general. The first and most important thing to say is that after so many years of debate, we want to see this valuable project actually happen. Please try keep it simple and stick to the objective, which in real terms is – A COASTAL RECREATION SHARED PATH 2.5 metres wide. In this proposal we seem to have a series of construction obstacles, historical distortions, and many unnecessary alternatives on the Coast Road.

Almost the whole area of this study has been the subject of historical Sand Mining from last century up to the late 1960's which has left a heavily disturbed natural area and a legacy of an established road reserve used currently as a public path on which the Coastal Path can now be constructed on a route already provided.

The intention of the Land Zoning was to encourage Public Recreation use and not lock public access out. So let us try to formalise the existing track and give the Public access to this wonderful part of the Coast in as natural state as possible. Board walkways and handrails both sides are actually not necessary, but will be very costly, and will rapidly require expensive maintenance. Trees that need to be removed can be easily replaced with more suitable and better trees, any Archaeological sites can be avoided if required, and these issues should not inhibit the major sensible objectives.

A Short Submission about ...

COASTAL RECREATIONAL PATH --- Ballina to Lennox Head

My main concern was that important Aboriginal heritage, and European and other heritage, be carefully preserved in the area of the path and associated lands. That heritage includes environmental impacts. Such issues appear to have been carefully observed in the planning.

About 15 years ago, when I was a Lennox Head DuneCare volunteer, when Don Apps was in charge, I was invited to a Ballina meeting about the proposed coastal shared pathway from Melbourne to North Queensland. Maclean Shire Council's woman mayor was a prime mover. As the proposed pathway was through three states, I assumed it would be overseen by the Federal Government. That may not be the case.

Also I was in a group which walked the coastal route from Flat Rock to Lennox Head several years ago, and have walked other sections at various times. There are steep sections where steps and handrails would be necessary for handicapped and elderly people, and young children in strollers etc. There have been objections to steps and handrails. Such aids have improved access to Lennox Headland from the north for visitors and locals.

I have read the Ballina Shire Council's advertisement and map of the path route in the 10th July 2013 edition of *The Ballina Shire Advocate*, and other documents details.

COST ... I did ask at a Lennox Head Residents Association meeting this year, attended by Ballina Shire Council's Mayor, General Manager and Group Manager, Regulatory Services, how was the pathway to be funded? Apparently it will be expensive, and from a variety of sources, which should be publicised for public scrutiny as the work unfolds.

Another concern to me has been debates at Ballina Council meetings about the Stewart family land and Skennars Head Coastal Village. Dr and Mrs Stewart bought their farm in 1967. They were generous in allowing The Coast Road to bisect it. When Dr and Mrs Stewart were overseas, Ballina Council built a carpark on portion of their land on the eastern side, without the Stewarts' permission. I was among those appalled at the Council attempting to try to refuse to allow the Stewarts to develop their land on the western side of The Coast Road, unless they sold their eastern side land to the Council. Such pressure seems unethical.

The debate about the Skennars Head Coastal Village at the Council meeting of 25th July last included councillor criticisms of proposed blocks being too small. Yet the Council has approved much smaller strata block subdivisions in Lennox Head, which seems inconsistent.

Also inconsistent is councillors' concern that the Stewarts might build on their small blocks on the eastern side, (near the recreational path) when the Council allowed a large building on a former farmhouse site at Boulder Beach, near dunes.

COASTAL RECREATIONAL PATH -- Ballina to Lennox Head - 2

Escalation of the dispute with Dr and Mrs Stewart is to be regretted. It is to be hoped that the coastal pathway will be resolved without rancour.

The coastline from Ballina to Lennox is scenically magnificent. All would benefit by the pathway being improved, preferably without unnecessary expense.

Overall I think the route of the proposed formalised path from East Ballina to Lennox Head's Pat Morton Lookout, with links to North Creek Road, Skennars Head, and along The Coast Road, is excellent.

Firstly congratulations to the Council staff who have come up with a good compromise between improving access between Lennox Head and Ballina and not buggering up the coast. The proposals in general have my support. In particular the proposed improvement of the path along Skenners Head Road is long overdue.

However two small issues

- The most common users of the track between Boulders Beach and the Boulders Beach Car Park are surfers. Given the track is sandy it is never boggy even in heavy rain but if it were to be made out of gravel it would be difficult to walk on and I suspect all surfers will walk next to the track defeating the purpose. By all means make it wider if you need to but for that section can I suggest gravel would run counter to the reason for the path.
- The assessment of the visual amenity of the coastal path is poor as it fails to properly assess the visual scar that will be caused when looking at Lennox Point from Boulders.

I have walked these areas for the past 10 years and there are a number of places that get boggy or are steep and eroded and should be fixed but the beauty of walking these hills is it feels quite natural – it would seem that by using gravel the whole length you improve access and reduce amenity – again counter to what you are trying to achieve. My suggestion would be to fix the boggy and steep bits and leave the remainder as beautiful as it is so visitors and locals alike don't have to feel like they are in a man made environment.

Ballina to Lennox Head Coastal Recreational Path

Ballina Environment Society feels in some sense vindicated by this Review of Environmental Factors (REF) as it goes some way to addressing our concerns. However there are aspects, for example the 3.5m-5m construction footprint mentioned in 4.2.2, particularly associated with the 2.5m wide boardwalk at Angels, which are of serious concern.

BES is alert but not alarmed Documents on Exhibition reveal there still needs to be a detailed design and a Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP) which will include:

- Soil and Water Management Plan (SWMP) by the
 Contractor. We need to know this before route approval.
- Pre-clearance survey by a qualified botanist or ecologist for the Contractor
- Map the location of the existing heritage items by the Contractor
- Develop a Communication Plan to inform registered Aboriginal Stakeholders – by BSC
- Minimise connectivity of the Path and infrastructure to mythological places – by BSC
- Formally register the Aboriginal sites identified during this survey on AHIMS – by BSC
- Apply to OEH for an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) – By BSC
- Avoid harm, institute a procedure for finds, ensure that staff and contractors undergo cultural heritage inductions
 by the Contractor

Reporting criteria for dieback along the CRP should have been instigated at a much earlier phase in project development, as evidenced by the deterioration of dunal vegetation at Sharpes Beach following Bitou Bush management from 2009 - 2012.

Aboriginal heritage is shown to be poorly defined and European heritage is lacking when it does not include the earliest agricultural mill in the area, or note the witnessing in WWII of a Japanese Sub surfacing and replenishing water canisters recorded in the Local History Room at Ballina Shire Council, both utilising Sharpes spring.

Indeed heritage signage is not integrated into the project but appears to be identified as a future action. BSC needs to ensure heritage signage is fully endorsed and embedded into the proposed planning.

The pathway reflects we, as a community, are still a long way from applying an information to knowledge to wisdom approach to heritage, rather applying a 'tick the box' call for stories.

The contaminated soil report does not include Loves Dip, the cattle dip north of the spring. A record search was not deemed necessary, although existence of the dip site is well known. Likewise, understanding the impacts of sand mining in the locality has not been explored.

Past dislocation of the wildlife corridor from the Nature Reserve by The Coast Road and urban development, is not justification for failure to maintain or improve into the future.

BES strongly urges Council to retain the right to Consent and therefore continued community participation. The REF relies on mitigation of impacts. This mitigation cannot be ascertained until the final design is released.

We only hope the constraints to the Coastal Recreational Pathway demonstrated through the REF, do not impact on the progression of the Commuter Cycleway. This infrastructure, providing a direct connection, not only to the beach but to schools, shops and sports fields from expanding urban areas, needs to be the priority, not a side line.

Path widths should not be compromised as any impact is able to be reasonably and practically mitigated/off-set by the use of off-set/compensatory plantings with appropriate native endemic plant species (i.e. where any plant is required to be removed, it is to be replaced with an increased number of plants in an appropriate location at a rate of between 1:3 up to 1:10, depending upon the significance of the tree/plant that is removed). Example: apply this principle to the narrowing of the Overpass to Flat Rock shared path to 1.5 meters due the Coastal Cypress Trees etc.

Explanation of existing rights

Consideration must be given to the rights that exist as a consequence of the existence of the Public Road Reserve and to the Principles of Crown land management.

Any approval for the activity should be framed around the above. Consideration must be given to the fact that the land is <u>NOT</u> part of a National Park, but is largely within a road reserve. The land is also contained within Ballina Coastal Reserve (being Reserve No. 1010068), the purpose of which is for 'Public Recreation, <u>Access</u> and Coastal Environmental Protection' (as notified on the 13th August 2004).

The Ballina Coastal Reserve has been reserved for the following specific purposes – refer to the 'Principles of Crown land management' below, and in particular (c) and (d). The use and enjoyment of such land by the public is expressly provided for. Therefore a 2.5m shared Path is an ideal use for this land.

Reference should also be made to the 'Right of passage along public road by members of the public' below, and in particular (1) being the public entitlement.

The proposed upgrade works to the Coastal Recreational Pathway are being undertaken to upgrade and formalise the existing informal gravel track, that has a current 'public entitlement, as of right, to pass along the public road reserve (whether on foot, in a vehicle or otherwise) and to drive stock or other animals along such a road'.

This public entitlement is fundamental to any decision making about the subject Road Reserve.

11. Principles of Crown land Management (Crown Lands Act 1989)

In reference to a section of the proposed Ballina to Lennox Head Coastal Recreation Path, we respectfully ask Council to review the suggested route.

Who we are: Every year, on a weekend in May, a group of Currumbin Valley fathers wish their wives a quiet and restful break, and leave for the Flat Rock campground with their children.

For the children of Currumbin Valley, this is the most significant weekend of the year. "Better than birthdays or Christmas" is the general comment. This annual long weekend event started twenty five years ago by the late Chris Walton, developer of the world recognised Currumbin Ecovillage, and has grown to incorporate up to thirty Dads and sixty kids, annually. The recent tragic death of Chris Walton in December 2012 has given extra significance to this weekend.

We wish to state that we wholeheartedly support Council's proposed Ballina to Lennox Head Coastal Recreational Path if the project is implemented sensitively, but... we strongly believe the section running adjacent to the Flat Rock campground and the section adjacent to the road ending at the Flat rock parking area should be reviewed and reconsidered.

1) The major draw card of the Flat Rock campground is that it is a safe and secure site for our children. Their ages include from three to twenty four, with the older kids assisting the Fathers to look after the younger kids. An access path cutting through or close to the Flat Rock campground will significantly erode this important benefit for the group and cause us to seriously review Flat Rock as our preferred destination of choice.

Safety is the significant draw-card for participants in the weekend. Our children enjoy the sense of freedom the weekend provides. The fathers enjoy the secure cul-de-sac ambience and casual surveillance.

It is interesting to note, in all the years our group have been coming to enjoy the Flat rock area, not one item has ever been stolen.

We believe it is possible and preferable for the track to skirt the Flat Rock campground. This would ensure the campground stays as secure as it can be in an uncertain world.

We strongly support the recreational path if implemented sensitively, but we believe the route should bypass the campground, incorporate the good work of the informal path already implemented, and further enhance the presentation of the natural beauty of the area.

SHARED PATHWAY AND COASTAL RECREATIONAL PATHWAY (CRP)

I refer to Council's current proposal titled "Shared Path and Coastal Recreational Pathway",

I note that the numerous documents associated with this document were not available to view at Lennox Head Library. As a result it is difficult to comment properly on all aspects of the plan. We would be grateful if they could be provided in the future.

Shared Path

As a result of the documents not being available for inspection, many residents have not been able to view the proposed details of this Path. However, as a general matter, and based on the map provided (dated 23 May 2013) showing the location of the Shared Path, I agree the location of the planned Shared Path appears to be more or less appropriate.

For environmental and safety reasons I am particularly in favour of retaining the Shared Path as close to the road (assuming a safe distance) as possible and within the existing road reserve. However, in my view, Council may wish to consider the viability of two alternate paths (one through the Headlands subdivision and one adjacent to the road) as cyclists have warned that they are unlikely to use the Shared Path if it diverts through the Headlands Estate.

Additional points I would like to make regarding the Shared Path:

- It would be best to construct the Shared Path in a manner which avoids any use of handrails like those used on the section from Skennars Head to Pat Moreton Lookout. Not only are they ugly but they narrow the path and make it dangerous.
- 2. I have corresponded with Council on many previous occasions regarding the Lennox Headland and note that in regards to where the Shared Path meets the Headland and Pat Moreton lookout, Council should adopt a landscape plan prepared by an expert which takes account of the entire Headland area.

Residents of the Shire have been awaiting the building of the cycleway for **decades**. In my view the Shared Path should be constructed as soon as possible and well before it becomes necessary to construct a the so-called "Coastal Recreation Pathway (CRP)".

Coastal Recreation Pathway 'CRP'

In my view, it will not be necessary to build a CRP for some time once the Shared Pathway is complete. The current track has been used for many years and is totally adequate for walkers. I have been walking the current 'track' an average of twice a week for more than 10 years and have no issue with the current location or surface.

If Council intends to proceed with the CRP, I believe Council should construct the Shared Path first so as to settle any remaining access issues.

Lennox Head Residents Association is pleased to note that the shared path complex has reached the stage of readiness to proceed. The Association generally accepts the proposed routes but does not feel that there is enough detail in the Coastal Recreational Pathway route to ensure that it will be both environmentally and aesthetically appropriate.

While as a concept plan it may be acceptable we believe there must be further community input in the detailed planning stages. This is not only in regard to the exact placement of the path but particularly relating to the surface materials. For instance, it is proposed that asphalt be used as a surface between Angels Beach and Sharpes Beach. This material is not suitable for hot summer conditions as it absorbs heat and in very hot conditions may melt, become sticky and therefore dangerous especially for children. It should not be used. Our members would also appreciate having some details about the composition of the gravel surfaces proposed to be used and, if essential, what type of handrails are intended.

Although specifically requested of Mr Paul Busmanis prior to our July LHRA meeting, existing artists' impressions of the visual impacts of the pathway surfaces were not presented to the Lennox Head Residents Association during the council presentation to us on 1 July.

Consequently the Association's discussion was not able to take into meaningful account the proposed visual intrusions of any of the proposed pathway surfaces. This was regrettable because much of the concern of the LHRA focuses on the surface treatments and visual impacts of the CRP. The association has been consistent in our concern for the potential of the CRP to incorporate aesthetically undesirable pathway surfaces and to create unsightly viewing platforms and raised walkways within what is still a beautiful and natural landscape, albeit a threatened natural landscape by this proposal in places. We would prefer that these visual impacts not occur or be kept to an absolute minimum by councillors.

The Association would like to draw council's attention to our recent submission "Lennox Head Residents Response to Headland Proposals", in particular sections 1, 4 and 6. In our submission our Association pointed out a number of comments that are specifically relevant to present CRP

<u>Lennox Head Residents' Response to Proposals to Soften the Headland and</u> <u>Area Around Pat Morton Lookout</u>

1. Introduction

The Association is positively supportive of any endeavour to soften the effect of changes to the surroundings of the Headland and to enhance its natural beauty. Thus in principle the Association favours a process to achieve greater harmonisation with the natural environment of Pat Morton Lookout and The Headland

However the Association has a number of concerns which comprise the following:

- 1.1 Lack of planning integration on the Headland
- 1.2 Substantive variances from the accepted Geolink Plan for the Headland
- 1.3 Disunity of colour palette and design style on the Headland
- 1.4 Obtrusive and unsympathetic Lighting
- 1.5 Grass lightness as Opposed to Concrete Weight Below is a short commentary on these points.

2. Lack of Planning Integration on the Headland

It appears that while elements of design for the Headland are in place, nevertheless no cohesive and integrated design is apparent so that the disparate elements of cycleway, paths, parking and furnishings and concreted areas are integrated in a unified design plan.

Under these circumstances it is extremely difficult to offer specific remedial comment and only general observations are possible.

Thus the Association urges Council to provide the Community with a fully integrated design plan for the Headland which is inclusive of all elements envisaged for the Pat Morton area.

3. <u>Substantive Variances from the Accepted Geolink Master Plan for the Headland</u>

6. Grass Lightness as Opposed to Concrete Weight

The Association would consistently support a 'look and feel' on the Headland of natural materials and palette. We therefore favour strongly the maintenance of the grass apron in front of the car parking spaces and we urge Council to adopt best practices to enable the grass to flourish. In this respect we would anticipate that Council will take specialist advice on the most appropriate grass types and that optimum preparation by Council horticulturalists will occur to preserve the newly laid grass. In addition it is requested that in the early stage that pedestrian traffic is prevented as far as possible so that the grass is offered the optimum environment in which to thrive.

7. Conclusion

The Association is strongly supportive of all attempts to soften the Headland surroundings and is thus appreciative of Council's initiatives in this regard and the opportunity to comment on possible improvements. While the Association favours the improvements suggested it would like the proposals included in this submission to be taken into consideration. However, of key importance is the fundamental need that Council provide the community with an integrated and cohesive plan of the Headland unifying all the disparate design elements envisaged for the area.

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

Dear General Manager, Dear Councillors,

This is a submission in SUPPORT of the Coast Road Shared Path, CRP and Skennars Head cycleway which includes OBJECTIONS to portions of the design elements and includes SUGGESTIONS for additional community consultation. The comments often focus on the Boulder Beach stretch in particular but are intended to be relevant to the entirety of the CRP.

This submission has relied primarily on council's advertised documents by NSW Public Works and the REF by Blackwood Ecological Services as viewed at Council offices. My citations refer to those documents and appendices as best I could ascertain their sources.

It must unfortunately be stated at the outset that council's document organisation and presentation is very confusing, even to those experienced in assessing Ballina Shire Council documents and other professionals with whom I have discussed these matters. My apologies if my notes from the source documents were incorrectly attributed at any stage as I am not sure if there are numerous sections that might duplicate the same numbering as I have copied.

Since council was submitting a development application to itself, there is an appearance given through this process that the right hand and the left hand were combining to achieve an outcome that had been resolved by councillors as a primary objective. This is unfortunate as I am sure that councillors are committed to seeking the widest possible range of public contributions. There are steps that councillors can take to avoid the appearance of any self-serving perceptions in the future.

Councillors should give future consideration to requiring council staff, in future circumstances of council submitting a DA to itself, to prepare a plain English summary document of say 10-20 pages length for the purpose of assisting public submissions to address key components of a complex project. This may not be required at law but councillors should be acting to assist their constituency to provide informed feedback in my view, all the more so when it is the staff assessing staff submissions. It would really help the public to lodge submissions rather than to lose interest due to the difficulty of navigating the documents.

The current DA exhibition suffers from the creation of a strong impression that it was intended to discourage meaningful public participation. This arose by presenting a plethora of technical paperwork

Fencing, where it may be proposed, should be unobtrusive and reserved to prevent entry to sensitive areas like the lagoon in the centre of Boulder Beach or sensitive littoral rainforest and other vegetation. Materials should emphasise wire rather than posts or rails if they are unavoidable. I cannot envision any possible circumstance where non-indigenous plants would add any value to these landscapes. They absolutely should not be used as there are a great many indigenous plants species from which to choose.

The creation of bitumen and blue metal surfaces is inappropriate in these coastal environments. The re-surfacing of the Flat Rock car park some years ago has diminished that beach experience substantially because it is so BAREFOOT UNFRIENDLY. The use of small rocks and tar just hurts people's feet when they go to the beach. These materials should not be used under any circumstances in the CRP. It's hot and sticky in summer and painful to walk on in winter.

I hope that council would use this as an opportunity to resurface the Flat Rock car parking to an unsealed dirt surface which was much preferable to the unfortunate decision to place rocks and tar under people's feet. Otherwise resurface the Flat Rock car park area in concrete.

Boardwalks and bridges should be at the minimum amount possible due to their intrusive visual impact, but if they be deemed to be included, it is supported that their construction materials be of minimal aesthetic impact. This, however, is not to be taken as support for using those materials in the CRP. I am opposed to the hardening of one of this shire's most widely recognised prime assets, our coast's inherent natural beauty.

I am particularly concerned about the absence of design detail in the area traversing the lagoon in the centre of Boulder Beach. I am concerned about the loss of amenity and the environmental impact on the lagoon, which was too difficult for me to locate in the time it took to peruse the documentation. This should NOT INCORPORATE a viewing platform as views are available all over the area.

Section 4.1.1 (REF

The "standards" that are discussed in the documents are unclear. No average person could make an informed comment from the material available and the way in which it was presented. I make the point that 'soft' surfaces should be the standard applied to the CRP. I support choices which allow native grasses to grow in gaps and to diminish their visual impact. Colour matching sensitivity is important to achieve.

The recommendation to use 'consolidated gravel', whatever that means, is totally contrary to the natural attributes of the coastal experience. All walking paths should be constructed to a BAREFOOT FRIENDLY standard. These are BEACHES, NOT ROADS. Shoes are not the design standard to apply to these beachside areas.

A maximum path width of 2.0 metres is not supported. It is submitted that the maximum path width should be 1.5 metres.

the foredune. For that matter, I believe it was quite misguided for council to allow the post and wire construction along the foredune that pathway that now exists.

These exceptionally beautiful natural areas should be retained with an emphasis on the amenity of their natural beauty. This is not sufficiently respected in the advertised CRP routes and details.

Section 4.2.4 (REF)

Signage is visually intrusive and should be placed non-intrusively and sparingly. This is the heritage that Ballina Shire residents enjoy. It should not be treated as a school education excursion with interruptions of the scenery and landscape for information plaques.

Path construction methodology should not be "left" to the contractor. Construction design should be further PUBLICLY EXHIBITED and determined by council prior to works commencing.

Plates 4-1 and 4-2 (REF)

These plates of the 'Existing informal paths along the CRP route alignment' are non-obtrusive and demonstrate how council should attempt to construct the majority of the CRP alignment. The path has operated successfully for many years with the existing simple surface shown in these photos. No further hardening or visual intrusion is desirable along the CRP route in the view of many people, myself included.

Sheets 8, 9 and 10 of 11 (GHD)

The artists' impression of a viewing platform in the middle of Boulder Beach is highly intrusive visually and should be eliminated on amenity grounds. It does NOT BELONG there. Also it serves little purpose with natural headland outlooks abundant across this short stretch of beach. In other words, it is unnecessary.

The two artists' impressions of the 'shared path at grade' in both crushed gravel and paving blocks both appear to be extremely visually intrusive. This coastal scenery was deemed to be of great public importance at least since council's consultancy report, "The Tall Buildings Study", was presented 31 years ago in 1982. Lower visual impact materials must be used if the council values the amenity of this section of the coast.

This is one of the most disappointing aspects of the CRP route. There are 2 of the 3 routes that can be successfully hard surfaced. Please do not make the mistake of turning the CRP into a NSW coastal eyesore.

It is important to note that these sheets of artists' impressions were very difficult to find amongst the three volumes of documents. Paul Busmanis was able to accept the invitation I extended to him on behalf of the Lennox Head Residents Association to speak to the July meeting. When I invited Paul I specifically asked him to locate and to bring any artists' impressions that may have been created.

This information was apparently SO DIFFICULT to access that Mr Busmanis was not able to locate any artists' impressions to show to the LHRA meeting.

- The south facing flank of Lennox Headland is the most visually prominent portion of the CRP route and should remain as absolutely informal as possible to blend in with the natural landscape.
- There should be a minimalist approach to structures in all scenically prominent areas.
- There exists a large portion of the public who wish to have Ballina Shire's most outstanding
 natural assets remain in a substantially unspoiled natural state. This amenity is every bit as
 important as the needs of any other various user groups as well as for those of us who seek
 to bequeath our great natural assets to future generations; eg intergenerational equity. The
 advertised documents do not sufficiently respect this heritage.
- The amendments suggested by this submission should be incorporated and implemented by councillors in the adopted plan.

Thank you for your consideration of these widely concerning matters.

Ballina Coastcare appreciates the opportunity to comment on the exhibited Review of Environmental Factors (REF) for the proposed Ballina to Lennox Head Coastal Recreational Path as publicly exhibited by Council. This group's area of interest is focused on the coastal area and adjacent littoral zone from Black Head in the south to Sharpes Creek in the north, and as such our comments and feedback relate primarily to this section of the proposal.

In general, we advise that we are satisfied overall with the level of assessment and investigation undertaken in relation to the current proposal. This group accepts the general location of the proposed recreational pathway, however upon review of the information contained in the REF, we wish to raise several points of concern that we believe can and should be addressed through the further assessment and subsequent approval of the proposal.

In Section 4 of the REF (Scope of Proposed Works) it is stated in subsection 4.1.2 that the proposed path between Angels Beach South and Sharpes Creek will consist of either 2.5 metre wide asphalt or raised timber boardwalk (no width specified). It further states under subsection 4.2.2 (Ground Preparation) that the width of construction disturbance for the construction of the path is expected to be 3.5 metres and up to 5 metres in some locations. It does not specify, however, where these variances will occur. This group is concerned at the possible unnecessary level of disturbance to the significant and sensitive coastal vegetation communities through which the proposed path passes, particularly given the ambiguity of the area of disturbance referenced above.

Later in the REF in Section 5 (Environmental Assessment – Physical Environment) where flora and fauna impacts are addressed (subsection 5.5.4) it is stated that south of the Flat Rock Tent Park there will be a construction corridor of 3.6 metres. This width is also stated in Table 5-4 (under Ch 740-1330). This appears to be inconsistent and possibly conflicting with the widths specified in Section 4.

Ballina Coastcare requests that further consideration be given to the expected and allowable area of disturbance to vegetation through the above corridor and that a clear delineated maximum width of disturbance be specified in the conditions of approval and subsequently implemented in the proposed Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP). While it is understood there will be a certain level of disturbance to allow for the construction of the boardwalk and path, we consider the proposed widths of 3.6 metres and possibly up to 5 metres to be excessive and unnecessary.

We note that in Section 4 of the REF (Scope of Proposed Works) it is proposed that a Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP) is to be prepared by the contractor who will undertake the works following its approval. This CEMP will address the mitigation measures based on the impacts anticipated following the final design. It would appear that based on this, the majority of mitigation measures have been deferred. This is understood given that the final design and specifications for the path have yet to be completed and that the design and location of the path will be flexible. Our group supports this position and hopes that this outcome will result in limiting vegetation disturbance and allow for the design to adapt to the existing environment.

The proposed upgrade works to the Coastal Recreational Pathway are being undertaken to upgrade and formalise the existing informal gravel track, that has a current 'public entitlement, as of right, to pass along the public road reserve (whether on foot, in a vehicle or otherwise) and to drive stock or other animals along such a road'.

This public entitlement is fundamental to any decision making about the subject Road Reserve.

11. Principles of Crown land Management (Crown Lands Act 1989)

For the purposes of this Act, the principles of Crown land management are:

- that environmental protection principles be observed in relation to the management and administration of Crown land,
- (b) that the natural resources of Crown land (including water, soil, flora, fauna and scenic quality) be conserved wherever possible,

I wish to object to the proposed coastal recreational path currently on exhibition at Ballina Council Chambers for the following reasons:

- The section through the Headlands Estate and along North Creek Road is an excellent concept.
 However, it primarily services the residents of those specific areas and has little relevance to the
 Coastal Recreational Path. It should be considered as a separate, less critical project.
- 2. The section along the roadway has little recreational merit. Usage will be minimal because it is a sterile roadway environment and does not have great scenic attraction. The detour up and around the Headlands Estate is almost inane. Dedicated cyclists will treat it with disdain and use the roadway, as they do elsewhere. Therefore, I have a strong suspicion that the concept was devised as a compromise to appease environmental groups.
- 3. I believe that the best solution is a compliant shared cycleway/walkway for the full distance between Ballina and Lennox Head, generally following the coastline. I am aware that environmental groups oppose this concept because it will impinge on the pristine nature of the magnificent, scenic coastline. I greatly admire the work that these groups do to protect and maintain the environment and, as a bush walker, am very sympathetic with their objectives. I believe that we should all feel greatly indebted to them and that consideration should be weighted in their favour. However, because of the proximity of large residential areas, I have reluctantly come to the view that Utopian ideals must yield a little to a solution that will be of the greatest benefit to the most number of people.

We have been advised the proposed pathway is earmarked to run directly through the camp sites numbered 34 to 41 inclusive. The construction of a pathway anywhere in this camping ground will no doubt significantly alter the available number of sites, the privacy for users of the park and for the general amenity.

My name is Amber Browne and I have been coming to the region from Queensland to camp at Flat rock for many years. We have a regular two week booking and come down to NSW on a regular basis throughout the year to visit the park and the area.

We contribute to local businesses by eating in the local area, shopping and taking part in other tourist activities. Throughout the years, through word of mouth we have brought many family members and friends from Queensland to the park who also contribute local businesses in your area.

I am writing to express my concern over the prospect of an asphalt bike track along the fence line at the back of the park.

My friends and family take up nearly the whole back row at Flat Rock Tent park overlooking the dune bush and have done so for many years. The dune bush, the peace and quiet, and the safety of the area are the main reason we all travel so far every year to the park.

My main concerns about the bike track are as follows:

- WHS perspective: certainly there is a danger having the bike track right next to campers. All of the campers
 in this area have children and I have visions of a child being hit by a bike rider or skateboarder speeding
 down the track. Or even an accident caused by a child running out in front of a rider.

 our campsites. The ramifications of something like that happening would be huge.

Flat rock is a beautiful part of the coastline and should be shared. I myself would appreciate a bike path in the area. Would it be possible to put the track further down the dunes. The views would be better for the riders and they would not have to worry about small children from the campsites wandering onto their path and causing an accident. Surely there are many other alternatives in the area for a bike track.

It is our understanding that Ballina Council intends to formalise the coastal track which currently passes through the Flatrock Camping Ground.

The information provided with the application is quite vague, and it is difficult to ascertain whether the track is inside or outside the boundary of the campground. Our family has camped in the vicinity of the existing track for nearly 20 years now, and we have, on occassion, had problems with people entering the park at night and stealing from campsites.

I feel that if this track is formalised and access is improved, the situation with theft, and problems of controlling access from the track into the park will only become worse.

Flatrock campground has had a reputation for a long time as a "natural" and secluded tent park, and this is the reason that it has always been popular and why campers return there over long periods of time.

I fear that a more formal walking track will take away from the natural beauty of the site, and compromise the secluded nature of the camp, and the security of campers.

I am thoroughly disgusted with the manner by which the Coastal Recreational Path has now been put forwards as a publicly displayed Development Application document.

In the first place it would appear that a 'shared pathway' on the western side of the Coast Road, is now receiving priority as opposed to the recreational pathway the route of which was the subject of long and serious discussion of many years for it to be constructed on the eastern side of the Coast Road between the car park at Pat Morton look-out and the underpass at Angels Beach. I believe that it was resolved to construct the Coastal Recreational Path (CRP) to a standard which would accommodate walkers, joggers, recreational cyclists, wheel chairs, strollers and other equipment used by children to appreciate the views which were available whilst traversing the CRP.

It now appears that a 'shared path' is to be constructed and believed by senior staff of this council to be rushed forward on the pretence that a thoroughfare is required to accommodate those who wish to travel between East Ballina and Lennox Head, should now have priority over the long awaited and planned CRP. 
I have completed a review of the broader public needs and interests concerning the Coastal Recreational Path and am pleased to submit the enclosed submission /requirements for your review and protection of the greater public interest.

Should an element be missing or you would like to explore any of the options, please feel free to contact me.

Generally I support the Consent Application for the Coastal Recreational Path (CRP), provided that due consideration is given to the fact that any member of the public is currently entitled to physically or as of legal right, pass along the full length of the public road reserve (whether on foot, in a vehicle or otherwise) and so any Coastal Recreational path proposal, must be for any member of the public to pass along the full length of the public road reserve, and on a path of an appropriate 'shared path standard' (minimum 2.5m width), alignment and surfaces. Anything less, would be not be protecting the public interest or current entitlement over the land.

Also consideration must be given to the fact that the subject land is <u>NOT</u> part of a National Park, but is largely with in the road reserve. The subject land is also contained within Reserve No. 1010068, the purpose of which is for '<u>Public</u> <u>Recreation</u>, <u>Access</u> and Coastal Environmental Protection', as notified on the 13th August 2004, (Ballina Coastal Reserve).

The Ballina Coastal Reserve has been reserved for specific purposes – as referred to in the 'Principles of Crown Land Management' (Crown Lands Act 1989), and in particular (c) and (d) - the use and enjoyment of such land by the public is expressly provided for and encouraged. Therefore a 2.5m wide shared path following the old sand mining road is an ideal use for this land.



Providing that the proposed development will not have a significant adverse impact on any EEC's and if rehabilitation planting off-sets are utilised, there will not be any problems with the Department of Environment & Heritage in achieving the recommended suggestions.

Any proposal/approval for the Coastal Recreation Path should be framed around the above.

Therefore it is submitted that it is in the greater public interest to request that Ballina Shire Council take high level and strategic view, of the integrated pathway system and amend the current application accordingly or lodge a new application for any relative section, if required.

The Coastal Recreational Path (CRP) has been 'recommended for approval'.

On the basis of the information presented in the Review of Environmental Factors (REF) it is concluded that the proposed activity is **NOT** likely to:

- 1. have a significant adverse impact on the environment
- 2. significantly adversely affect threatened species, populations, ecological communities or their habitats (including critical habitat)
- 3. affect any Commonwealth land

The REF concluded that there would be minimal impact on the natural environment, flora and fauna (and their habitats) and that contingent upon the implementation of measures to mitigate and manage environmental impacts identified in the REF, the proposed Coastal Recreational Path is appropriate for approval.

To protect the greater public interest, due consideration must be given to the following points.

Don't lose sight of our community's objectives, the detailed and lengthy background and history of the CRP project. Consideration must also be given to the rights that exist as a consequence of the existence of the Public Road Reserve and to the Principles of Crown Land Management.

We draw your attention again to approximately 3000 individual letters previously sent to Ballina Shire Council showing strong and passionate support for the shared pathway, between Ballina and Lennox Head. A letter from Fuller & Driscoll, dated 09/02/2012, sent to Ballina Shire Council, re: Broad Community Support for Council's Recreational Pathway; Angels Beach underpass to Lennox Head states the following:

There were approximately 1000 letters of support submitted to Council in November 2000. This proposal was for a safe, sealed pathway in its current position (basically following the old sand mining road) from Angels Beach underpass to Lennox Head. The community asked if this work could start as soon as possible, as residents & visitors had been waiting for many years for this link to be connected. At the time the 1000 letters of support were the most letters ever received for or against any one project ever lodged with Council. This support for this project still remains as strong within the community, if not stronger.

Overwhelming community support for the coastal pathway was also demonstrated, with approximately 2000 individual letters of support submitted to council in June/July 2001. These letters of support noted the doubling of the population at that time, continuous development increasingly joining Ballina to Lennox Head, 3 schools within this coastal strip, limitations of public transport, the dangers of having children travelling along the main road and the desperate need for a safe pathway, separate to the Coast Road, linking these areas, with the proposed route basically following the old sand mining road.

In particular, people don't want to endanger themselves by walking or cycling or pushing a pram along the side of the Coast Road, they want to experience living nature, riding a bike/scooter or simply walking and enjoying some of the finest scenery Ballina & Lennox have to offer. Not only would they enjoy the scenery (including our dune rehabilitation works & any Cultural Heritage sites) safely and comfortably but they could also use the shared pathway to walk/ride to school/work or for exercise. A recreational path for all people.

We continue to support the current preferred route of council, basically following the old sand mining route as it would result in

- minimal impact to the work done by the Dune Care Groups in these areas to date,
- minimal impact re any Aboriginal Sites and
- minimal cost of construction as the road/track already exists and is of
- enormous value to the entire community.

This preferred route of Council's is in the interest of the broad community as opposed to a single interest group. It must be progressed as soon as possible.

The broader public (particularly local residents, but also 'day-trippers' and tourists) simply want to experience the best Ballina has to offer on a safe, sealed, shared path (2.5m wide), that is physically and spatially separated from and to the east of the Coast Road that follows the old sand mining road/Road reserve. This upgraded path will provide users with a very high level of amenity, scenic value, attraction and scope for environmental interaction and appreciation.

The relatively minor works required to achieve the above involve the basic grading and shaping of sections of the existing gravel road and surface sealing, on a largely existing track that exists within a formal road reserve and which primarily follows an existing road/track that was used in association with sand mining.

Currently the CRP is located primarily along an existing heavily disturbed unsealed old sand mining road, hugging the Coast as seen in figure 1.

Figure 1: Existing gravel road; old Sand Mining Road; BSC preferred route hugging the Coast Line (early 70s).





Any approval for the activity should be framed around the above. Consideration must be given to the fact that the land is **NOT** part of a National Park, but is largely within a road reserve. The land is also contained within Ballina Coastal Reserve (being Reserve No. 1010068), the purpose of which is for 'Public Recreation, Access and Coastal Environmental Protection' (as notified on the 13th August 2004).

The Ballina Coastal Reserve has been reserved (Legal Declaration) for the following specific purposes - refer to the '(11.) Principles of Crown land management' below, and in particular (c) and (d). The use and enjoyment of such land by the public is expressly provided for. Therefore a 2.5m shared Path is an ideal project for this land.

Reference should also be made to the '(5.) Right of passage along public road by members of the public' below, and in particular (1) being the public entitlement.

The proposed upgrade works to the Coastal Recreational Pathway are being undertaken to upgrade and formalise the existing informal gravel road as seen in figure 1, that has a current 'public entitlement, as of right, to pass along the public road reserve (whether on foot, in a vehicle or otherwise) and to drive stock or other animals along such a road'.

This public entitlement is fundamental to any decision making about the subject Road Reserve.

J.U

11. Principles of Crown land management (Crown Lands Act 1989 No 6)

For the purposes of this Act, the principles of Crown Land Management are:

- that environmental protection principles be observed in relation to the management and administration of Crown land,
- (b) that the natural resources of Crown land (including water, soil, flora, fauna and scenic quality) be conserved wherever possible,
- (c) that public use and enjoyment of appropriate Crown land be encouraged,
- (d) that, where appropriate, multiple use of Crown land be encouraged,
- that, where appropriate, Crown land should be used and managed in such a way that both the land and its resources are sustained in perpetuity, and
- (f) that Crown land be occupied, used, sold, leased, licensed or otherwise dealt with in the best interests of the State consistent with the above principles.
- 5. Right of passage along public road by members of the public (ROADS ACT 1993 SECT 5):
- (1) A member of the public is entitled, as of right, to pass along a public road (whether on foot, in a vehicle or otherwise) and to drive stock or other animals along the public road.
- (1A) The right conferred by this section extends to the right of passage of members of the public in a light rail or other railway vehicle.
- (2) The right conferred by this section does not derogate from any right of passage that is conferred by the common law, but those rights are subject to such restrictions as are imposed by or under this or any other Act or law.
- (3) For example, those rights are subject to such restrictions as are imposed:
- (a) by or under the road transport legislation within the meaning of the Road Transport Act 2013, or

(b) by or under section 72 of the <u>Crown Lands Act 1989</u> (Cultivation of enclosed roads).

Any member of the public is currently entitled, physically, or as of legal right, to pass along the full length of public road reserve (whether on foot, in a vehicle or otherwise) and so any Coastal Recreational path proposal, must be for **any** member of the public to pass along the **full length** of the public road reserve, and on a path of an **appropriate shared standard** (2.5m wide). Anything less, would be not be protecting the public interest or current entitlement over the land.

Priority should be given to the design and standard of the Coastal Recreational Path over other proposed shared/cycleway paths on the basis of what such will bring to the community and to the fact that that the informal path already exists.

The western side shared/cycleway path (located near the Coast Road) should be deferred as it may have a detrimental effect on the upgrading of the Recreational Path if constructed first.

Priority should be given to the construction of the recreational pathway between Pat Morton Lookout car park and Angels Beach as per minutes of BSC dated 12/12/2011.

Preference should be given to "shared path standards" from the Angels Beach Underpass to Pat Morton Lookout. It should be proposed that the CRP is built to "shared path standard" (2.5 m wide) to provide access for **any member of the public** for the **full length of the path**. With respect to disabled access to this shared path, there would be sections where the grade exceeds the recommended maximum of 5% rising to 15%. The shoe and path standard as set out in Walking Track Construction Guidelines (National Parks and Wildlife Service) would not be required. With a maximum grade of 15% Ballina Shire Council was able to eliminate the requirement for steps and shorten path lengths as required.

At chainage 160 to 200, ensure existing 3.0 wide path remains with 2.5 metre asphalt path and there is no requirement for fencing on the northern side on path. The widths are required for public safety when they are crossing from the Coast Road to the Beach for the spotting of Brown, Black or Green snakes etc. These widths should be applied to any other cross paths to the beach.

At chainage 200, provide 2.3m wide asphalt path to existing lookout and disabled ramp as previously agreed for the Disabled Ramp. Existing fencing to be maintained at the current width of 2.7m with a preference for bollards instead of fencing as fencing is unsightly.

All fencing and handrails should be kept to a minimum and only for safety or protection reasons should fencing be provided. The only people who go into the bush are Dune Carers and kids having the odd party. Fencing will not prevent people going into the bush and it is a visual eyesore.

The Crown Road/Road Reserve should only be 'transferred to Council's control' contingent upon completion and opening of the Coastal Recreational Path. The closure of Road Reserve and its consolidation into the comprised land of the Ballina Coastal Reserve should only occur once the path is operational. (Executive to deem the above.)

Road closure to be deferred until construction is complete and path is opened and operational. We may need this legal "Public Interest" in court.

The Coastal Recreational Pathway is being undertaken to upgrade and formalise the surfacing of an existing informal gravel track, that has a current 'public entitlement, as of right, to pass along the public road reserve (whether on foot, in a vehicle or otherwise) and to drive stock or other animals along such a road'. To date the community and Council have determined the preferred route where, the majority of the public made it clear they want the path (with no steps) up to 15% grade, east of and separate to the Coast Road. There is no mention of the "public entitlement" in the REF Report.

Closing the road reserve and losing the 'Public Entitlement' in the short term, is not such that will provide for the appropriate protection of the best public interest.

It is appropriate to include and use Compensatory Habitat Principles (avoid, minimise and or offset) to support the proposal to maintain path width (2.5m), alignment and surfaces (as required) from Angels Beach to Pat Morton Lookout.

Path widths should not be compromised as any impact is able to be reasonably and practically mitigated/off-set by the use of off-set/compensatory plantings with appropriate native endemic plant species (i.e. where any plant is required to be removed, it is to be replaced with an increased number of plants in an appropriate location at a rate of between 1:3 up to 1:10, depending upon the significance of the tree/plant that is removed). Apply this principle to any narrowing of the path to maintain a path width of 2.5 metres, particularly between the Overpass and Flat Rock due to any Coastal Cypress trees or regenerating littoral rainforest or EECs etc. Also apply this principle at the Angels Beach Underpass to relocate the first 80 metres of path from the edge of the Coast Road to follow the old sand mining road/track to enhance the Coastal Recreation Experience. Continue path width of 2.5 metres from Sharpes Creek to Pat Morton Lookout.

Given the large areas that will be closed and revegetated this will be easy to achieve. Revegetation and rehabilitation has already been successfully achieved along large stretches of land on the eastern side of the Coast Road and can be therefore undertaken where required in respect of the proposed works. The Beachfront Parade Dune Care Group has undertaken the planting of thousands of seedlings and shrubs, and weed control activities for years. These plants have been provided by both Ballina Shire Council and the State Government. This experience has provided confirmation that any disturbance of the ground also causes a significant natural regeneration of native vegetation to occur. In the time frame of the proposed cycleway (over 25 years) Ballina Shire Council has supplied DuneCare groups with significant number of plants. Council is able to continue to provide significant numbers of plants for any revegetation/rehabilitation works for the Coastal Recreational Path project and therefore it is prudent that consideration be given to Habitat Compensatory Principles in order to maintain path width, alignment and surfaces.

It is suggested that it would have been appropriate for Section 7.1.2 Flora and Fauna, Objectives of the REF, to read:

- 'Minimize' Not 'Avoid' both direct and in direct impacts to all identified sensitive vegetation (i.e. EEC, Themeda grasslands, remnant rainforest) in the vicinity of the works area.
- 'Minimize' Not 'Minimisation' trimming and removal of native vegetation
- Where there are unavoidable impacts (including Endangered Ecological Communities (EECs)), Council should make a reasonable attempt to 'minimize' the impact as much as possible and/or use 'offsets' to compensate for any remaining impacts.

NSW Environment & Heritage have stated (by Phone 23/07/2013) that they would be in a position to support any project applying an additional, higher 'biodiversity offset principle', rather than just "avoid" impacts. Where there are unavoidable impacts (including EECs), one should make a reasonable attempt to 'minimize' the impact as much as possible or use 'offsets' to compensate for any remaining impacts.

It is considered prudent and appropriate to use the NSW Department of Environment & Heritage "principles for use of biodiversity offsets", by which to negotiate offsets, for the 'greater good of the community' re the Coastal recreational path (2.5m wide). In particular this should be applied re the potential removal of 15 Coastal Cypress Trees south of Flat Rock Tent Park if they can't be avoided, or else were as required. See figure 2

It is important to note that Dunecare groups have been planting plants / regenerating ecological communities from the Angels Beach Underpass to Sharps Creek, North Skennars Head to the back of Boulder Beach and Lennox Headland. Some of these works commenced at about 1989, with the full knowledge of a cycleway being established on the old sand mining road which is primarily Councils' preferred route now.

It is suggested that the Minister for Department of Planning & Infrastructure might form the opinion that the Coastal Recreational Path (old Sand Mining road) is important enough to call it in, as a state significant infrastructure or part of the East Coast Cycleway program. The Minister may be inclined to take a helicopter view of things for the protection of the greater public interest.

The NSW Government has developed the following seven principles to be used in assessing impacts to biodiversity and determining acceptable offsets for state significant development and state significant infrastructure projects. These principles can be seen below and at

http://www.environment.nsw.gov.au/biocertification/offsets.htm.

NSW offset principles for major projects (state significant development and state significant infrastructure)

The NSW Government has developed the following seven principles to be used in assessing impacts to biodiversity and determining acceptable offsets for state significant development and state significant infrastructure projects.

1. Before offsets are considered, impacts must first be avoided and unavoidable impacts minimised through mitigation measures. Only then should offsets be considered for the remaining impacts.

Offsets sit within a hierarchy of "avoid, minimise, offset". The first priority in a development proposal is always to avoid any unnecessary impact to biodiversity. Where impacts cannot be avoided, a reasonable attempt should be made to minimise the impact as much as possible. After all feasible measures have been taken to avoid or minimise impacts to biodiversity, offsets should be used to compensate for any remaining impacts.

2. Offset requirements should be based on a reliable and transparent assessment of losses and gains.

Offsetting decisions should be based on a reliable and transparent assessment of the loss in biodiversity due to the development proposal and the likely gain in biodiversity through the offset. For terrestrial biodiversity, established assessment tools, such as the BioBanking Assessment Methodology, are considered best practice. This methodology is currently being reviewed and refined to ensure it is as robust as possible.

3. Offsets must be targeted to the biodiversity values being lost or to higher conservation priorities.

Offsets should reflect the biodiversity values, including threatened species and their habitat, that are being lost. This should be on a like-for-like basis for NSW-listed species and ecological communities that are also nationally listed.

Like-for-like is preferable for ecological communities, threatened species and their habitat that are only listed in NSW. However, where offset sites that are exactly like-for-like are not reasonably available, offsets may include vegetation communities of a similar type or a type of a higher conservation priority, or threatened species of a higher conservation priority.

4. Offsets must be additional to other legal requirements.

The biodiversity protection and management requirements of an offset must be in addition to any legal requirements already in place for biodiversity on that land. This includes, for example, any existing legal restrictions on clearing under the Native Vegetation Act 2003. Improvements in the condition of native vegetation not currently required by other legislation would count as an offset.

5. Offsets must be enduring, enforceable and auditable.

Offset sites must be subject to good governance arrangements to ensure they are not inadvertently developed in the future. This includes having an appropriate plan of management, resourcing for management, legal security and accountability mechanisms.

For terrestrial offsets, a BioBanking Agreement or addition to the NSW national parks system are the preferred mechanisms for securing an offset site. The purchase and retirement of biodiversity credits under the BioBanking Scheme, where appropriate credits are available, also meets the requirement for good governance arrangements.

Suitable offsets must be determined prior to approval. However the offset does not need to be finalised (e.g. be purchased or have relevant protection over it) prior to approval, providing it is subject to a suitable mechanism that will remain enforceable after the project has been completed.

6. Supplementary measures can be used in lieu of offsets.

For terrestrial offsets, supplementary measures can be used in lieu of offsets in situations where land based offsetting is not feasible or practical. The supplementary measure must be relevant to the biodiversity value being impacted. The monetary value of a supplementary measure is to be determined by an appropriate method that is repeatable and transparent.

Examples of supplementary measures include the provision of funds for:

- Biodiversity research or surveys
- Recovery of threatened species
- Community education and awareness programs

Supplementary measures may also be used to compensate for impacts on aquatic biodiversity.

7. Offsets can be discounted where significant social and economic benefits accrue to NSW as a consequence of the proposal.

While an outcome in which biodiversity values are improved or maintained is preferred, it is acknowledged that in some circumstances flexibility may be required, especially in the context of a project providing significant social or economic benefits to NSW.

Sandmining

It is suggested that it would have been appropriate for detailed sand mining maps to have been provided in the REF. The Coastal Recreational path (2.5 metres wide) following BSC's preferred route on the Old Sand Mining Road from Angels Beach to Skennars Head as well as Boulders Beach are heavily disturbed landscapes due to early mining and heavy mineral sandmining activities.

Some Early Mining Leases Identified:

Charles Ainsworth & family lived at Black Head from 1918 to 1930 (Ref I.W Morley Book Black Sands & family diary of C. W. Ainsworth). During that period they held a mining lease or leases for the beach in front of Beachfront Parade. Evidence of the remains of the separation plant is still evident today on the rocky outcrop in front of the Barwen St entrance.

References to leases held for that area are Cecil Cumberland lease no. 32, Charles Ainsworth lease no.33& 34. In early 1924 lease 34 was transferred to C. G. Cumberland. By 1929 these various leases had been cancelled or had lapsed. Sometime after September a public company ,Beach Sandmining Co Limited obtained a mining lease at Flat Rock Creek. A concentrating plant, comprising a suction gas engine, curvilinear tables and pumps was erected on the site by Alf Neumann, who was a Director of Beach Sand Mining Co Ltd.

Heavy Mineral Sand Mining

A plan showing mining leases and details where mining activity occurred at Angels Beach to Skennars Headland from the NSW Department of Mineral resources can be seen in see Figure 3. The attached spread sheet below contains details on when mining activity occurred and when the Leases were in force.

Sand Mining Archaeological implications

The subject land or Ballina Shire Council's preferred route (Angel Beach, Flat Rock, Sharpes Beach and Boulder Beach) has **been sand mined** as early as 1924 with heavy mineral sand mining leases being granted for the area from 1956 to 1968 (NSW Department of Mineral Resources 01/05/03)

"Specifically within the study area (Angels Beach), sand mining activities would have had a <u>negative</u> impact on both surface and sub-surface cultural materials. It is **highly unlikely that archaeological material would be located** within the study area. If any material were present, the integrity of that material would be highly compromised. The Context of any material located would also be questionable" (Davies Heritage Consultants PTY LTD January 2004).

Sand Mining Ecological implications

The subject area has been highly modified during sand mining, followed by the area being planted out with Bitou bush to provide protection against erosion forces. Dune Care groups since the nineties have been slowly removing pockets of Bitou bush and Lantana and rehabilitating these areas with native vegetation cover. They have created pockets of regenerating endangered ecological communities' while other areas remain heavily disturbed.

Any unavoidable impacts of a Coastal Recreational path (2.5 metres wide) following BSC preferred route on the Old Sand Mining Road are of a very small scale on a heavily disturbed landscape and degraded vegetation.

The old sand mining road / CRP on Skennars Head is also heavily disturbed area (figure 4). Any EEC's need to be protected during construction but path alignment should remain over the old sand mining road. It can be seen that the current track is a minimum width of four metres filled with low class exotic dominant grassland. It is covered with Couch, Kikuyu, Clover, bindies etc. The track is also in urgent need of maintenance.

Sand Mining Hydrological implications

The natural hydrological regimes of Sharpes Creek, Flat Rock, Angels Beach and Boulder Beach have been altered due to sand mining and adjacent subdivision construction. The seasonal manmade pond south of Flat Rock is an example of the effects of this, coupled with the wettest period from the third week of January 2013 to more recently and since the 80's. The water disperses relatively quickly as the soil is sand.

If required, Should the path alignment have to be diverted around the 'Open Camp Site' just north of Flat Rock, it would be appropriate to use the compensatory habitat rule if required. It should be stressed that 'diverted around' should not mean going back up to the Coast Road.

The NSW Department of Mineral resources plan as seen in figure 3 shows mining leases ML 1 (SPL91), PML2 (SPL 183) & PML 4 (PLL 3541) where mining activity occurred at Flat Rock. The enclosed spread sheet above contains details on the mining activity occurring between 1957 & 1969 and when the Lease was in force. Therefore specifically within the Flat Rock area, sand mining activities would have had a negative impact on both surface and sub-surface cultural materials.

In respect of the reference to the 'open camp site' and '2 shell scatters' just north of Flat Rock, clarification is required as to whether 'avoidance and establishment of exclusion zone or apply for an AHIP' means a minor path adjustment around such items and that the path continues on in the same general direction.

Does 'Site Avoidance and Preservation' mean a minor path adjustment around such items and the path continues on in the same general area?

The Review of Environmental Factors (REF) does not state there are major environmental or engineering problems in the Flat Rock area that can't be mitigated or that it is necessary to encourage bike riders up Flat Rock Road to the Coast Road. The REF concluded that there would be minimal impact on the natural environment, flora and fauna (and their habitats) and that contingent upon the implementation of measures to mitigate and manage environmental impacts identified in the REF, the proposed Coastal Recreational Path is appropriate for approval.

Continue the Coastal Recreational Pathway south from the Angels Beach Disabled Ramp, along the existing track to the underpass at Bayview Drive, as opposed to along the Coast Road and use habitat compensatory rule if required.

The previous Shared Path DA, Angels Beach underpass to Flat Rock, was thrown out of Court on a Cultural Heritage Technicality; the Archaeologist report only considered Archaeology of the subject site and didn't include Anthropology report — the broader culture use of the area. The judge threw out the DA on this basis. There were no issues raised with Flora and Fauna. Based on this, the preferred track (shared Path) alignment should continue along the existing track from Angels Beach Disabled ramp to the underpass at Bayview Drive.

Re: Proposed Angels Beach - shared pathway (from Angels Beach pedestrian/cycleway underpass to Flat Rock Tent Park), BSC, Ordinary Meeting dated 27/11/2008 states, DECC response as: 'the declaration (of an Aboriginal Place

- East Ballina) would not jeopardise Council's ongoing efforts to secure approvals and construct the pathway on the basis that the preferred route **aligns** closely with the informal access track that has been in place for many years.'

Council should take DECC advice and give serious consideration to the realignment of the first 80 metres of Coastal recreational Path from the Angels Beach Underpass so that its route **aligns** closely with the informal access track (Figure 5) that has been in place for many years as opposed to following along the coast road for the first 80 metres.

It would be a significantly cheaper exercise to upgrade/maintain the existing shared pathway (Coastal Recreational Path) than to construct the new pathways on the western side.

In order to reduce costs, it would be possible to remove all unnecessary handrails on either side of the boardwalk sections. For example, what are the hazards that are that great that we need handrails from the Overpass to Flat Rock?

Removal of the boardwalk from Overpass to Flat Rock would result in significant savings. The previous Shared Path DA, Angels Beach Underpass to Flat Rock, was thrown out of Court on a Heritage technicality and there was no issue with Flora and Fauna, so why incur further costs by providing a raised boardwalk as opposed to gravel & asphalt from the Overpass to Flat Rock when clearly it is not required.

Extend the 'shared path' from Sharpes Creek to to Skennars Head and don't construct the new pathways on the western side for significant cost savings.

Extend the 'shared path' from Sharpes Creek to to Pat Morton Lookout and don't construct the new pathways on the Coast Road for significant cost savings. Also alternative route from Boulder Beach to Pat Morton Lookout is via BLHE-05 Dry stone wall.

Apply for grant funds from NSW Coastline Cycleway Program for the section Angels Beach Underpass to Skennars Headland and also Skennars Headland to Pat Morton Lookout.

Revegetation Works, within 1 metre of the edges of the Coastal Recreational Path are to be in keeping of the surrounding area. If plants are required they are to be of a very small size, have no root systems that will encroach the path surface and not have foliage that will over-hang/encroach the path. It is also imperative that good visibility be maintained within 1 metre of all path edges, is required for spotting of snakes (Brown, Black, Green, etc.).

EEC means endangered ecological community.

Coastal Recreation Path test is: can one ride a bike, formally, from the Underpass Angels Beach to Pat Morton Lookout?

It is considered prudent and appropriate to first obtain consent/approval and to complete construction of Coastal Recreational path works before transferring operational land at Flat Rock to community land. Any closure in the short term is considered premature and may compromise future negotiation opportunities for the pathway.

In Conclusion, any member of the public is currently entitled, physically, or as of legal right, to pass along the full length of public road reserve (whether on foot, in a vehicle or otherwise) and so any Coastal Recreational path proposal, must be for any member of the public to pass along the full length of the public road reserve, and on a path of an appropriate shared path standard (2.5m wide). Anything less, would be not be protecting the public interest or current entitlement over the land.

Skennars Head to Pat Morton Lookout Shared Path along the Coast Road incorporating (DA2013/194)

Pat Morton Lookout to Skennars Head Shared Path to have alignment altered to be predominantly incorporated into the Coastal recreational Path for a significantly improved public experience as opposed to alignment on the Coast Road.

The share path from Pat Morton Lookout to Skennars Head should be realigned from chainage 5500 at northern end of the Dry Stone wall (Figure 1), to ensure that the Shared Path continues to follows the existing mown path to the southern end of Dry Stone Wall or Tucker Roo tree as seen Figure 2 and then proceed in a south east direction on the existing emergency vehicle track as seen in figure 3 to connect with Coastal Recreational Path near the northern end of the timber board walk that spans over Boulder Beach wet land. Note The Tucker Roo tree in Figure 2, 3 & 4 as Figure 4 is at the intersection of the New alignment and Emergency Vehicle path looking west about 50 metres to the Coast Road. Note the Tuckeroo tree and the distance to White Car on Coast Road; A significantly improved experience as opposed to alignment on the Coast Road. The remainder of the Shared Path to Skennars Headland is no longer required resulting in cost savings and no potential SEPP 26 Littoral Rainforest impacts. The upgrade of the current path to shared path standards running by the Dry Stone Wall may require any impact to be mitigated. This realignment passes the stone wall which enhances the public experience and safety by not continuing on the edge of the Coast Road. If done right it will help preserve the Dry Stone Wall.



My comments are submitted in regard to the Boulders Beach to Pat Morton - Lennox Head section of the Coastal Recreation Path (CRP).

The document proposes that "The CRP would generally involve the formalisation of existing paths (both formal and informal) through the use of asphalt, gravel and wooden boardwalks".

Because the report does not identify where asphalt or gravel will apply it is difficult to assess the full impacts of the proposed upgrading. I see this as a major shortcoming of the environmental assessment. The use of gravel and asphalt potentially over the entire length of the path will impact on the current formal and informal pathways which in many sections are grassed/mown and have a low environmental and landscape impact. We are the managers of Flat Rock Tent Park and wish to express our **objection** to the section of this proposed Recreational Path being "constructed within tent park area with existing timber fence to remain in situ". NSW Public Works Review of Environmental Factors 5-18

There has been conflicting comments of the positioning of the recreation path but Paul Busmanis – Engineering Works manager, met with us on 24/07/13 and confirmed that the path has been planned to run within the Flat Rock Tent park area along the eastern fence line, running across sites 31 to 43. This planned path will go straight across 13 of the most popular sites in the tent park.

Paul Busmanis also confirmed that the planned path will be asphalt so all ages will be able to use the path including bikes and skateboards etc.

We believe this planned path will have a very negative effect on the future of the tent park and the tourists that enjoy camping here.

Following we have listed how we believe this Coastal Recreational Path (CRP) will have a detrimental effect on the tent park.

Loss of Tourists

Tourists are drawn to Flat Rock Tent Park for the unique natural bush land camping, right on the beach. Campers can relax in the serenity and quietness of Flat Rock Tent Park and it's bush surroundings.

Flat Rock Tent Park is enjoyed mainly by returning guests and new guests who have had the park recommended to them.

Our returning guests favour particular sites and the sites running along our eastern fence line, where the CRP is planned to run, are the MOST popular of all our sites in the entire park. Many of our campers will not camp on any other site other than these Eastern fence sites 31 to 43. These sites run at 50% to 73% occupancy on average a year, while the park occupancy average a year is 29%.

We have received many enquiries from campers upset about the planned pathway, many saying that if it goes ahead they will not be returning to camp at Flat Rock Tent Park. Most campers are not against the CRP but their issue is location, they do not want it inside or close to the park.

We believe as managers there will be a large loss of guests to the park due to this pathway. Losing these guests will have a huge impact on the business at Flat Rock Tent Park, as this business relies on our returning guests. This will also impact other local businesses our campers contribute to.

We do not believe having any type of security fencing is the answer to these issues, a fence will rob campers of the feel of the natural bush camping people come to love at Flat Rock tent Park. It would be a far better solution to put the CRP in the bush, as far away from camp sites as possible and as there is ample distance from beach to park for this to happen.

Increase in Noise due to asphalt path

From past experience we know that an asphalt path will attract bikes and skateboards etc, creating a noise problem for campers close to the CRP. Campers come to Flat Rock for the quiet and peaceful atmosphere it offers them, a public asphalt path will destroy this atmosphere.

One of the park rules set by Ballina Shire Council, is that we do not allow skateboards to be ridden in park due to noise and danger, if the CRP goes through the park how can we police a public path. This track needs to be away from the park for noise and safety reasons.

Restructuring of camp ground

The space needed in the Tent Park to allow for CRP will cause massive disruption to the entire layout of sites from site number 28 through to 87.

Sites will need to be relocated and renumbered. The road will need to be rebuilt or repositioned. Concrete bin pads will need to be removed and relocated. Solar lighting will need to be repositioned. We also have 7 taps and a water meter running along the eastern fence line that will need to be relocated, as we have to provide campers with town water access.


We do not have play grounds or swimming pools here at the tent park; families that stay with us enjoy ball games in the common grass areas of the park. These common areas will be lost if there is any reduction to the camp site area to allow for CRP.

This is not a simple task and will be quite costly. Paul Busmanis did indicate to us that these costs will all be allowed for in planning of the CRP but why waste money on the restructure of the tent park when all this could be avoided by building the CRP in the bush, away from park?

Construction activities

We also have other concerns about the work being done in the surrounding areas of the park, such as the boardwalk on the southern side. The project information did not give any details on the Contractors access for this work. If access is being provided through the tent park for this construction work there will be considerable damage done to the grounds. A significant amount of money and work has gone into maintaining and improving the park grounds. Also it would be a major disruption to the campers.

The Impact Assessment stated "construction activities such as stockpiling and machinery would be visible from one residence at Boulder beach, Flat Rock Tent Park recreational areas and roads/car parks along the route during construction but the continuous nature of the construction would be temporary and the impact would be minor". This statement is not very detailed as to what the anticipated timing of "construction activities and machinery" would be around the Flat Rock Tent Park. For example does the contractor intend using the Flat Rock Area (being the Tent Park and the car park) for the duration of the construction of the whole of the CRP or just for the length of time to construct the CRP in the immediate areas around Flat Rock. Are there any restrictions on how much machinery and stockpiling will be allowed and considerations on limiting inconvenience to the public users of this area and the campers? Can we possibly request that work around the Flat Rock area is planned between May and August so as not to cause major disruption to our campers?


Working casually at the Flat Rock Tent Park I have conversations with many of the campers who love this amenity provided by Ballina. To see this degraded by the CRP would be a loss to the Shire of Ballina. It is obvious that the sites the CRP will take out are the most popular as campers are always requesting them, they often adjust their holiday to fit in with a vacancy on these favourite sites and will not take an alternative one.

This path would change the whole atmosphere of a unique camping experience that finds guests returning year after year. The guests using this facility bring business to the local area using shops, hotels, restaurants and clubs. They enjoy the tranquility the park offers, the bush setting, the privacy, the closeness to the beach and a camp ground that offers recreational sections of grass for parents and children to play ball games etc.

The project proposal has given detailed reports on the effect of the CRP on the flora and fauna and rightly so, but it did lack considering the people who travel to our Shire to enjoy the amenity of Flat Rock Tent Park and it did not have any consultation with the Manager's who have the knowledge of the guest's needs and preferences. It also overlooked the safety of children who stay in the park. Currently walkers do pass through the park but these are minimal and walk clearly in the vision of all campers. This proposed asphalt path would encourage a lot more use (as it is intended) but would place the children of the campers in a position vulnerable to strangers, bikes and skateboards.

An alternative option would be to take the path through the bush area as far away from the park as possible from the southern and eastern boundary fences, this could then meet up with the viewing platform (on the public track that goes to the beach) and join the new track that starts adjacent to the platform running north and exiting at the northern section of Flat Rock car park. If the CRP was distanced as far away as possible from the campers, with a densely planted screening along the fence line it would offer privacy, safety, protection from wind and decrease the security risk for campers. The bush area east of the fence on the eastern side of the park is actually an eyesore at the present time with a lot of dead trees and dead branches stockpiled scattered throughout. A recreational path winding through this area would actually enhance it.

This path is called a recreational path, a recreational path should meander through the bushland with observation platforms at our Shire's scenic assets, (as the current section does) not a straight asphalt path. The CRP would miss the most spectacular viewing of Flat Rock if it passes through the park and down the road past the public

Re: Grassy headland between Lennox Head and Boulders beach

There are many people in the Lennox Community who oppose a longditudinal path along the coastline on the grassy headland between Lennox Head (Pat Morten Lookout) and Boulders beach.

I moved to Lennox Head from Sydney after taking that walk. I thought to myself "I could live here". A friend recently said to me she reached the top there and started walking down and had a real "sound of music moment". She has recently moved from the Gold Coast precisely to get away from all the concrete and gravel paths.

Her comment made me laugh because it is so true! I see families and people of all ages with a sparkle in their eye as they walk, run or ride down the headland to Boulders beach. You can tell they are on holiday, and feel like they are, because they are racing down a grassy headland to a secluded beach. Where else can you do this?

A longtidinual path is the wrong choice because

- 1. It is unnecessary. There simply is no good reason to do it.
- 2. The reasoning that it will improve access for less mobile people is flawed. Less mobile people are not going to venture so far in the first place they will not want to stray so far from basic amenities such as toilets, rest spots, their car and to such a steep spot.
- Access for less mobile people could be increased through a number of finger paths from the road to coast with minimal aesthetic impact.
- It will completely destroy the viewshed and the uniqueness of the place, a massive gravel path carving up the hill.
- 5. It will be unpleasant to walk on. It will be baking hot and hard.
