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from the **mayor's desk**

As I am writing this message, the East Coast Low is bearing down on our Shire. It's at times like this that we depend on our volunteers, those who put their lives at risk to make it safer for the rest of us, as well as Council

staff who are on call to inspect roads and maintain infrastructure. Thank you for your valuable work and dedication.

I'm often told you can tell when they leave the Shire because the quality of the road network changes. Ballina Shire Council has listened to community surveys and placed road construction and rehabilitation as a top priority. Council's four year delivery program, a copy of which is on our website, has a schedule for the road reconstruction projects. We have also been fortunate in gaining Federal and State funding for blackspot programs and infrastructure projects. Works on Teven Road, River Street and Angels Beach Drive are just three recent projects.

I recently visited the Lennox Head Wastewater Treatment Plant to witness the amazing technology that will deliver recycled water to Aspect, Elevation, Coastal Grove and Angels Beach North estates. The West Ballina Treatment Plant will also soon be delivering the same high quality recycled water to the Ballina Heights area.

These two wastewater plants feature the latest technologies and are among the best in Australia. The use of the 1,200 solar panels at West Ballina and operational refinements at Lennox Head have saved on electricity grid requirements and have provided a much improved environmental outcome.

If you travel around the Shire you can see many recent Council Projects completed or progressing to finalisation. The Wigmore Arcade redevelopment, new parking and public toilets have added vibrancy to the Ballina town centre. The Marine Rescue Tower is well underway and work on the Coastal Recreational Path between Ballina and Lennox Head is progressing well. Major works are also planned for the Ballina – Byron Gateway Airport terminal upgrade and the Southern Cross Industrial Estate in the short term.

Visitors to the area often comment to me that Ballina Shire is a marvellous place to visit because of the open spaces, cleanliness and other amenities. No wonder many are returning to set up their future in the area.

The community will be amazed when they get the opportunity to see and use the new sporting grounds at Wollongbar which cater for a wide variety of sports. Wardell residents and visitors will soon have a new boardwalk along the river edge to allow safe passage for the public to travel under the current highway. This project has been a long time coming and Council and the Wardell Progress Association should be congratulated for continuing to work together to deliver much needed infrastructure.

Finally, I wish to thank all the Councillors for their efforts to enable Ballina Shire Council to continue to deliver valuable infrastructure and facilities throughout the Shire. Much of the planning and securing sound financial structure to deliver these outcomes has taken many years of effort, planning and difficult decisions.

Prospective Councillors in the upcoming elections will have the opportunity to share their knowledge and expertise to continue the journey.

BREAKING NEWS: Olympic Winter Ski Jump Training Facility for Lake Ainsworth

Last week the NSW Government, Federal Government and the Australian Olympic Committee announced the establishment of the Australian Winter Olympic Ski Jumping Training Facility at the NSW Sport and Recreation Centre at Lake Ainsworth, Lennox Head. The \$10 million NSW Government project will include a number of ski jumps, 14 lane swimming pool, and the reconstruction and sealing of Camp Drewe Road to formalise the northern entrance to the NSW Sport and Recreation Centre.

This facility will be located wholly within the NSW Sport and Recreation Centre and will not impact on Lake Ainsworth.







Local Government Elections

WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO BE A COUNCILLOR?

The NSW Local Government Elections will be held on Saturday, 10 September 2016. Our community has to elect nine Councillors and a Mayor. Have you thought about being a Councillor on the Ballina Shire Council?

Ballina Shire residents want Councillors who are enthusiastic and passionate about the community and who are willing to learn new skills. It's an important job. Some of the skills, knowledge and attributes that are helpful for councillors include:

- Communication skills, including listening and interpersonal skills, public speaking, respecting different opinions, negotiation, mediation and conflict resolution skills;
- Problem solving and analytical skills in order to get to the core of a problem and come up with good solutions;
- Teamwork because councillors need to work together to benefit the community;
- Organisational skills including time management and priority setting;
- Understanding of financial and reporting processes, including understanding budget processes and financial reports;
- Ability to engage with the community;
- Understanding of social justice principles;
- Understanding of the role and services of local government;
- Ability to understand relevant State Government legislation;
- Leadership qualities, such as energy, optimism, motivation, resilience, confidence, assertiveness;
- Strategic thinking, advocacy and networking;
- Ethical and accountable behaviour and a commitment to acting in the best interests of the community as a whole.



Councillors receive lots of information and training to help them fulfil their roles




Being a councillor is an opportunity to serve your community, and this involves a commitment of your time.

Generally councillors spend 10-15 hours each week on council activities, depending on the issues that arise.

Councillors are expected to attend all council meetings. Ballina Shire Council meets every fourth Thursday of the month.

How long have you been a Councillor? I have been a councillor on Ballina Shire Council for two terms - that is eight years.

Why did you stand for Council? I decided

to stand for Council because I love our town. I was concerned for its future and wanted to make sure that the people around the table made the right decisions for all the right reasons. I decided the only way to do that was to be at that table.

What is your most significant achievement as a Councillor?

I take pride in some of the achievements of the past two terms of council including the:

- Ballina town centre upgrade
- Refurbishment of the Wigmore Arcade
- Lighthouse Beach Surf Club
- Ballina Marine Rescue Tower
- Decision to fund the upgrade of both Ballina and Alstonville pools
- Expansion of the Ballina Byron Gateway Airport
- On-going progress of the Coastal Recreational Pathway. This is no doubt one of the most significant projects that allows locals and visitors alike to enjoy our beautiful coastline.

What are your plans after September?

I have no desire to retire. As a board member of North Coast Community Housing (NCCH), my focus will be on housing for people with special needs and those who are socially disadvantaged. My husband Bruce and I run pet friendly boutique holiday accommodation catering for people with disabilities. We are in the process of renovating a second dwelling.

What's one piece of advice you would give to someone who wants to be a Councillor?

My advice to anyone thinking of running for council is to be a good listener; be prepared for lots of reading and understand that you are unlikely to make everybody happy. Generally people don't like change - NIMBY (not in my back yard) is the new black!!!

How long have you been a Councillor?
Over 24 years between the years 1983 and 1995, including six years as Mayor, and then again in 2004 to 2016.

Why did you stand for Council? In 1983 Ballina Shire Council initiated work on what became the 1987 Local Environmental Plan (LEP). They issued studies, held information sessions, and generated a lot of discussion and interest in the plans and the proposals they contained. As a ratepayer I had concerns about some of the proposals and could not persuade Council to modify them, so instead I stood for Council to be able to put my views directly to the staff involved.

What is your most significant achievement as a Councillor?

I initiated the Land Development Committee (LDC) to bring a strong business emphasis to the land sales Council was using to supplement rates and charges income. The LDC quickly became a reliable source of additional revenue over the years and steadily widened its activities.

By the late 1990s the LDC had provided additional revenue for social infrastructure generally amounting to about \$30 million. In the early 2000s its success was widely acknowledged and its role was enlarged and the Commercial Services Unit (CSU) was created. The CSU has continued the good work of the LDC in gaining extra revenue for additional infrastructure wanted and needed by the community.

What are your plans after September?

I look forward to travelling, painting and observing the progress of Ballina Shire Council and the Northern Rivers region generally.

What's one piece of advice you would give to someone who wants to be a Councillor?

Learn to say 'no' without causing needless angst – or if you cannot avoid upsetting people, stay polite and stick to your guns.

How long have you been a Councillor?
Two terms, eight years.

Why did you stand for Council?

I am passionate about our beautiful area and community and felt

the Councillors at the time didn't reflect the changing nature of a modern Ballina. I knew I would put in the effort required to do the work as best I could to represent residents.

What is your most significant achievement as a Councillor?

Being able to make decisions based on what I felt was right rather than political agendas.

Some items I am proud to have had a key role in are: fluoride, to address significant health issues across three local government areas, the paving and raising of North Wall to become a fabulous walking place for locals and visitors, a street tree program in urban areas and recently a \$1.5 million pressure and water leakage program on Ballina Island which will save 190 mega-litres of water and \$350,000 annually.

What are your plans after September?

I plan to continue my part-time Special Education work at Ballina Public School and spend more time focussed on my family. We now have three small grandchildren and elderly parents we also care for.

What's one piece of advice you would give to someone who wants to be a Councillor?

Always remember you are responsible for Ballina Shire ratepayers' money.

Do the work required to understand the very wide ranging business of Ballina Shire Council, use the outstanding staff to help you. Be proactive about the change you want to see. Develop a thick skin as there is always some disagreement!



THE **PURPOSE** OF THIS PLAN

The primary purpose of the Ballina Major Regional Centre Strategy is to advance and consolidate Ballina as a regional centre on the North Coast. The strategy is an aspirational blueprint to drive Ballina forward as a key economic centre built on a strong community and exceptional environmental features and recreational opportunities.

REVIEWING PROCESS

Ensuring this strategy remains contemporary and reflective of the community's aspirations will be an important aspect of the 20 year strategy. The periodic review of the strategy's outcomes will help determine if these outcomes continue to reflect the community's needs and desires in terms of the current issues and concerns of the time. Feedback from the review process can then be used to adjust the actions of the strategy if required to better address these needs. It is planned that this review process will occur every four years to coincide with Council's broader four year planning cycle.

The ongoing evaluation and monitoring of the strategy will involve:

- Branding and active tracking of BMRCS initiatives for community awareness.
- Ongoing use of social media and conventional media to keep the community informed of progress.
- Engagement with the project Civic Panel on an annual basis for at least three years.
- Annual reporting on implementation progress for at least the first three years.
- Four yearly review of the strategy (to coincide with elected Council terms).

BALLINA2035 STRATEGY

BALLINA MAJOR REGIONAL CENTRE STRATEGY

The Ballina Shire is a great place to live and its popularity looks set to continue to grow with the NSW Government identifying Ballina as a future major regional centre. To make sure this growth is balanced and represents the interests of our community, we have developed the Ballina2035 Strategy which will guide Ballina's development as a major regional centre over the next 20 years.

Council spent two years talking with a wide range of community and industry groups, government agencies and members of the public to get ideas and strategies about what people want Ballina to look like in the future. This information formed the basis of the Ballina2035 Strategy.

Ballina2035 covers a broad range of Council's operational areas, including: open space and healthy living, economic development, character, culture and amenity, community facilities and infrastructure, environment and housing.

The actions in Ballina2035 will be incorporated into Council's Operational and Delivery Plans over time. Council has also allocated an annual recurrent budget of \$20,000 for the implementation of the strategy more broadly. The Civic Panel, made up of community members who provided advice and input into the strategy, will monitor the first three years of the implementation of Ballina2035.

We have already started a number of projects identified in the strategy, including:

- Road works to Angels Beach Drive to improve the efficiency and safety of Ballina's road network:
- Construction of the coastal pathway to improve pedestrian accessibility, encourage active lifestyles and support Ballina's environmental and cultural values;
- The preparation of master plans for the Martin Street Boat Harbour and the Ballina Trawler Harbour and construction of the Ballina Marine Rescue Tower, to provide improved maritime infrastructure;
- The preparation of an Economic Development Strategy to support economic opportunities in the Ballina Shire.

Other projects planned for the 2016/2017 financial year include upgrades to Pop Denison Park and Captain Cook Park, place activation initiatives, installation of public art, redevelopment of the Ballina Pool and expansion of the Ballina Byron Gateway Airport terminal.

Marine Rescue Tower Update

Regular visitors to North Wall at Ballina will have noticed the construction of the new Marine Rescue tower is progressing well with the concrete roof slab poured in May. The tower is now at full height and when finished will provide sensational views for the Marine Rescue volunteers.

We're hoping the tower will be finished around September 2016. Once the volunteers are operational in the new building, work will commence to demolish the old tower and refurbish the existing toilet block.

WOLLONGBAR SPORTSFIELDS

The earth works for the sportsfields are finished and the grass is coming along slowly.

The road has been formed and stormwater drainage and water and sewer pipes have been installed. The majority of the electrical works have been completed.

Work on the amenities building, which will house public toilets and change rooms, has started. Council also recently installed a time lapse camera to document the development.

CHANGING PLACES TOILET // TRANSFORMING LIVES

A new "Changing Places" toilet for people with severe disabilities has been installed at the Wigmore Arcade Carpark near the bus interchange in Tamar Street, Ballina.

Changing Places facilities, which originated in the UK in 2006, caters to the needs of adults and children with severe and profound disabilities who require specialist equipment, including an adult sized change table and ceiling hoist, to use the bathroom.

Ballina is the first regional NSW centre north of Sydney to install a Changing Places facility.

What is MLAK? The Master Locksmith Access Key (MLAK) is a system that provides access for people with a disability to public amenities across Australia.

What does it cost? There is no cost to eligible Ballina Shire residents.

How can I get a MLAK? From Ballina Shire Council's Customer Service Centre, 40 Cherry Street, Ballina.

Where can I use the MLAK? A MLAK can be used at the following locations in Ballina Shire:

- BUS INTERCHANGE, Tamar Street, Ballina
- WIGMORE ARCADE River Street, Ballina
- CAPTAIN COOK PARK Moon Street, Ballina
- BICENTENNIAL GARDENS Pacific Highway, Ballina
- MISSINGHAM PARK Kingsford Smith Drive, Ballina,

New Play Equipment for Ballina Shire

A new \$115,000 playground at Geoff Watt Oval in Alstonville is open and ready to be inundated by children.

The upgrade at Geoff Watt Oval is a result of Council's annual playground renewal plan. New play equipment has also been installed at a number of other parks in the shire, including Westlands Park West Ballina, Lions Park and Lakefield Park Lennox Head, Alabaster Park Alstonville, Missingham Park Ballina, and Fitzroy Park and Lindsay Park in Wardell.

Council officers and contractors have been busy inspecting, maintaining and upgrading play equipment in parks across the Ballina Shire.

The inspections and upgrades will ensure our community and visitors have play equipment that not only meets contemporary standards, but provides a safe and fun place for all kids and their carers to enjoy.

We are about to do a major installation at Kings Court Park in Lennox Head. We've ordered \$80,000 worth of equipment that will be installed in September 2016. Landscaping, paths and picnic shelters will follow.

The play equipment works undertaken this financial year across the Ballina Shire are valued at approximately \$300,000.



road projects

RECENTLY COMPLETED

Teven Road, between Eltham Road and Shaws Lane – Black Spot Roadworks

The \$900,000 project, which was funded under the Australian Government's Black Spot program, included a non-skid surface, pavement markers and the reshaping of bends to improve safety for drivers.

CURRENT PROJECTS

Ballina Street, Lennox Head

The upgrade of the footpath along the western side of Ballina Street, Lennox Head between the Coast Road roundabout and Allens Parade is currently underway. The footpath was originally 1.8m wide but because of the steepness of a wall embankment, sediment has settled on some sections of the footpath and narrowed the path.

The Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) has provided part funding to:

- Reinstate the full width of the existing footpath
- Install a low level wall to link the existing retaining walls
- Replace the rock catching fence.

Angels Beach Drive - Black Spot Roadworks

Council is continuing the upgrade of Angels Beach Drive which has been identified by the RMS as a black spot.

Stage 1 - Curve correction adjacent to Chickiba Lake has been completed.

Stage 2 - Curve correction northeast of Prospect Bridge has been completed.

Stage 3 – Roundabout construction at the Links Avenue and Angels Beach Drive intersection is likely to start late June 2016. During this stage the road will remain open with traffic control in place.

This is a \$2 million project totally funded by the RMS.

Boardwalk Construction - Coastal Recreational Pathway

The construction of the Coastal Recreation Path between Flat Rock and Sharpes Beach carparks is now complete. The next section, between the Angels Beach pedestrian overpass and the Flat Rock Tent Park started in early June.

During these works the existing track between the Angels Beach pedestrian overpass and the Flat Rock Tent Park will be closed.

An area at the Angels Beach carpark will also be closed for the contractor's compound.

It is expected that this section will be finished by the end of August (weather permitting).

The Council has approved the construction of the next stage of asphalt pathway east of the Flat Rock Tent Park. This will connect to Sharpes Beach through to the underpass at Headlands. These works will start once the Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) has been approved.



NSW GOVERNMENT SHARK MANAGEMENT STRATEGY UPDATE

The NSW Government is steaming ahead with the rollout of trials of new and emerging technologies as part of its innovative \$16 million Shark Management Strategy.

The Strategy is the first of its kind in the world, and is about looking at new and better methods to detect and deter sharks right along the NSW coastline. A range of new and emerging technologies are being trialled, which includes two shark barriers to be installed in front of the Lennox Head-Alstonville Surf Life Saving Club, and at Lighthouse Beach, Ballina.

The shark barrier due for installation at Lighthouse Beach is on hold pending the relocation of a large amount of sand currently in the way. Manufacture of the Lennox Head barrier is ongoing and is on schedule for installation in coming months.


Ten VR4G listening stations have been deployed along the North and Mid-North coast including those at Lennox Head, Ballina, Byron Bay and Evans Head. Drone and helicopter trials have been completed at Byron Bay and shark tagging programs also continue on the North Coast.

NSW DPI is hosting a community forum this month to update the community on progress in the Ballina region. Leading shark scientists will be in attendance to discuss the latest shark research and updates on the Shark Management Strategy.

OUR MAYOR, HONOURED WITH AN OAM

Our Mayor, Councillor David Wright, has been named on the 2016 Queens Birthday honours list for an Order of Australia Medal (OAM). Cr Wright has been recognised for his service to the community of Ballina, and his active involvement in education and sport.

Cr Wright was very humble in accepting this honour, and felt that it was an award for all of Ballina.

Aside from his 29-years of service to Ballina Shire Council, Cr Wright's service to the community includes:

Richmond River County Council, Wollongbar Progress Association, Alstonville and District Ratepayers and Citizens Association, Alstonville Basketball Club, Alstonville Public School, Lismore Demonstration School, Captain Flat Public School and Alstonville Adult Education/Ballina Region Community College.



Important Changes to Swimming Pool Laws

The NSW Government has introduced new pool fencing legislation that applies to certain properties containing a swimming pool which are leased or sold.

The changes are:

- All properties containing pools subject to a rental lease after the 29
 April 2016 must be registered on the NSW Pool Register and have
 a valid certificate of Compliance or relevant Occupation certificate
 (certificates valid for a period of 3 years) with a copy being provided to
 the tenant.
- All properties subject to sale and that are exchanged on or after 29 April 2016 must be registered on the NSW Pool Register and have either a valid certificate of Compliance or relevant Occupation certificate or certificate of Non-compliance attached to the contract of sale.
- Vendors can transfer the obligation of obtaining a certificate of compliance to the purchaser (certificate of non-compliance must be attached to the contract of sale).
- Certificates of both compliance and non-compliance are to be issued by accredited certifiers (local councils or private) generated from the NSW Swimming Pools Register.
- Certificates of non-compliance must contain a schedule of outstanding matters and must be issued within 7 days after the pool inspection.
- Certificates of non-compliance are valid for 12 months.
- Buyers have 90 days from date of settlement to rectify defects listed in the certificate of non-compliance and obtain a certificate of compliance, unless councils determine that a significant public risk exists where a direction with a lesser time period may be issued on the property owner.
- Privately accredited certifiers are to report non-compliance matters (where a notice is issued) to councils under section 22E(4) of Swimming Pools Act.
- Strata or Community title subdivision schemes containing more than two lots are exempted from the requirements.
- Off the plan contracts are exempted from the requirements.

Vegetation on roundabouts does not cause accidents. In fact studies from the Australia Road Research Board have found that plants on roundabouts actually make drivers slow down to look for traffic.

Studies have found that drivers approaching roundabouts with no vegetation often do not slow down as much because their line of sight is better. Sometimes they don't see vehicles already on the roundabout.

There are Australian Standards that determine the appropriate scale and position of vegetation on roundabouts and Council staff regularly inspect and carry out work on our roundabouts to make sure they comply with the regulations.

Remember...slow down at roundabouts.

COUNCIL MAKES A PROFIT BY CHARGING TO RECEIVE RECYCLABLES AT THE WASTE MANAGEMENT CENTRE

NOT TRUE

There is a perception that recycling is free, or that Council should not charge for recycling at the Waste Management Centre. The process of collecting, transporting and processing recyclables costs money.

Recycling material collected from your wheelie bins is transferred to kerbside recycling and taken to the Lismore Materials Recovery Facility (MRF). Every truck entering that facility must pay a gate fee and disposal fee.

Workers at the MRF manually sort through and separate the recycling material. If the recycled load is badly contaminated Council is also charged a contamination fee.

Recyclables also incur costs as they are processed for resale, while general waste only requires a tipping fee for its disposal and waste levy when it goes to landfill.

THERE IS GOING TO BE A CAFÉ INCLUDED IN THE NEW MARINE RESCUE TOWER

NOT TRUE

There is a rumour circulating that a café will be included in the new Marine Rescue Tower.

The Marine Rescue Tower, which is expected to be completed by September 2016, will be used by Marine Rescue volunteers to monitor the bar conditions on the North Wall and provide communications to water vessels crossing the bar.

A café will not be operating from the new premises although a covered space will be available for mobile food vendors (eg coffee cart).

MAKE EVERY DROP COUNT IN BALLINA SHIRE

New investigations to find and repair water leaks are underway across Ballina Shire as part of a \$1.5 million Pressure and Leakage Management Plan.

Ballina Shire Council's Manager, Water and Wastewater, Tim Mackney said the program was a timely reminder of how much every drop counts.

"Under Ballina Shire Council's \$1.5 million Pressure and Leakage Management program we have continued with the next phase of investigating water losses across Ballina," Mr Mackney said.

"These investigations involve taking measurements of noise to detect and locate any water losses at customer water meters, council valves and hydrants, and on the ground.

"It's important we find and repair leaks as soon as possible to prevent further water loss.

"Most of our investigations are conducted at night when there is less traffic noise with a focus on older infrastructure in the southern half of Ballina island, which has the most water loss.

"Initial estimates indicate we could save up to 190 mega litres of water per year just by repairing water leaks within that area."

Mr Mackney also said contractors undertaking the works would also be able to identify unexpectedly high water flows in private water meters within the area. This may indicate leaks within private plumbing and residents will be informed.

Improved infrastructure for Cabbage Tree Island

Ballina Shire Council recently upgraded ageing infrastructure on Cabbage Tree Island to ensure local water and wastewater assets continue to run smoothly.

Included in this program of upgrades, undertaken on behalf of Jali Local Aboriginal Land Council (LALC), was the completion of an upgrade to the Cabbage Tree Island sewage pump stations in May 2016.

Ballina Shire Council's Manager, Water and Wastewater, Tim Mackney, said the upgrade had been made possible under an agreement with the NSW government and Jali LALC in Ballina.

"Council has upgraded and replaced the two pump stations at Cabbage Tree Island and will continue to maintain and service the pump stations under an agreement with the NSW Government," Mr Mackney said.

"The upgraded pump stations will benefit the Cabbage Tree Island Aboriginal community."

Funding for the upgrade was made available from the Aboriginal Communities Water and Sewerage Program – a 25-year \$200 million joint investment by the NSW Government and the NSW Aboriginal Land Council to improve water and sewerage systems in Aboriginal communities.

"It's a credit to teams of workers across Council that the upgrade was completed on time and within budget to provide a high quality and cost effective solution for the local community," Mr Mackney said.

"Our concreting crews, workshop, electricians and wastewater crews have worked together over several months; firstly manufacturing equipment and fittings, and then transporting, constructing and installing on site.

"The agreement provides improvements to the ageing infrastructure owned by Jali LALC while ensuring Council is reimbursed for carrying out those works."





In July 2016 recycled water will start at Lennox Head and will roll out across Ballina Shire.





RECYCLED WATER GOES WITH THE FLOW

Located at North Creek Road, the Lennox Head Wastewater Treatment Plant collects and treats around four million litres a day of wastewater.

Wastewater is transformed at the plant to recycled water through a number of treatment processes in accordance with the Australian Guidelines for Water Recycling and the NSW DPI Water Guidelines for Recycled Water Management Systems.

Council must operate its treatment plants in accordance with approvals from the Environment Protection Authority and DPI Water, with concurrence from NSW Health.

Most of the wastewater at the Lennox Head Plant is from 11,000 local homes along with a small number of commercial premises. The plant is capable of producing up to 4.5 million litres of recycled water a day.

1. Inlet works

Wastewater enters the treatment plant. Solid waste is sifted out and removed into bins for disposal. The remaining liquid is fed into one of three extended aeration tanks.

2. Extended aeration tanks

In each tank, micro-organisms play a key role in refining wastewater by consuming soluble contaminants such as ammonia and nitrate. Phosphorus is also removed. A reactor also aerates and de-aerates, settles and decants the clean water off the top which is then pumped into nearby catch and balance ponds.

3. Catch and balance ponds

The ponds catch any solids that remain after the wastewater has been delivered from the tanks and the balance pond stores treated water during busy times.

4. Flow splitting

Water from the ponds is then pumped to final recycled water processing section where it will be split for either delivery to local properties or discharged to the environment.

5. Membrane filtration

Recycled water that is being treated for delivery to local properties passes through ultra-filtration membranes where liquids and any microscopic solids are separated. This process removes tiny bacteria, protozoa and viruses from the water. The clean water flows through the centre of the membrane fibres before entering pipes on its way to the UV disinfection unit.

6. Ultra violet disinfection

Ultra-violet light kills any remaining harmful organisms, as part of the disinfection process.

7. Disinfection and recycled water storage

Recycled water enters a channel inside the storage tank where it undergoes a further disinfection process called chlorination. The chlorinated water is stored in the tank before it enters the boosted pump station where it is pressurised before being piped into houses, businesses and recreational areas through purple pipes.

The Lennox Head and Ballina plants have 24 hour online monitoring equipment and will automatically shut down if water quality cannot be guaranteed. Further intensive weekly, monthly and annual sampling confirms that recycled water is consistently within required specifications.

AUDIT OF RECYCLED WATER SYSTEM PAVES THE WAY FOR LAUNCH

An official launch of Council's dual reticulated (recycled) water system will be held on Friday 1 July at the Lennox Head Wastewater Treatment Plant.

In April, an external audit of Council's recycled water system paved the way for approvals for the new recycled water service from NSW Office of Water in the NSW Department of Primary Industries, and NSW Health.

Ballina Shire Council's Manager, Water and Wastewater, Tim Mackney said the audit found Council's Recycled Water Management System to be fully compliant with the requirements of the Australian Guidelines for Water Recycling and the NSW Guidelines for Recycled Water Management Systems.

"Everyone is excited that Ballina will be the first regional Council in NSW to deliver recycled water to residents as we stay on track to ensuring water is available for future demands," Mr Mackney said.

"It's a credit to our teams across Council that a recent audit commended Council's extensive processes to support its Recycled Water Management System including its water quality database, maintenance management system, monitoring plans, incident and emergency plans and community engagement programs.

"The audit included field site visits to the Lennox Head Wastewater Treatment Plant and interviews with key staff to confirm the accuracy of documents supporting the introduction of recycled water.

"In addition, council staff members underwent extra training, which has included participating in emergency response training on 18 March."

Recycled water marks the start of a new chapter for Ballina Shire that has been many years in the making.

"That we will soon be delivering recycled water for household uses such as washing clothes, watering gardens and flushing toilets, is a major breakthrough," Mr Mackney said.

"Through using recycled water for general purposes, more drinking water will be preserved for essential uses such as drinking, cooking and bathing."

Recycled water will initially begin at approximately 160 new homes in the estates of North Angels Beach, Coastal Grove, Aspects and Elevation and will be rolled out to 7200 households in the Shire.

Recycled water dual reticulation schemes have been in operation in other locations around Australia since the early 2000s. Ballina Shire Council will be the first regional council in NSW to begin using recycling water for domestic purposes.

endangered species profile

Black Cod



Also known as Black Rockcod or Black-Saddled Rockcod.

The Black Cod is a large, reef-dwelling fish that belongs to the groper family. They can grow up to 1.7 metres long and weigh up to 80kg! However, smaller fish of up to 1 metre long and 30kg are more common - still a pretty significant size for a fish. They all have a distinct black 'saddle' shaped spot just in front of the tail, but their colours range from a uniform dark grey black to a blotched or banded dark pattern. Their identifying features are:

- Colour highly variable from black to grey with blotches of banding pattern
- · Large canine teeth in both jaws
- Distinct black 'saddle' shaped spot just in front of the tail
- Rounded caudal fin
- 11 dorsal spines
- White margin on fins.

Black Cod are slow-growing and long-lived, which is probably part of the reason that the populations are in decline. It is possible, according to NSW Fisheries, that the catching of large numbers of males before 1983 has resulted in the significant delays of recovery of populations of Black Cod even to the present day.

Black Cod live in estuaries and around reefs, in caves, gutters and beneath bommies on rocky reefs from rocky shorelines to ocean depths of up to 50 metres. They are territorial and curious creatures, and often occupy a particular cave for life. They use their long canine teeth to feed opportunistically on other fish and crustaceans (Pat - that is, they don't 'hunt' as such?).


One interesting thing about Black Cod is that they are a protogynous hermaphrodite. This means that they first develop as a sexually mature female (and lay eggs etc), and then later in life change into a male once they have reached a length of approximately 1 metre. Other gropers have the same characteristic.

The NSW coastline is the main range for this species which has been protected since 1983. It is now listed as a vulnerable species, as whilst the species is still found mostly in its historic range, the number of sites they have been found in, as well as the number of fish, is significantly reduced. There are heavy penalties for harming, possessing, buying or selling them or for harming their habitat.

let's talk about... YOUR SEPTIC TANK

Management of your septic tank:

The effective operation of the septic tank and disposal area will, in part, depend on how it is managed and maintained. A small amount of maintenance work performed regularly can prevent your system from failing.



This is a well-maintained absorption area

Things not to do:

- Don't allow livestock to graze on the absorption/transpiration area.
 This can lead to compaction and collapse of the area;
- Don't put large quantities of bleaches, disinfectants, whiteners, nappy soakers and spot removers into your septic tank via the sink, washing machine or toilet. These products can kill the good bacteria needed to breakdown wastewater solids;
- Don't allow any foreign materials such as nappies, sanitary napkins, condoms or other hygiene products to enter the system;
- Don't put fats and oils down the drain and keep food waste out of your system;
- Don't install or use a garbage grinder or spa bath if your system is not designed for it.

What to do if there is a problem with your septic tank or disposal area

If there is a problem with your septic tank or disposal area that has potential to impact on the environment or public health then you must by law do something about it.

For regulatory advice prior to carrying out any alterations/modifications to existing systems, or the installation of a new septic system, contact Council's Development and Environmental Health Group on 6686 1210. For operational problems with an existing system you should call a licensed plumber.

WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY – What have we done for you, lately?

The 5 June 2016 was World Environment Day. Each year Council and Geolink celebrate the event by hosting a tree planting on Lennox Headland.

The has been an annual event since 2003, although the first planting was done in 1980 by the Ballina Environment Society. Twenty separate planting days have been held on Lennox Headland, mostly to increase habitat but also for events such as offsetting fleet emissions or celebrating World Youth Day. The trees planted have made an enormous difference to the way the headland looks today. It is not only a great spot to take in the view but it now has immense habitat value for our local plants and animals.

Ballina Shire Council is a proud supporter of World Environment Day. We also support a range eco-friendly, environmental initiatives as part of our day-to-day operations.



River health

The recovery of the Chickiba wetlands is the focus of a project to improve the drainage of the wetland to the east and west of Angels Beach Drive. Prior to these works the wetland was not able to drain properly, and the movement of water was restricted. The plants were effectively drowning because the water level was approximately one metre higher than it should have been.

Sixteen tonnes of lime was used to neutralise any acid released from acid sulfate soils while the soils readjusted to the changes in water levels. The water quality both within the wetland and the drainage channels has improved and there is a greater tidal range within the drain itself. The trees in the wetlands are already showing signs of recovery with new buds appearing.

We have our fingers crossed that new trees will germinate in the next few years which will lead to a much healthier and natural wetland.

LEACHATE MANAGEMENT IMPROVEMENTS

The management and disposal of leachate is an important function of a waste management facility, particularly at Ballina where the landfill site has a high water table. Leachate is generated by the decomposition of waste and water that comes into contact with waste material. Currently leachate and runoff from the landfill site are stored in ponds and treated via a water treatment plant before being diverted to sewer.

To reduce the amount of leachate being disposed to sewer, Council has recently planted more than 1000 vetiver plants on the surface of the northern landfill. Vetiver grass has very high water use and nutrient uptake rates, and is tolerant to elevated levels of heavy metals and other adverse conditions. During periods of dry weather the plants are irrigated with the leachate, diverting disposal to the sewer system. It is expected that as future planting is undertaken, continued environmental benefits will be gained.



There's something about a cosy wood fire on a cold night isn't there?

Unfortunately the incorrect use of wood heaters can generate excessive smoke which can have an impact on air quality and your neighbours.

Here are some of the ways you can reduce smoke from your wood fire.

- Always burn small logs of aged, dry hardwood. Unseasoned wood has more moisture which makes a heater smoke.
- Store wood under cover in a dry, ventilated area.
- Use plenty of dry kindling to establish a good fire quickly.
- Never burn rubbish, treated or painted wood as this can pollute the air and can be poisonous.
- Keep the flame lively and bright. Your fire should only smoke for a few minutes when you first light it and when you add extra fuel.
- Don't let your wood heater smoulder overnight. Keep enough air in the fire to maintain a flame.
- Check your chimney or flue regularly. If there is smoke coming from the chimney, increase the air supply to your fire.
- Check your heater complies with Australian Standard 4013:1999.

Green Vehicle Guide

Council regularly reviews its fleet of vehicles, whether it's a car or a piece of heavy machinery, to make sure it is providing the best possible option in terms of lifecycle costing.

We rate our vehicles using the Green Star CO2 rating. Our aim is to keep our vehicles under an average of 220g/km per vehicle. Currently our passenger vehicles are 195.63 g/km and the light commercials are 224.75 g/km. Overall, this is an average of 215.24 g/km.

We have considered electric cars, but their limitations in terms of servicing in the local area, have (to date) meant that they are not suitable as council vehicles.

Protect our waterways...do the right thing on rural properties

If you are planning to do earthworks on your property make sure adequate controls are put in place to prevent soil loss which may result in erosion and water pollution.

These measures include:

- Staging clearing works and rehabilitating/revegetating progressively to minimise the amount of cleared land at any one time;
- Retaining riparian and fringe vegetation;
- Installing appropriate sediment and erosion controls on the site;
- Engaging a qualified person to ensure erosion and sediment controls are adequate for the site, and revegetating quickly following clearing works.

Considering these things prior to starting work could prevent tonnes of soil leaving your property and polluting a watercourse.

It could also help you avoid having to spend more than \$100,000 in rectification works as one local farmer did after Council was notified of extensive vegetation clearing that led to large amounts of soil entering Houghlahans Creek (see image below). Fines in excess of \$4000 may also be issued for the pollution of water.

DON'T DUMP YOUR WASTE IN PUBLIC BINS...

Dumping household rubbish in public bins at sporting grounds, beaches, parks and reserves is illegal and causes big problems for our community:

- Our sports teams, locals and visitors have to contend with full bins and overflowing rubbish:
- It is costly for Council to manage and we all pay for the clean-up costs;
- It is an eyesore and makes our region unsightly for locals and visitors;
- It damages our local environment when wind-blown litter makes its way into bushland and waterways;
- It attracts vermin and pests such as rats, foxes and cockroaches.

Remember, the easiest way to reduce your rubbish and create more space in your red bin is to sort your waste at home – place all food and garden waste into the green bin for composting, and all recyclables into the yellow bin.

Unwanted Household Goods and how to dispose of them

Don't throw your unwanted items into the garbage bin. Check with your local op shop to see if they can use them.

GOLDEN RULES FOR DONATING TO THE OP-SHOP

- 1. If you can, donate during business hours. That way, volunteer staff can help you find the best location for your donation; not all shops are able to take all types of goods.
- 2. Ensure items can be recycled by the charity, as not all charities can recycle all items. Usually there is signage at the donations bin to let you know what can and can't be left.
- 3. Place your donations inside the bin. Unfortunately there is a high risk of theft when donations are left beside bins. If any of your donations do not fit the bin please drop-off at an op-shop during opening hours or call your preferred charity to arrange for pick-up.
- 4. Ask yourself, would you give this item to a friend in need (i.e. is it clean, undamaged and good quality)? If not, the op-shop probably doesn't need it either.
- 5. Put rubbish and damaged items in your rubbish bin at home.

Loosen up! Don't bag your recycling

Place recyclables into the bin loose, not stacked inside one another or in plastic bags.

Plastic bags clog the automatic sorting machines. The bags then need to be removed by hand. This is a time consuming, dangerous and reduces the overall efficiency of the recycling station or materials recovery facility.

Note: you can recycle bagged soft plastic and bagged polystyrene (keep the plastic and polystyrene in separate bags).



Positive Local Economic Outlook

The latest unemployment figures for regional areas has the unemployment rate for Ballina Shire in the December quarter of 2015 at 6.67% which compared favourably to regional NSW (7.10%) and our immediate neighbours (Byron 10.5%), Lismore (10.2%) and Richmond Valley (11.3%).

The amount of private building work occurring in Ballina Shire is strong. The value of development work approved in the first eight months of the current financial year (2015-16) was more than the total of the previous financial year (2014-15).

Almost \$50 million in non-residential construction was approved for the 8-months to the end of February 2016. This was twice the total value of non-residential construction approved in the previous financial year.

Ballina Shire's Growth Regional Product (GRP), which is the equivalent of GDP at the local level, as of June 2015 was \$1,761 million, which was 3.9% higher than the previous year.

Road Cycling – new rules and what you need to know

Road cycling is a popular activity on local roads in Ballina Shire, so we all need to be aware of new rules which will make it safer for everyone sharing the roads.

- All drivers must leave at least 1 metre between their motor vehicle and a bicycle rider when passing a cyclist on a road with a speed limit of 60km/h and below.
- All drivers must leave at least 1.5 metres when they pass a cyclist on a road with a speed limit above 60km/h.

Drivers should take extra care around road cyclists who are 'bunch riding' – (riding in formation).

ETIQUETTE FOR DRIVERS:

- Check twice for cyclists. Cyclists are harder to see, particularly in low light.
- Be prepared to slow down when approaching bunch riders.
- Treat bunch riders as if they are a single long vehicle.
- Wait until you're sure it's safe to overtake bunch riders. This won't hold you up for long and could save a cyclist's life.

ETIQUETTE FOR RIDERS:

- Ride in the bike lane if there is one.
- When bunch riding, ride two abreast, keep your handlebars level with those of the rider next to you, and travel within 1.5 metres of the other rider.
- The lead rider should call out loudly and use hand signals to indicate all hazards and route directions, and following riders should pass it back down the group.
- Tailenders (riders on the back of the bunch) must warn of approaching trucks or cars. This is particularly important on narrow roads. The bunch should move to the left or into single file to allow vehicles to overtake.
- A bunch should not exceed 20 riders and should ride as a single vehicle.

Drivers and cyclists who break the road rules will face increased penalties. For details about these penalties and more road safety information go to roadsafety.transport.nsw.gov.au

BALLINA BYRON GATEWAY AIRPORT READY TO TAKE OFF AFTER MAJOR FUNDING ANNOUNCEMENT

The Ballina Byron Gateway Airport has secured \$4.5 million from the NSW Government, and Council will contribute an extra \$900,000 to the \$5.4 million terminal upgrade project.


The Minister for Regional Development, Skills and Small Business John Barilaro and North Coast Nationals MLC Ben Franklin announced the funding which will provide for:

- A major expansion of the departure lounge including extra seating, dining and lounge areas
- A new café, sports bar and three additional retail shops
- Three additional undercover external walkways
- New parking areas for shuttle buses and taxi operators.

Other features will include improved pedestrian access, external street furniture, public art, landscaping and a larger pick up and drop off area.

Airport Manager, Neil Weatherson, said the funding was tremendous news and will allow for additional air services which should benefit the region via increased tourism.

Construction is expected to start in June 2017.

Passenger numbers at the Ballina Byron Gateway Airport have been steadily increasing over the past five-years with annual figures exceeding 460,000. The airport caters for 58 flights per week and is ranked number 12 in the top 50 Regional Airports in Australia and number two in NSW after Newcastle.

\$2.9 million overlay completed

A \$2.9 million project to upgrade the Apron (where the planes park) and taxiway has just been completed. Contractors worked at night to finish the asphalt project to ensure flights in and out of Ballina were not disrupted.

The Apron and taxiway have been overlaid and strengthened to accommodate more aircraft. The aerodrome can now accommodate up to four jets (A320/B737) on the ground at the same time, along with other aircraft including helicopters and corporate jets.

The weight of a fully loaded A320 can be around 78 tonnes so the amount of pressure on the asphalt when turning the aircraft is immense. The Apron, taxiway and runway need to be able to cope with this pressure time and time again.

The NSW Government provided \$2.2 million for the project with Council contributing \$500,000.
