Draft Ballina Local Environmental Plan

RE-EXHIBITION

Council has been preparing a new local environmental plan (LEP) for the Ballina Shire over the last few years. The LEP is significant as it establishes the local planning framework for land use and development. It addresses a variety of issues including land zoning, building form, subdivision and environmental management.

Council undertook the public exhibition of its draft LEP between March and June 2010 and in response to public feedback, some adjustments to the draft LEP were made.

Council also decided to provide further opportunity for public comment on the revised draft LEP prior to its finalisation.

We are planning to exhibit the revised draft LEP in September. The shire's swimming pools are now open for the 2011/12 season. The pools at Alstonville and Ballina opened approximately 36 years ago and have served the community well. It is inevitable however that the swimming pools undergo improvement to meet the community's needs.

A discussion paper has been developed to highlight current maintenance issues, and includes options for remediation and redevelopment. The desired outcome of discussion surrounding this document is to set a direction for the future of swimming pool facilities managed by Council.

The dangers of asbestos have been well documented in recent years with microscopic asbestos fibres capable of causing asbestosis or lung cancer.

Many buildings erected between the 1940s and 1980s contain asbestos (fibrocement). It was commonly used as a lining in bathrooms, wet areas and under eaves and as insulation. It was a particularly popular building material in coastal areas because of its resistance to salt air.

Many houses, although they may not appear to, still contain asbestos and this is not dangerous if the building is in good condition and the asbestos is not disturbed. Health risks arise when asbestos is handled or broken, particularly when buildings are renovated or demolished.

Because of the public health risk associated with asbestos the NSW Government has strict laws associated with the disturbance, removal, transportation and disposal of the material.

If more than 10 square metres needs to be removed use a licenced asbestos remover.

Never pressure clean asbestos.

Minimise risk by using products available on the market that can be painted direct to the surface without having to prepare first.

Asbestos can only be disposed of at a waste facility licenced to receive it. Ballina Shire's waste facility is not currently licenced. The nearest licenced facility is at Lismore where it must be delivered triple-wrapped.

Kerbside Collection

Why does Ballina Shire not have a bulky collection service?

Some sections of the community are critical of the Council for not providing a bulky kerbside collection service. Council has, in fact, investigated this issue thoroughly and has contacted other local governments that provide a service for their ratepayers. After weighing up the options Council decided against a bulky kerbside collection service for a number of reasons. These reasons include:

- A Council service targeted to the whole community is more expensive when compared to the total cost of individuals managing their own needs - in other council areas the service costs \$15-\$20 per household.
- Kerbside collection is inconsistent with Council's programs which encourage the reduction, reuse or recycling of unwanted goods and waste and also the "polluter pays" principles, as endorsed by the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage.
- Evidence from other councils is that participation rates are relatively low and decline after the initial service.
- Poorly presented waste can escape into the environment.
- There are often ongoing management issues with residents continuing to place waste in the street after the collection day and throughout the
- The presentation of hazardous materials creates safety risks and issues for the wider community and waste collection staff.
- The private sector is able to provide services on demand to those who require specific assistance.

What to do with your larger unwanted items?

There are a number of options for managing your bulky household waste

- Save your unwanted items for Council endorsed programs such as the Garage Sale Trail or Second Hand Saturday.
- Sell or give away your items for free online search "sell items free" or "give away items free".
- Take unwanted (quality and unbroken) goods/clothing to local charity shops.
- Use the Recycling Near You website www.recyclingnearyou.com.au to find local drop-off options for items including computers, batteries, printer cartridges and other recyclable items.





More on Waste

Many urban residents will have noticed their waste service charge has increased by \$13.50 per quarter in the 2011/12 year. Whilst Council would prefer not to raise fees, a portion of the additional revenue has been used to implement the 3-bin waste service.

Ballina Shire urban residents have three bins for organic waste, recyclables and mixed waste.

Why is there a 3-bin service?


- Our landfill is filling up and will be at capacity in five to seven years if we continue sending waste to landfill at our current rate. We can potentially double the remaining life of our landfill by using a 3-bin system. In addition to this, a residential organics service must be in place prior to the State Government approving landfill development or extension.
- The 3-bin system creates the potential to recycle up to 50% more of our waste that was previously going to landfill. The garden and organic waste is converted to usable compost.
- Up to 70 tonnes of material is potentially prevented from going to landfill every week. Organic material decomposing in landfill produces the greenhouse gases carbon dioxide and methane.
- It is more cost effective to implement the service and remove garden and organic waste before it gets to landfill than to pass on the ever-increasing State Government taxes to ratepayers. By reducing the amount of waste going to landfill means, we pay less in State Government taxes.

Initial results on the urban 3-bin waste service

The urban 3-bin service is off to a great start with results from the first month showing:

- 378 tonnes of organic waste being transferred to Lismore for processing to compost in July 2011.
- 41% less waste was deposited in the Ballina Shire landfill (when compared to the monthly figures from July last year).
- A relatively low contamination rate at under 1% with plastic bags considered the biggest contaminant.

Comparison of Waste to Landfill July 2010 and July 2011



These figures are considered very positive for the start of a new organics service and Ballina Shire residents are congratulated on their enthusiasm to reduce waste to landfill and recycled organic waste.



GREEN LIGHTS FOR ALSTONVILLE

Six new street lights to be installed in Alstonville as part of the CBD upgrade will be fitted with new LED lighting technology.

This is the first time these 100-watt LED lights have been used for street lighting on the north coast.

The new lights contain no mercury and last about 13 years longer and use approximately 60-70% less energy than the 400-watt metal halide lamps currently used for lighting up our streets.

STRAYING STOCK

Stock owners are asked to ensure their fencing is adequate to keep stock from straying onto public land.

There is potential for a serious accident if stock stray onto public roads and other areas. Rangers have the authority to issue penalty notices to owners who fail to keep their animals confined.

Illegal Parking

Did you know that parking on the footpath is illegal in most circumstances? You can be fined for illegal parking even if there is not a built concrete walkway or even if the footpath is on a dead end street.





RESPONSIBLE PET OWNERSHIP

Pets are much loved family members and it is very upsetting when a pet goes missing or gets lost.

There are a number of simple measures that will help make it easier to reunite an owner with their pet if it ever goes missing.

Registering your pets

The NSW Companion Animals Act 1998 requires all dogs and cats in NSW to be microchipped by the age of 12 weeks and registered for life by six months of age.

All dogs and cats must wear a collar and have a tag that shows the name of the animal and address or telephone number of the owner of the animal.

While these requirements only apply whilst the animal is not on the property where the owner is the occupier, it is a good idea to make sure pets can always be easily identified.

Other dog matters

PICK UP WHAT YOUR DOG DROPS

Are you the type of dog owner who carries a plastic bag and picks up their dog's poo?

Or are you the owner who turns the other way when their dog defecates...pretending not to notice...perhaps kicking sand over the mess so some unsuspecting beach-goer will end up with it oozing between their toes?

There are a lot of people who do not clean up after their dogs and this is a constant source of irritation for other members of the community.

Aside from being unsightly, there are health and environmental reasons for picking up your dog's droppings.

It helps to decrease the amount of nutrients entering waterways and reduces the risk of diseases being spread from direct or indirect human contact with faeces.

All dog owners are required by law to clean up after their pets if they defecate in a public place. Failure to do so could mean a fine of \$275.

ROAMING DOGS

Council's Rangers have noticed an increase in the number of roaming/straying dogs in the last several months. These are animals in a public place that aren't on a leash or lead and under the control of a competent person.

If the Ranger sees an animal in public, unleashed and not controlled, a fine of \$220 may be issued.

BARKING DOGS

Barking dogs is a common complaint made to Council. These matters are often very difficult to resolve because:

- Different people have different views about what is a
 noise nuisance. This varies from the location of the dog
 in relation to the person making the complaint; the noise
 tolerance level of the complainant; the type of barking and
 the time/length of the barking.
- Gathering evidence and completing a "barking dog" diary is time consuming and difficult.
- Council Rangers need to investigate complaints to determine whether the barking is causing a problem.
- Council Rangers require the person making the complaint to be a witness in Court and provide evidence if the matter is to proceed.
- The owners are often unaware their dog is barking excessively.

Council encourages people to discuss their concerns regarding nuisance barking with the owner of the dog before lodging a complaint with Council. The dog owner may not be aware their dog is barking particularly if it is only when they are out.

In most cases owners want to do the right thing and will cooperate.

Welcome to the second installment of 'Water Talk' for 2011.

The Ballina Shire Council's Urban Water Management
Strategy (UWMS) is currently focused on the BallinaLennox Head Recycled Water Master Plan, which is a major
component of the strategy.

This Master Plan aims to achieve a wastewater reuse target of 80% by the year 2026. Construction of the recycled water treatment plants has now begun with completion planned for late 2012.

Progress on the Ballina – Lennox Head Recycled Water Master Plan

• Lennox Head Wastewater Treatment Plant

The interim Lennox Head Wastewater Treatment Plant upgrade is now complete with the new inlet works operational. A new control building with laboratory, storage facilities and an educational area for visiting groups and schools has also been completed.

Ballina and Lennox Head Wastewater
 Treatment Plants Ultimate Upgrades

Construction activities have now commenced on upgrades to the wastewater treatment plants that will allow the reuse of up to 80% of Ballina and Lennox Head's wastewater. These facilities will allow high quality recycled water to be re-used:

- on urban open space areas such as parks and playing fields;
- in homes with dual reticulation; and
- in vegetation regeneration projects.

The Ballina Wastewater Treatment Plant will be decommissioned and demolished. A new wastewater treatment plant will be built along with a sludge dewatering facility to remove water from the remaining sludge before disposal.

At the Lennox Head Wastewater Treatment Plant a new plant will be built and added to the existing wastewater treatment plant to deliver high quality recycled water, along with a new UV system and a system for chemical

dosing to reduce phosphorous in the ocean discharge.

Are we talking about recycling water for drinking?

No, the recycled water is only for use on urban open spaces, through dual reticulation and vegetation regeneration projects.

Water terms explained

Recycled Wastewater - Recycled wastewater is wastewater that has undergone a rigorous series of advanced treatment processes to remove organic matter, nutrients and micro-organisms to deliver water that is cleaner, clearer, odourless and disinfected.

Dual reticulation - Two separate pipe networks: one supplies drinking (potable) water and the other supplies recycled water.

Recycled Water Treatment Plant

(RWTP) - A facility that processes treated water from the wastewater treatment plant to a higher quality for use within the community, in particular for residential re-use for gardens, toilet flushing and car washing.

Wastewater - Wastewater is generated from commercial, industrial and residential properties including waste from the toilet, kitchen, bathroom and laundry.

Sewerage - The system of pipes and pump stations and treatment plants used to transport and treat wastewater.
